PRESIDENT-ELECT OF MEXICO KILLED NEAR TOWN OF SAN ANGEL

MEXICO CITY, July 17.—Gen. Alvaro Obregon, president-elect of Mexico, was assassinated shortly after 2 p. m. today, near the town of San Angel, close to the capital.

The assassins, who were unknown, fired five shots into the general's motorcade.

Obregon, the unnamed hero of many Mexican revolutions, had come from his farm in Sonora to hold a demonstration here, where he expected to entertain.

A train bearing 500 of his adherents enroute to capital was attacked yesterday but there were no casualties.

Obregon was the sole candidate for president to succeed Plutarco Calles, his friend, two other candidates were executed during the campaign for alleged revolutionary activities.

Obregon was to have assumed office December 1, and he had announced that he would continue the policies of President Calles, including the religious regulations of the government.

The president-elect held that the Catholic clergy had obstructed the revolutionary reform program of his former administration and of President Calles.

ALBANY, N. Y., July 17.—Gov. Alfred E. Smith will try to forget for the next ten days or two weeks that he is a presidential candidate and attempt to rest a bit.

Smith has no formal vacation plan, but he will be guided by his manager. He will not be out of the city for more than a few days or turn to the woods for a few days.

He had planned a fishing party for today but this was abandoned when word came that he was to be in Albany.

Gangrene Sets in And Krassin Goes For Medical Aid

Condition of Brave Explorer Described As Critical; Other Men Aboard Ice Breaker Are Jubilant As Ship Approaches Port; Krassin Will Continue Trip to Advent Bay Soon As Mariano Is Transferred to Boat Where Medical Aid Is Available.

MOSCOW, July 17.—The Russian ice breaker Krassin steamed swiftly through northern waters today in an attempt to save the life of one of the 10 men he had so successfully brought out of the ice-bound wastes of the north.

Captain Adalberto Mariano, reported to be in a serious condition. One leg was badly frozen, while he, Captain Filipo Zappi and their late leader, Finn Malmgren, attempted to walk to the ship.

It was reported today that Krassin had set in and that Mariano's condition was critical.

So serious is Mariano's condition that the command of the Krassin was transferred to the ship's doctor, who is a ship of the Red Fleet, to meet him at the entrance to Kings Bay harbor. There Mariano will be transferred to a hospital ship.

As soon as Mariano has been transferred, the Krassin will continue on its way to the north. It is expected that the Krassin will reach the north in a few days.

The military planes probably will move in front of the train and accompany it into the capital.

Monsieur, Gen. Jose Amador, chief of the expedition, several other officers and a group of soldiers will join the train.

Gen. Alvaro Obregon, newly elected president, said that he and a group of business men had agreed to insure the body of Carranza.

The former president said that while the body was in the train, it would be guarded by a detachment of the army.

The body of Carranza will be carried to the capital in a special train. It is expected that the train will arrive in the capital in a few days.

THE BANK GUARANTY LAW AND THE GRANGE.

Members of the Idaho granges have from time to time advocated with more or less enthusiasm, the passage of some sort of law which will guarantee to the depositors the return of their money in case of failure of the bank.

Twin Falls county grange seems to be approaching the matter from the right angle in asking the Commissioner of Finance for the State of Idaho to give his views on the subject. Whether individuals agree with his conclusions, is not a vital matter. His experience in banking matters make his statements authentic and informative, and as such, carrying weight.

Commissioner E. W. Porter declares himself opposed to the enactment of a guaranty measure, having found that anything yet tried out by other States has failed, because of economic unsoundness, to bring the results hoped for. He states that the one hope for banking safety, in his opinion, is the fostering through a strong State department, of sound banking principles which tends to eliminate the men and institutions which are unfit for the business.

Just the manner in which the public may receive the assurance of competent supervision at all times, is not made clear. The present system of appointment may bring efficiency and honesty into the office or the reverse. And when it fails to bring the right sort of head, the entire State may repeat the past disastrous experience and foot-bills wholly out of proportion to their ability to pay.

It is probably true that we have not yet conceived the perfect safety measure for our bank deposits, but the grange members are apparently far from satisfied that the future is safe in the hands of the biennial political appointee who admittedly exercises a very loose supervision over the sixty financial institutions under his care, having no means of gauging their approaching insolvency until the wreck is complete. But two assistants are allowed for field work, and they are unable to cover the ground in a satisfactory manner.

If there is a financial wizard who is able to propose a system which will assure safety to the depositor and at the same time impose no heavy handicap on the banking institutions, this is the time for him to step forth.

He may feel assured of an interested and, attentive audience.

JUST LIKE OTHER PEOPLE NOW.

Perhaps for the first time since he flew the Atlantic, Lindbergh has reached the state of oblivion for which he has been striving. He has sincerely tried to go about the discharge of the duties of his job without exciting fresh demonstrations of the easily roused hero worship of his fellow Americans—an almost impossible accomplishment.

But now, unheeded, he arrives in the little prairie town of Nebraska through which hundreds of tourists daily pass. They have learned to beware the stranger who offers checks. They seem to be quite hard-boiled in the matter, and when a small check is proffered by the man whom the world has delighted to honor, on whom it has showered gifts, and to whom the freedom of every city has been given, he hears, even as you and I—

"We don't know you!"

Whether the individual failed to read the signature, whether it is so illegible as to defy deciphering, whether he thought the stranger might be using a name not his own—the report falls to waste.

One thing is certain—it was not a girl who said it, for there is no girl in the country who would fail to recognize the hero of all female America.

But Lindbergh, unaffected, modest, and having suffered the pangs of over publicity, must have been delighted with the experience.

AN INTERNATIONAL LOSS.

The entire country mourns with Mexico the tragic loss of her brilliant young flier, Emilio Carranza, whose death shocked the entire country. Apparently destined to be our sister republic all that Charles Lindbergh is to us, we can in imagination, understand their national grief.

Coupled with the sorrow we feel, is the growing sentiment against the needless risks taken by men whose lives show much promise of advancement in their particular field. Dead, he is a national hero. Living, he possibly would have done incalculably great things for his native land.

And a little caution, a waiting until the disturbed air conditions had subsided, the quiet avoidance of the needless risk, would probably have given him the biggest chance that can come to a man—that of serving well and long.
