POLESHIERS ARE OUT OVER ATLANTIC

Old Settlers' Society Congregates at Filer

FOURTH ATTEMPT THIS YEAR AT WESTWARD FLIGHT UNDER WAY BY TWO DARING OFFICERS

Favorable Weather Reports Come From French and United States Bureaus Covering Course Being Followed From Le Bourget Field to Some Point on North American Continent; Aviators Said to Have Sighted Short Distance Off Coast of France Enroute to Azores Islands.

Although the elements have defeated three recent attempts at westward trans-Atlantic flight, another was under way today as the summer flying season reached its peak.

Commander Ramon Franco was forced to turn back earlier this week after starting westward across the Atlantic on the first stage of a trans-Atlantic trip. His plane was damaged and was towed back to Cadix, Spain, this morning.

At Horta, Azores, is Lieut. Paulin Paris, who recently started from Brest on a one-stop flight to the United States. His plane was damaged and his flight now has been called off by the French ministry.

Down in South America Captains Arturo Ferraris and Carlo Delpreto are proceeding from Natal, where they landed after a flight from Rome, to Rio de Janeiro. Their plane was damaged in landing and they are making the trip in a borrowed plane.

Earlier this year Baron Gunther Von Huonofeld, Captain Herman Kool and Major James Fitzmaurice successfully flew across the Atlantic from Ireland, but their forced stop on Greenland Island and were isolated for days before relief arrived.

Captain Walter Hinnichoff and the Hon. Elsie Mackay were lost after attempting a non-stop flight from England to the United States.

The westward crossing was made this year, that of Amelia Earhart, Lindbergh and Lou Gordon.

PARIS, Aug. 3.—At noon today the air ministry reported moderately unfavorable news were prevailing between the French coast and the Azores. It was cloudy but general conditions apparently were favorable, the report added.

First report of the progress of the Polish plane came when the fishing smack Pinguin reported sighting a white airplane, flying seaward, 85 miles off Lorient at 8:15 a. m. The fishermen could not read the lettering, although the plane flew low, Lorient is 220 miles from Le Bourget, so the plane may have been that of the Poles.

Signal stations along the coast reported they had seen nothing of the plane. All said there was fog and that visibility was poor.

Washington Says Weather Fair. WASHINGTON, Aug. 3.—Frequent reports to the United States weather bureau today that the Polish trans-Atlantic fliers would have favorable weather conditions between France and the Azores, and the distance over the middle Atlantic.

A 16-mile southwest wind was reported at the Azores, but conditions were considered "quite good." No storms or fogs were indicated by reports received here.

WHALE CAUGHT FIRE, LANDING ON ROUGH SEA

Captain Wireman and His Companions Were Afloat Twelve Hour Before Being Picked Up by Rescue Ship; Plane Had to Be Abandoned in Mid-ocean.

LONDON, Aug. 3.—Captain Frank T. Courtney, trans-Atlantic flier, rescued at mid-sea yesterday by the steamer Milwaukee, today sent the following communication to the Star:

"We were picked up by the Milwaukee after a terrible experience. Our machine caught fire at midnight at 600 feet and burst in flames on a rough sea."

The Evening News radio said that Courtney, who was abandoned at latitude 42°27 north, longitude 39°02 west, only one minute of longitude from where it was found yesterday.

The Evening Standard quoted Courtney's wife as saying: "We were picked up by the Milwaukee during the night indicating we had been forced down as we were to break off fire on the flying boat. He said he had a very many experience but that there was no need to be as an extremely thankful to know he is safe."

ALWAYS WORKING TOWARD ECONOMY AND EFFICACY.

"My, what a long string of cars!"
Many a passenger on a speeding passenger train or motorist crossing the country by automobile, has made that comment after noting the length of the modern freight train on the great trans-continental or main lines of the principal railways of the country.

It is now common practice to place one hundred freight cars behind the modern locomotive, making a train approximately one mile long while it is nothing out of the ordinary for the huge machines to handle twenty or more passenger coaches, at speeds ranging as high as sixty to seventy miles an hour.

Another development of modern railroading is what is known as "chain-gauging" locomotives. That means that instead of operating a locomotive over only one division and then sending it to the shops for an overhauling, it is continued in service over two or more divisions by many engineers; skilled mechanics having built machines that are capable of standing up under the strain. If a locomotive capable of working twelve or sixteen hours a day is on the line only six or seven hours, it is evident that a large part of its capacity is being wasted. Taking our own Union Pacific as an example, it is said that this practice results in a saving of about thirty per cent in the amount of power required to handle a given amount of business and when it is remembered that a modern locomotive represents an investment of more than \$60,000, it is easy to understand how such a saving can amount into big money, a saving that extends to the roundhouse and the shops at division points.

The railroad game is interesting, no matter from what angle viewed, but particularly so from the standpoint of up-to-date economy.

And in passing The Times has no hesitation in saying that those employed in railway service earn every dollar paid by the roads. It takes brains these days to be a good railroad man and to handle the valuable property entrusted to those who have the welfare of their employers in their hands is say nothing of the safety and comfort of the traveling public and the expeditious handling of freight traffic.

ELECTION TIME AND THOUGHTS CONCERNING TAXATION.

On the other hand a sales tax would, so it is estimated save at least seven-five per cent of this expense and be more just and equitable for the reason that all profits are the result of sales, if not the sale of commodities, at least the sale of service.

THE NAME 'IDAHO'
(Moosey Star-Mirror)
The old question surrounding the word "Idaho" has arisen again with the publication of an article by the writer in the "Spokane Review," both papers seem to cling to the legend that the name "Idaho" was the name of a town in the Nez Perce territory, founded by the name "Idaho." The name has that connection. It has been discovered by historians, but these same historians have the name of Shoshone origin, and that the name "Idaho" was used in California as the name of a settlement and later on the proposed name for the territory of Jefferson, now the state of Colorado, several years before the name was known in the Shoshone river section.

The national consumption of these three products in 1922 was: Fuel oil, 14,153,000 barrels; gasoline, 2,923,000 barrels; kerosene, 37,492,000 barrels. The use of fuel oil and gasoline is rapidly increasing, while the use of kerosene steadily declines. During the first five months of 1923 fuel oil led the way with 1,900,000 barrels compared with an increase of one and one-half per cent in 1922 over 1921. The consumption of gasoline in 1922 gained 13 per cent over the

An important factor in the growth of the consumption of fuel oil is its increasing use for heating dwellings and commercial buildings. During the last three years the quantity of distillate fuel oils required for domestic heating has increased by 50 per cent. 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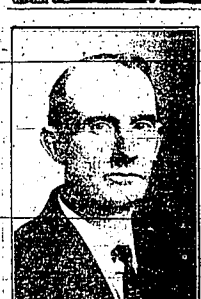

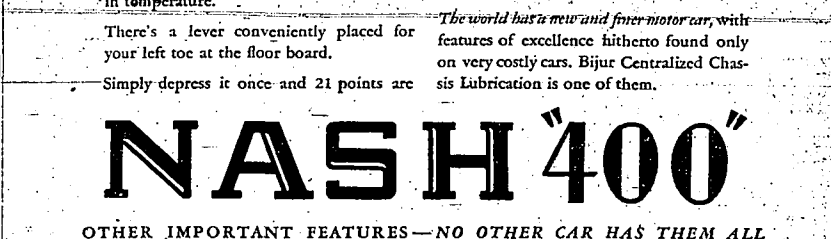

POLISH FLIERS ARE OUT OVER ATLANTIC

Fourth Attempt This Year On Westward Flight Under Way by Two Daring Officers

Favorable Weather Reports Come From French and United States Bureaus Covering Course Being Followed From Le Bourget Field to Some Point on North American Continent; Aviators Said to Have Been Sighted Short Distance Off Coast of France Enroute to Azores Islands.

Although the elements have defeated three recent attempts at trans-Atlantic flight, another was under way today as the summer flying season reached its peak.

The Polish aviators, Majors Louis Isidorkowski and Kasimir Kubala, left Le Bourget Field, Paris, at dawn in an attempt to make a non-stop flight to New York. They are flying by way of the Azores. On the steamer *Minnesota*, heading for New York, are Captains Frank Courtney and Paul Courtney who started from the Azores yesterday on route to Newfoundland. The plane went down at mid-sea.

Commander Ranton Franco was forced to turn back earlier this week after starting westward across the Atlantic on the first stage of a trans-Atlantic trip. His plane was damaged and was forced to land in Spain, this morning.

At Horta, Azores, is Lieut. Paulin Fier, who recently started from Brest on a one-stop flight to the United States. His plane was damaged and his flight now has been called off by the French ministry of marine.

Down in South America, Captains Arturo Ferrarin and Carlo Dolpreti are proceeding from Natal, where they landed after a flight from Rome, to Rio de Janeiro. Their plane was damaged in landing and they are making the trip in a borrowed plane.

Earlier this year Baron Gunther Von Huonfeldt, Captain Herman Roehl and Major James Fitzmaurice successfully flew across the Atlantic from England to New York. Their plane was damaged and was repaired for two days before being re-launched.

First report of the progress of the Polish plane came when the fishing steamer *Pinguin* reported sighting a white airplane, flying about 50 miles off Lorient at 8:15 a. m. The fisherman could not read the letters on the plane. The plane flew low, 200 miles from Le Bourget, so the plane may have been that of the Poles.

Signal stations along the coast reported they had seen nothing of the plane. All said there was fog and that visibility was poor.

WASHINGTON Says Weather Fair. WASHINGTON, Aug. 3.—Frequent reports to the United States that the trans-Atlantic flier would have favorable weather conditions between France and the Azores, a distance over the middle Atlantic.

A 16-mile southwest wind was reported at the Azores today with light clouds. No storms or fogs were indicated by reports received here.

Third Attempt to Year. LE BOURGET FIELD, PARIS, Aug. 3.—The third attempt at a westward flight across the Atlantic this year was under way today with two Polish aviator fliers, Louis Isidorkowski and Kasimir Kubala, at the controls of a powerful *Amiot* plane. It was started from Le Bourget at 6:41 a. m. today (12:41 p. m. eastern standard time) hopeful of flying to New York.

The attempt is backed by the Polish government.

The plane was somewhat sudden. They had been here for several weeks preparing for this flight. They appeared last night at Le Bourget, and today they were ready to start. The plane is a four-engine biplane with a maximum speed of 200 miles an hour and was off at 6:41 a. m. today.

ALWAYS WORKING TOWARD ECONOMY AND EFFICIENCY.

"My, what a long string of cars!" Many a passenger on a speeding passenger train of motorist crossing the country by automobile, has made that comment after noting the length of the modern freight train on the great trans-continental or main lines of the principal railways of the country.

It is now common practice to place one hundred freight cars behind the modern locomotive, making a train approximately one mile long while it is moving out of the ordinary for the huge machines to handle twenty or more passenger coaches at speeds ranging as high as sixty to seventy miles an hour.

Another development of modern railroading is what is known as "chain-ganging" locomotives. That means that instead of operating a locomotive over only one division and then sending it to the shops for an overhauling, it is continued in service over two or more divisions by as many engineers, skilled mechanics having built machines that are capable of standing up under the strain. If a locomotive capable of working twelve or sixteen hours a day is on the line only six or seven hours, it is evident that a large part of its capacity is being wasted. Taking our own Union Pacific as an example, it is said that this practice results in a saving of about thirty per cent in the amount of power required to handle a given amount of business and when it is remembered that a modern locomotive represents an investment of more than \$60,000, it is easy to understand how such a saving can mount into big money, a saving that extends to the roundhouse and the shops at division points.

The railroad game is interesting, no matter from what angle viewed, but particularly so from the standpoint of up-to-date economy. And in passing The Times has no hesitation in saying that those employed in railway service earn every dollar paid by the roads. It takes brains these days to be a good railroad man and to handle the valuable property entrusted to those who have the welfare of their employers in their hands to say nothing of the safety and comfort of the traveling public and the expeditious handling of freight traffic.

ELECTION TIME AND THOUGHTS CONCERNING TAXATION.

The people of the United States, taken as a whole, are a docile lot, possibly easily led or at least loth to take mass initiative.

Proof of this statement is to be found in the fact that ever since the World War we have submitted to the inequities and injustices of income and corporation taxes instead of a direct tax on commodities and more especially luxuries.

Some interest is now being shown in matters of taxation, now that a national election is actually under way and protests are being made in some quarters against the mounting cost of collecting these taxes that are a real burden on the masses, at the same time throttling investment and expansion. It must be remembered that the cost, represented by the salary list of those in the government employ, in one capacity or another, is only an infinitesimal portion of the entire bill of expense. A Washington authority says that the number of expert lawyers, accountants and clerks employed by the government, by corporations and individuals, in figuring out these taxes, is simply astounding if not beyond belief.

On the other hand a sales tax would, so it is estimated, save at least seven-fifty per cent of this expense and be more just and equitable for the reason that all profits are the result of sales, if not the sale of commodities, at least the sale of service.

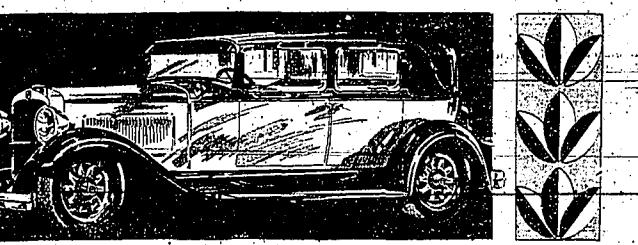

Close upon the launching of these vessels will be the completion of the 10,000-ton White Star liner, the Britannic, now being built by Harland and Wolff...

Plans for the liner will make a challenge for the speed and comfort prestige of the North Atlantic lines. The launching of the new Cunard liner will probably be coincident or nearly so...

All of these new vessels contemplate co-ordinating the latest in trans-Atlantic liner construction knowledge with the latest in development of aerial transportation. Shore-to-ship and ship-to-shore services...

The ordinary liner, it is pointed out, makes 14 round trips a year. It is expected that the new liner they will nearly double this, making at least 28 round trips a year.

Noted engineers who have co-operated in the laying of the plans for this line of ships declare that their high speed, expected to be 32 to 32 1/2 knots an hour, will be maintained throughout the voyage...

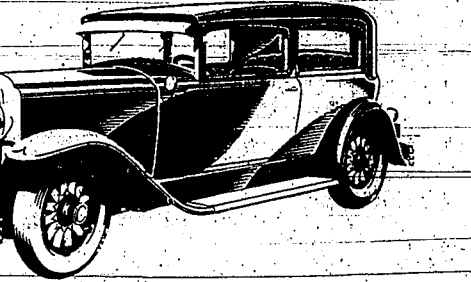
