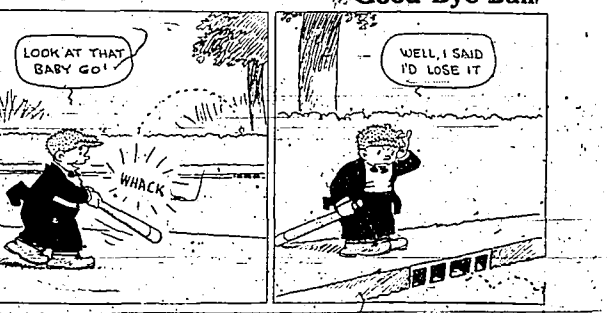

SIX COUNTIES GIVE DATA ON POOLED LAMBS

Show 32 Cars Have Been Shipped of Which 13 Cars Hit the High Market.

Of the 10 counties of the State that have shipped pooled lambs, six have an average of 266 head per car. The State-wide letter of information de- cluded upon at the Twin Falls and Pocatello Conferences. These are the counties of Camia, Minidoka, Teton, Blaine, Canyon, and Owyhee. Thus the data of the pooled lambs are now at the figures shipped to date.

Of the 32 cars there were—7117 lambs, 1068 ewes and 251 wethers on an average of 266 head per car. The average loading weight of the full cars was 22,500 pounds. Shipping expense per hundred pounds was estimated at \$2.31, while the average net price of lambs per 100 pounds home weight was \$13.17 and with four per cent shrink was \$12.68.

The May shipments were especially fortunate, only 21 feeders having been cut back out of the pooled lambs that were marketed.

The sort was light until June 11th, when an excess of lambs made sorting severe. More lambs arrived than the market could absorb, fatter buyers who had been active now found an excess. The dressed lamb prices dropped 5 cents. Considering the service that was done as compared with the

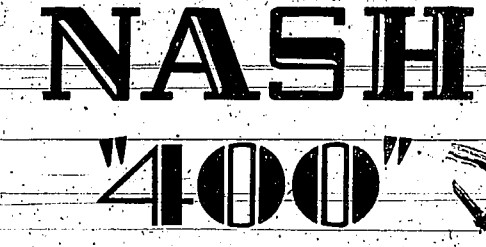

GIVE DATA ON

POOLED LAMBS

Show 32 Cars Have Been
Shipped of Which 13 Cars
Hit the High Market.

Of the 10 counties of the State that
have shipped pooled lambs, six have
given the data for assembling in the
State-wide letter of information be-
lieved upon at the Twin Falls—
Pocatello Conference. These are the
counties of Cassia, Blaine, Twin
Falls, Ada, Canyon, and Owyhee. The
data of the pooled lambs are as
follows: Of the 52 cars there were 7147
lambs, 1078 ewes and 281 wethers of
an average of 266 head per car. The
average loading weight of the full car
was 23,550 pounds. Shipping expense
per hundred pounds was estimated at
\$2.21, while the average net price of
lambs per 100 pounds lamb weight
was \$14.47 and with four per cent
shrink was \$13.68.

This year shipments were especially
fortunate, only 21 loaders having been
cut back out of the pooled lambs that
were marketed.

The sort was light until June 11th,
when an excess of lambs made sorting
severe. More lambs arrived than
could be marketed. Packer buyers
who had been active now found an
excess. The dressed lamb prices
dropped 5 cents. Considering the sorting
that was done as compared with the

previous shipments, the lamb prices

also dropped, the net returns show-
ing a drop from 4 to 5 cents.

with a total of 172 head cut back at
\$13 and 5 cars at \$18.
