## CALES MOVES TO SAVE GOVERNMENT

### BELGIUM ADDS NAME TO LIST OF COUNTRIES APPROVING KELLOGG PROPOSAL TO DO AWAY WITH WAR

France Expected to Invite Interested Governments to Sign Anti-War Pact in Paris; Kellogg Wishes to Affix Name to Final Document But May Be Unable to Make Trip Now.

WASHINGTON, July 18.—Belgium today added its name to the list of nations which have approved the American draft for a renunciation of war treaty. At the same time it was said at the state department that Secretary of State Kellogg "expects" France within the week to invite the interested governments to sign the anti-war pact in Paris.

The Belgian note said: "The text prepared by the government of Washington commands the full approval of the royal government," and asked that the United States inform Belgium as to the time and place which it may choose for the signature of the treaty.

It was said that Kellogg may be unable to make the suggested Paris trip because of the pressure of other business.

In such case it was hinted the United States may decline the invitation to Kellogg for personal reasons wishes to affix his own signature to the final document.

### DEAD HERO'S CAREER FULL OF ADVENTURE

Rearred a Farmer General Obregon Became a Great Warrior and Accumulated More Than Million Dollars During Lifetime.

MEXICO CITY, July 18.—The history of Gen. Alvaro Obregon, who was assassinated here yesterday, reads like a chapter from the Latin-American romance which was so popular a decade ago.

Obregon was rearred a farmer, became a great warrior and at the height of his career was worth more than a million American dollars.

His home originally was at Huamantla, in the state of Tlaxcala, where he learned farming, and when the Mexican revolution broke out, he entered the army as a military figure of wide power.

When he had overthrown the Carranza government, Obregon became the ruler of the state of Coahuila, and later of the state of Sonora.

## ZONING, AND THE FUTURE CITY OF TWIN FALLS.

It is gratifying to note that there was no opposition to the zoning plan suggested by a disinterested and intelligent committee who gave much thought to the problem of the future growth of Twin Falls.

Cities, no less than individuals, must have intelligent direction during their adolescent years if they are to achieve the balanced, symmetrical and harmonious development that marks the mature result as being above mediocrity.

Twin Falls, the natural capital of the irrigated empire of this part of the Snake River valley, will continue to increase in the three classes marked by the committee—industrial, business and residence. If these classes are mixed, property values are adversely affected and civic dissatisfaction results. There is every argument for the plan, and nothing against it—and for once, no fictitious objections were registered, no opposition had to be overriden, no ill feeling has been engendered.

A month will yet elapse before the measure becomes an ordinance, according to the decision of the members of the city commission who are proceeding in the matter with the utmost circumspection.

It is one thing, however, to enact an ordinance, and another to enforce it. And no matter how meritorious the zoning regulation may be, no matter how deeply rooted in common sense nor how far-seeing and wise, it might as well be thrown into the waste basket if it is to be openly flouted in practice.

Many citizens are wondering whether the city ordinance prohibiting the erection of a service station on Shoshone street has been rescinded, since one of the local oil companies has built and is at this time operating one in the forbidden area.

Litigation followed the declaration of the Continental Oil Company to build opposite the Washington school. Work is progressing steadily on that location, and presumably there is some quirk and quibble in the law which makes it possible for this ordinance, expressive of the desires of the people, to be openly flouted.

But in view of that fact, the very admirable arrangements which we all hope may prevail in accordance with the proposed zoning ordinance may be found to be wholly inapplicable when some influential concern finds it to their advantage to overturn the ruling.

Just as long as the intent of the law can be disregarded by the courts, just so long may we fruitfully spend our time and thought on civic betterments.

However, there is much satisfaction in the assurance that this is a real zoning ordinance possessed of teeth that can and will bite should occasion demand. It means a great forward step for Twin Falls.

Unless authorities find that he can give them additional information, Obregon's assassin will be executed immediately. The outrage appeared to be an individual matter, but looked as if it had been planned by some group.

It was at first described as a lunatic attack on the president-elect at the luncheon table with a group of his friends in the Lalmolina cafe in the wealthy suburb of San Angel yesterday afternoon. How it happened is not clear.

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He ordered troops into the barracks throughout the republic. All theaters, schools and other public gathering places were closed. Three highest officials of the police department immediately were arrested.

The president, deeply affected by the assassination, issued only a short statement. He said he was "stunned" by the death of Obregon and the transcendental importance of the event.

"I have suffered such a shock that I am completely stunned by the death of Obregon and the transcendental importance of the event as an assassin of the nation's president."

Obregon was unopposed for the presidency of Mexico since the death of the late president-elect, he was met with a unanimous vote.

Coupled with the sorrow we feel, is the growing sentiment against the needless risks taken by men whose lives show much promise of advancement in their particular field. Dead, he is a national hero. Living, he possibly would have done incalculably great things for his native land.

HOME RULE FOR WALES
