Pittsburgh Going Strong and Will Be Difficult to Stop in Pennant Race

United Press Staff, Chicago—The heat of mid-July will not halt teams that have been playing all summer.

The great annual shakedown from sixteen major league teams have begun to find their proper level. The Cleveland Indians, who were perched high in first division early in the season, have been kicked down the ladder.

Last year Cleveland finished sixth. The Boston Red Sox are back in last place. They lost, snuffed the rafted air of first division and it is then they began to find their level.

They found up in eighth place last year and apparently have renewed their lease for 1928.

Consider the National league where St. Louis, New York and Chicago are fighting for the lead with the Cardinals on the crest at the moment.

Cincinnati, rising on a repulsive pitching, forged to the front in the spring only to make way later for teams with more power in their batting orders. The Reds finished fifth in 1927. That's about where they belong.

Don't the Sox and the Pittsburgh Pirates are beginning to prove they are one of the most successful teams in baseball. They have won seven straight games and the end is not yet in sight.

Barring injuries, the four best clubs in the National league seem to be St. Louis, Pittsburgh, Chicago and New York. Brooklyn is a threat to the leaders, for the Dodgers take exception in walloping first division teams and then turning around to drop a series to the Boston Braves or Phillies.

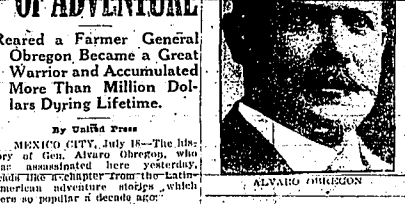
