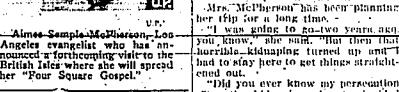

CONTRIBUTIONS OF DEMOCRATS NOW COMING IN

By United Press NEW YORK, Aug. 2.—Relatively small contributions are being collected this far for the \$1,000,000 fund which will be estimated the president's campaign fund.

The largest individual contributions in the \$1,000,000 fund were two for \$10,000 each. They came from John D. Ryan, president of the American Copper Company, and John T. Smith, general counsel of the General Motors Corporation.

The names of Bush, William H. Ketter and William Todd, multi-millionaire friends of the Democratic presidential candidate, were mentioned on the list made public today by Col. H. H. Lehman, Democratic finance director.

The bulk of the contributions come from New York. The business men who are friends of the candidate are represented by small donations, many of one dollar.

Four \$5,000 contributions were received, including that from Hugh C. Wallace, Tacoma, Wash., former ambassador to France. All of the \$1,000 contributions were from New York, except the one from Joseph L. Blattoewer, Colorado Springs, Colo.

The Democratic treasury now holds \$197,762, according to Lehman's report. It stood at \$153,670 on July 11 and contributions total \$244,212. The national organization has spent \$14,550. The organization will roll for the 20 days to \$1,000,000.

SMITH ASSERTS KEEN INTEREST FARM PROBLEM

By United Press NEW YORK, Aug. 2.—Such Republican leaders as former Governor Lowden of Illinois, as well as Democrats who have stated their opposition, will be called in to discuss the agricultural situation with Governor Alfred E. Smith today, after a conference with Senator Frank P. Rowan, chairman of the committee.

Smith said also that he would discuss the farm problem at length in his acceptance speech at 10 o'clock August 22.

After a talk today with the governor, Smith said, "The Democratic platform soundly declares the fundamental basis for relief of the agricultural distress which not only grips the farmer himself, but is depriving the farmers of \$100,000,000 for the industries of the country."

"Control of the rate of agricultural surplus is recognized by our platform as an essential need. Its cost is to be imposed on the land he hoarded. That principle is fixed by our platform on which I stand, only the details of its accomplishment remain to be worked out."

"As I have said, I shall immediately if I am elected, ask the broad farm leaders and economists to work out this detail with me."

"I shall ask them to serve irrespective of locality or party. Republicans, Democratic Governor Lowden as well as Democrats who have studied the farm problem will be called upon by me for this national service. I shall discuss this question at length in my acceptance speech."

Smith has been closely associated with Lowden in the campaign for the McGraw-Hill building. Smith has also been associated with Lowden's present position.

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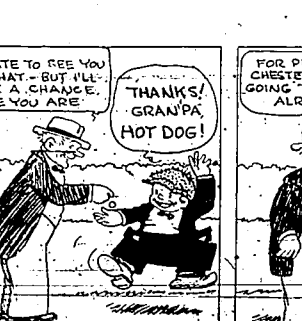

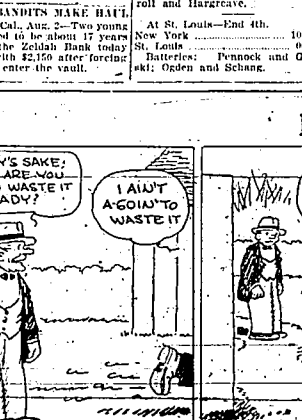

### 60,000 Trout to Be Released In Snake From the Hatchery

Approximately 60,000 young trout will be released into the Snake river during the summer months from the hatchery of the Southern Idaho Fish and Game association, according to the officials who will supervise the transfer.

Work is to start on the placing of the trout at 7 a. m. Sunday morning and will continue until the trout are safe in their new habitat. This will bring the total to 200,000 fish to be released this year.

Three trucks furnished will be used in the work. The Kimberly one has installed a cable at the hatchery where the trout are to be lowered. These smaller trucks will be lowered at one time and it is believed that a truck load of 18,000 trout will be placed in the river within six minutes after reaching the river.

The 60,000 young trout will be about 150 cans when loaded. The trout are now all at least three and a half inches in length, perfectly able to take "milk" in the "dead water" where they are being placed.

The next distribution of trout from the hatchery will probably be next Sunday and will be in the water near Thousand Springs and Salmon river. A few cans of fish will be placed in Jackson's lake near Hazelton at a later time, on a boat released.

The hatchery is now being cleaned up and the trout are being placed in the river.

## COURTNEY FORCED DOWN IN MID-OCEAN Harrison Pleads for Religious Tolerance

### MANY EAST ATLANTIC SHIPS RUSHING TO AID OF ENGLISH FLIER AND THREE COMPANIONS

Location Given by Wireless Message From Crew of Whale Gives Position About Midway Between Azores Islands and Coast of Newfoundland; First of Rescue Vessels on Spot But Report No Trace of Missing Seaplane With Its Four Occupants; Out From Horta More Than Fifteen Hours.

NEW YORK, Aug. 2—Five floating Atlantic liners were converging today on a spot in mid-Atlantic to rescue the flying boat Whale and its four occupants, forced down on a flight from the Azores to Newfoundland.

The Whale's radio put out its call for help during the early morning hours and ships of several nations combined in the race to save Captain Frank T. Courtney and his companions.

The American ship President Hayes and the Massachusetts, the White Star liners Celtic and Cedric, and the North German Lloyd liner, which had been definitely known to be speeding to the rescue.

The Whale is down about 720 miles northwest of Horta, Azores, which she left at 1:55 p. m. eastern standard time on August 1, and is estimated to be about 150 miles from Cape Race, Newfoundland, her goal.

The call for help came about 8 a. m. eastern standard time, approximately 15 hours after the Whale left the Azores and was picked up by several vessels.

Rescue appeared imminent shortly before noon today, as the Celtic was only about 100 miles from the Whale's position when she started to her aid. It is the Whale's radio that has furnished the only fifth time in the illustrious history of trans-Atlantic flight that a plane's crew has surfaced after being forced down on the water.

The others were: Harry U. Hawcock and McKenna Greave, who came down in a life raft on August 1, 1915, while making the first attempt to cross the Atlantic in a heavier-than-air plane.

Accompanying Courtney on his flight are E. H. Hosmer, millimeter flight instructor at Dayton, Ohio; Fred H. Gilmore, wireless operator. All are British.

Courtney's flight apparently has saved the lives of all four. He refused to put up with radio messages when the ship's radio set went out of commission, refused to leave the Azores until it was repaired. They were there about a month. It appeared today that the radio has been salvaged.

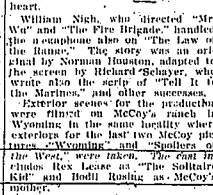
## Many Fast Atlantic Ships Rushing to Aid Flier and Companions

The message was picked up at 4:20 a. m. eastern standard time by the trans-Atlantic liner Fradenka, which relayed it here.

The Franconia's message said: "G-CGAJ is down in western Atlantic position 42 north 41 west. West longitude help, but no immediate danger. Greater Radio and Celtic are handling it."

The position given in the message is approximately 720 miles east-northeast of Horta, Azores Islands, and 850 miles southeast of Cape Ortegal, Newfoundland.

THE VANISHING SPECTER OF THE NEXT WAR.

The gratification of Secretary of State Kellogg as the responses come in on the proposal of the United States to outlaw war, is fully shared by the people of this country of every class. The details of the negotiations have been worked out so ably, apparently, that acquiescence comes from the fourteen countries without stipulation or reservation. It is a scramble to "get on the band wagon" that is indicative of the world's desire to abolish war as a means of international adjustment. It is a tribute to the simple, straightforward statesmanship of this country, that the proposition should be couched in terms so plain and exact, so free of equivocation and possible misconception, that nations less accustomed to such direct methods, find themselves in absolute agreement.

For many years Senator William E. Borah of Idaho has advocated a policy of outlawing war, making it the subject of public addresses in every part of the country he has visited. Doubtless the influential position he occupies as chairman of the Foreign Relations Committee of the Senate has enabled him to exert a marked influence in bringing about the present favorable reaction.

While the present achievement of the State Department, if it culminates as now seems likely, in the signing of the multi-lateral treaty, will mark the greatest human progress ever made through diplomatic channels, the work of the Department is not confined solely to communications abroad.

One phase of the State Department work is of vital importance—the creation at home of enlightened public opinion on matters relating to foreign affairs. It is through newspapers and a corps of trained correspondents they maintain in Washington, that the Secretary of State informs the American people of what is going on in international affairs and points out the interests of all Americans in whatever policy he is seeking to shape.

If the present declaration is able to bring negotiations to a successful conclusion, the entire world will feel that the specter of war has been almost certainly relegated to the limbo of slavery, piracy and other outworn customs of days happily past.

 NEW YORK, August 2.—The next heavyweight champion will come from the ranks, Tex Rickard said after Gene Tunney announced his retirement from the ring.

"The premier promoter at all time believes that the next champion will be some unknown youngster who will outgrow the fame over night. Unless Rickard can uncover some youngster with a punch, the heavyweight elimination tournament which he will stage beginning in September, is likely to prove as much a disappointment as the last tournament which developed Tom Heenan as the challenger for Gene Tunney's title.

"The first step toward clarifying the heavyweight situation was not made by Rickard, but by Humbert J. Pagan, who matched Johnny Risiko of Cleveland with Roberti, himself, the giant Italian, for a 10-round bout at Ebbets Field, Brooklyn, Aug. 16.

Dan J. Dunn, Rickard's manager, holds a grudge against Rickard because Risiko will not accept more compensation for the 1929 title bout, and he may not enter Risiko in Rickard's heavy-weight elimination tournament at all.

"Rickard gave my boy the run around after he whipped Shanley when the best Heenan could do was to get a draw with him," Dunn said.

"The competition is wide open now and I don't see why you should wait on Rickard. Risiko is ready to meet all comers and prove he's the best active heavyweight in the world.

Rickard went on a diabolical trip after Tunney's retirement and will not return to the city until next week. Until that time his plans for the heavy-weight tournament will remain undetermined.

Jack Shanley, the Boston brawler, who knocked out Jack Delaney in 12 rounds in his last important bout, will figure prominently in the tournament. Jess McMahon, Madison Square Garden matchmaker, conferred with Johnny Shanley, Rickard's manager, in Boston yesterday, in an effort to sign the Lithuanian for the first bout of the tournament.

"From a reliable source it was learned that every effort was made to have Tunney meet Shanley in a bout in September, before retiring, but that Tunney would not forsake his plans for touring Europe with 'Theatrum' Winter, the novelty, for such a match.

Tunney is outspoken in his opinion of Shanley and does not hesitate to say that the Boston boxer does not have the courage to become a champion.

### 60,000 Trout to Be Released in Snake From The Hatchery

Approximately 60,000 young trout will be released in the Snake river Sunday from the hatchery of the Southern Idaho Fish and Game Commission, according to W. B. Pringle, who will supervise the transfer.

Work in the station on the Snake river at 7 o'clock Sunday morning and will continue until the trout are safe in their habitat. This will bring the total to 80,000 fish released in the Snake river from the hatchery this year. All of the fish so far will be released just above the camp of the Twin Falls.

The work is to be conducted by the spokesman of Eden, Hamilton and King, assisted by operators of Twin Falls. Others interested and wishing to work are asked to appear at the hatchery at 7 o'clock.

These trout are intended to be used in the work. The Kimberly men have installed a cable at the hatchery where the trout are to be lowered in the water. Three double loaded cars will be lowered at one time and it is believed that a total of 15 to 20 cars of fish can be placed in the water within six minutes after reaching the rim.

The 60,000 young trout will make about 150 cans when loaded. The trout are now all at least three inches high in length, perfectly able to care for themselves in the local waters where they are being placed.

The next distribution of trout from the local hatchery will probably be next Sunday and will be in the Snake river. The trout are being placed in Jackson's lake near the dam in Idaho, perfectly able to care for themselves in a later time, as a test release.

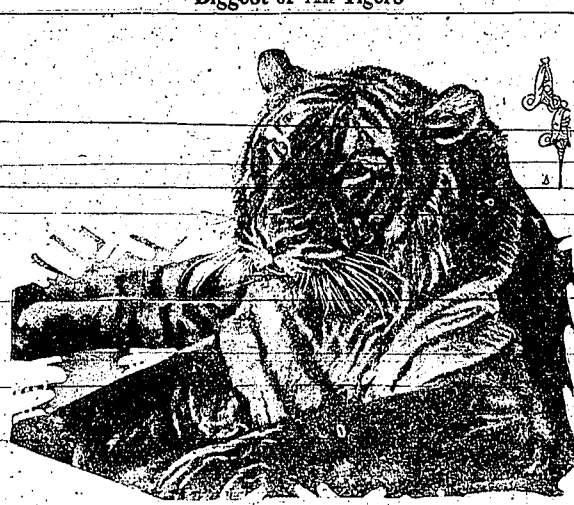
