GALES ASKS FACTORS Nation Pays Final Respects To Memory of Dead Leader

Calles Apt To BE PRESIDENT 2 YEARS MORE

Would Solve Difficulty of Filling Executive Office, Police Refuse to Divulge Information Regarding Assassin's Motives.

Law and Order Will Prevail Throughout Nation President Calles Says in Statement; Assassin in Confession Gives Religious Fanaticism As Motive for Crime; Others Have Been Arrested.

MEXICO CITY, July 19.—The capital impressively has paid final honors to Alvaro Obregon, president-elect, who was assassinated Tuesday, and today leaders turned to the task of selecting someone to succeed to the presidency of the republic.

The permanent congressional commission, representing the adjourned congress, meets today and it is likely the matter of Obregon's successor will arise. The warrior who came out of the north to rule the country for one year, and who was elected July 1 for another term, had not officially been proclaimed the president-elect.

That complicated matters. There was likelihood that President Plutarco Calles would rule the July election was no election. Calles at this moment seems the logical successor to Obregon's place in the presidential line, but the assassin's motives are being investigated.

Through the republic today, no outward action had been reported as resulting from news of Obregon's assassination by a young carter, a student, believed to be Jose de Leon Toral, gave a confession that indicated the assassin had been identified as Jose de Leon Toral, but even this is not confirmed.

Photographs of Toral portray a boyish face, with regular features, and a slight figure of medium build. Obregon's sources said today that a constitutional amendment would be proposed to Congress under which Calles' term would be extended to that of the election of the year 1930, which he was elected for six years, until December 1, 1930.

Obregon would have served for six years, a constitutional amendment would be proposed several months ago providing a six year term instead of a four year term. Calles had been elected in the election, but would not take advantage of the extension, but would leave office in Obregon's place.

General Obregon's body was in route for burial to his home today, the permanent congressional commission met today to consider the assassination of the president. This committee handles legislative matters, but does not make recommendations. Congress does not meet until September 1.

Calles appears to be in a position to take the presidency, but the situation is still uncertain. The assassin's motives are being investigated.

HOOVER DRAWS UP PLAN FOR FARM RELIEF

Republican Nominee Believed to Have Worked Out Plan That Will Meet With Approval of Middle West; Hoover and Wife Rest.

ABRAHAM HOOVER, SPECIAL TRAIN-NEARING OGDEN, Utah, July 19.—A specific plan of farm relief will be offered by Herbert Hoover, the republican presidential nominee, in his speech of acceptance at Palo Alto, Aug. 10, the United Press learned today.

It will embody a Hoover plan of cooperative marketing for handling surplus production and will be interwoven with projects for railroad reorganization and development of the Great Lakes.

It was worked out by the nominee in three days of conference with President Coolidge, Vice President Hoover, Governor Zimmerman of Wisconsin, Senator McNamara of Nebraska, and other Republican leaders of the wheat and corn belt, during his trip to his Pacific coast home.

Settlement of that matter completed the acceptance tour, and it will be mailed to Washington for printing as soon as Hoover reaches his home. With the exception of McNamara, who boarded Hoover's train, Hoover's farm plan would hold the republican ticket.

The plan will coincide with the present administration's agricultural policy and will not endorse the equalization act for wheat, the McNamara bill, twice voted by Congress.

The nominee had Mrs. Hoover, of today, the day after he boarded the train from Gov. Fred H. Barker of Nevada, and the publicist, Charles H. Hinkley of Washington. They met Hoover and welcomed the nominee to their State.

"That's about right."

Collins said that Francis T. Hunter and John H. Hennessey had been chosen to play the singles in the zone finals with Italy, beginning tomorrow night and that George Lott and Hennessey had been chosen for the doubles.

CALLES ASKS FAVORABLE TO UNITE FOR SAKE OF MEXICO

Nation Pays Final Respects to Memory of Dead Leader

CALLES APT TO BE PRESIDENT 2 YEARS MORE

Would Solve Difficulty of Filling Executive Office; Police Refuse to Divulge Information Regarding Assassin's Motives.

MEXICO CITY, July 19.—President Calles is likely to remain in office for two years more in order to overcome the difficulty of filling the presidential office after the assassination of President Carranza.

Through there could be no official announcement of the presidential succession until the parliamentary committee had concluded its meeting, several observers here already believe that Calles should remain in office, and that it necessary a constitutional amendment to enable him to remain.

Police are divulging nothing regarding their investigation of the motive that lay behind Carranza's assassination. It is agreed generally that the assassin has been identified as Juan de la Cruz Toral, but even this is not official.

Photographs of Toral portray a boyish face, with regular features, and a slight figure of medium height.

Calles' successor will be elected by congress under which Calles' term would be extended to the end of the four-year term for which he was elected. Calles had remained in office for six years, until December 1, 1926.

Calles would have served for six years. A constitutional amendment was passed several months ago providing six years instead of a four-year presidential term. Calles had announced he would not take advantage of the extension, but would leave office in Carranza's favor.

Several Calles' friends have urged Calles to remain in office for the remainder of the two years mentioned, for at the end of that time a regular election could be held and a successor named.

Calles' body was on route for burial to his Sonora home today, the permanent parliamentary committee met to consider the succession to the presidency. This committee handles legislative matters during congressional recesses. Calles' term does not end until September 1.

Calles appears too ill to discuss the presidential situation at the moment.

POLICE PATROL ALL STREETS IN BORDER CITIES

Precautionary Measures Are Taken By Authorities in Mexico.

NOBLES, Mex. Mex. July 19.—Police intensified the patrol of border cities and garzones were held alert today as Sonora awaited the arrival of the body of General Carranza, assassinated president-elect of Mexico.

Without explanation, a southern train from here was halted at Empalme, Sonora, and passengers in the coaches were released.

Orders from Gen. Francisco Manzo, commander of federal forces in the west coast, caused the arrest of the train. It was presumed that the soldiers would meet the train bearing General Carranza's body and cover the route to Nacozari, Son, where funeral services will be held.

Lt. Col. Alejandro Gonzalez, commander of the barracks at Tijuana, reported no trouble in his sector but he was under orders to hold his men alert.

Law and Order Will Prevail Throughout Nation President Calles Says in Statement; Assassin in Confession Gives Religious Fanaticism As Motive for Crime; Others Have Been Arrested.

MEXICO CITY, July 19.—The capital impressively has paid final honors to Alvaro Obregon, president-elect, who was assassinated Tuesday, and today leaders turned to the task of selecting someone to succeed to the presidency of the republic.

The permanent congressional commission, representing the adjourned congress, meets today and it is likely that the master of Obregon's successor will arise. The warrior who came out of the north to rule the country for one four-year term, and who was elected July 1 for another term, has been officially been proclaimed the president-elect.

ABANDONING HOOPER'S SPECIAL TRAIN NEARBY, OGDEN, Utah, July 19.—A specific plan of farm relief will be offered by Herbert Hoover, the Republican presidential nominee, in his speech of acceptance at Salt Lake City, Aug. 12, the United Press learned today.

It will embody a Hooverized scheme of co-operative marketing for handling surplus production and will be introduced with projects for railroad reorganization and development of the Great Salt Lake.

It was worked out by the nominee in three days of conversation with President Coolidge, Vice President Dawes, Governor Zimmerman of Wisconsin, Emerson of Wyoming, McCullough of Nevada, Hamilton of Iowa, and other Republican leaders of the wheat and corn belt during the trip to Salt Lake City.

Settlement of that matter completes the acceptance speech and it will be mailed to Washington by special train as Hoover reaches his home.

With the exception of McCullough, who boarded Hoover's train, Hoover's farm plan would have been developed in the last 48 hours.

The plan will coincide with the present administration's farm policy and will not endorse the equalization fee system of the McNary-Hamilton bill twice voted by Congress.

The nominee and Mrs. Hoover rest today. The only callers who boarded the train were Gov. Fred B. Balzer of Nevada, Emerson and Republican Chairman Hinkley of Wyoming. They will confer with Hoover before the nominee's departure.
