WILSON HAZELTON FIGHTS DEMOCRATS SEEK FARMER AFTER REPORTED SHORTLY AFTER MIDNIGHT AT SEA

FARM RELIEF MAY BECOME MAJOR ISSUE

Drive is on to Bring Dis-gruntled Agriculturists into Democratic Fold to Help Small Smith's Presidential Vote; Candidate Opposes Equalization

NEW YORK, Aug. 4.—The drive to bring the disgruntled farmer into the Democratic fold and to help Small Smith's presidential vote is on a headlong rush today.

W. A. Harriman, one of the agricultural leaders, speaking yesterday to a group of farmers, said he would attempt to induce other leaders to support Small Smith, the governor, in a drive to give several hours of his time today to a further study of farm relief.

Smith has been informed that there are at least a half million disgruntled farmers in the United States who are not getting the benefit of any agricultural assistance can be held out without using the equalization fee of this State, but which Smith has emphatically rejected.

The opinion is growing that Smith may attempt to make farm relief one of the "major" issues in his campaign for the presidency.

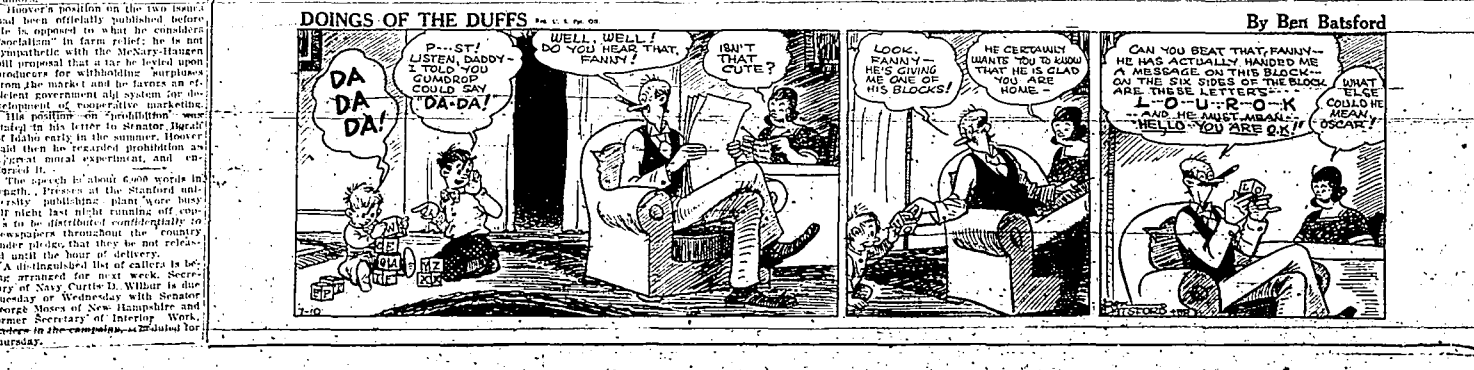

CHAMBER OF COMMERCE REPORT SHOWS OUTSTANDING PROGRESS

Report Shows Highways Have Been Helped Greatly in South Idaho

Outstanding progress is reported by the Chamber of Commerce of Twin Falls along 26 lines of activity in its report that was issued today bringing findings up to August 1.

Some steps have been taken toward improving and adding in the work of highways of south Idaho. Construction of the Nevada highway south of the Nevada line has been secured in the face of much opposition and protest by various highway officials. Work on the final few miles is in progress and the Nevada town and center are working for its completion. That part of the state and devising means to secure standard federal construction.

The local chamber is also working on a compromise agreement with cities in this immediate vicinity to prevent the construction of the American Falls-Hinrichsen-Shoshone-Hill road as a federal highway. Doubts are being placed on the extra expense of the road and the desert character

of the country through which the road would travel as compared with the route westerly and easterly of the Twin Falls country which will attract the tourists. This will mean that construction of the highway between American Falls and Hill which the new road would make.

The Twin Falls-Jordan highway, although in a previous state of bad condition, is being improved and it is hoped that plans will be worked out at once to secure surfacing of the road north of the bridge, which the Hotel, representing the bridge company, arrives here, which is expected in a few days.

The Chamber of Commerce also prepared to the State highway department the plan of the location of the highway south of the Shoshone line as State highway No. 26. Instead of calling it part of U. S. Highway No. 26. Officials are taking the matter up with national authorities to see if the change can be made.

Attention picture publicity for south Idaho has also been obtained by the Chamber of Commerce through the films of the buckarooing country.

The inundation of the foot of Shoshone Falls has also been secured for general news and circulation. A picture of the inundation built of year ago from the bridge is now included in the general advertising film which shows all over the United States.

Figures Show Profits. Figures show that cooperative publicity advertising in newspapers and magazines have brought \$1,000 in queries through the mail in the past three months, making a total of 21,161 inquiries for the year. For the month of June 1, 161 visitors came into the Chamber of Commerce making an approximate estimate of 11,000 people during a year.

The reports of the Chamber of Commerce also shows a large total of writing stories or supplies, of which are furnished for publicity work in newspapers, magazines, journals and encyclopedias, maps and other sources.

Committee of July celebration was in the success. Twin Falls has placed a host in many conventions including the Idaho Business and Professional Women's club, the Postal Employees Idaho State Trap Shooting Club, Bank Officers and Architects and the Western division of Bar Association.

The University of Idaho-Latin American Dairy Special train was well attended at Twin Falls. A United States employment office for farmers has been established here by the government. Up to August 1 of this year 649 men and women have been placed and 2,097 were furnished employment last year by the Chamber of Commerce.

During the past three months 21 solicitors requested "Blue Cards" to operate here but not one was permitted, which saved money and time as a member or solicitor without a Blue Card is not regarded as having the support of the chamber.

The Chamber has urged by letters and resolutions the license of a broadcasting station at Twin Falls, situated above the swimming pool, which participated in the reclamation at Harby, and joined with Boise in requesting that some later center being built by the navy be named in honor of the capital city.

Get Railroad Connection. On June 2 the Western Pacific Reclamation company presented application by the U. S. to construct with the Idaho Pacific at Wells, Nevada. Actual construction started July 29, and is being pushed to completion. This is expected the first favorable decision and the result of many railroad and freight rate hearings and cases before the U. S. C. which the Chamber has assisted in during the past year of activity.

A significant ceremony was held at the occasion of the inundation of Shoshone Falls. Motion pictures were taken at the occasion. Roads in the falls have also been improved.

A concern which has handled farm products for several years from the county in contemplating the location

of a cannery in Twin Falls provided conditions and arrangements are satisfactory. Officials of the cannery have agreed to be here during August and will meet with the Board of Directors of the Chamber and state their plans and requirements.

As Rate Reduced. At a meeting in Boise July 9, at which Sewell S. Wright was in attendance, action was taken to all in lowering freight rates on fruit to a rate of 10 cents per bushel, which is to be before the Interstate Commerce Commission.

The report closes with a quotation of Edward M. Wood, United States Consul-General of Indianapolis, who said: "The Chamber of Commerce of Twin Falls is undoubtedly the most successful among all the projects in the history of irrigation."

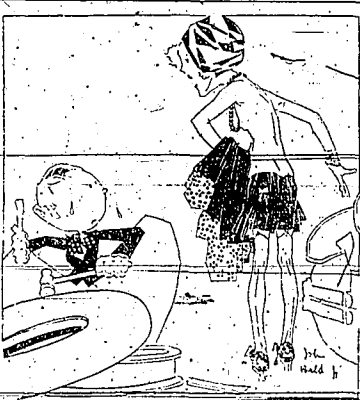

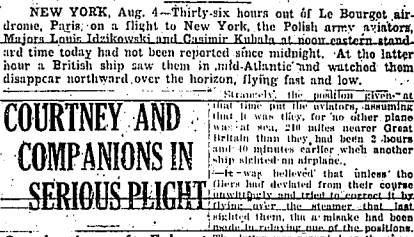

LEGISLATION OF WORLD-WIDE IMPORTANCE

Great Britain's parliament has protogued after a session lasting one hundred and twenty days, said to be the shortest meeting since the World War.
While the session was short, important legislation was enacted, among the principal items being the passage of what is known as the "flapper vote" bill which gives the franchise to women of twenty-one years of age and over.

Still another very vital step taken is the relief of agriculture and industry of local taxation, calculated to encourage a revival of better times in England.
And the Englishman always enjoys his horse racing with a little betting on the side. To this end parliament now permits the use of the pari-mutuel betting system at all race tracks, something that is said will bring in enormous revenues to the government.

And England also proposes to get rid of some of the war debt by the imposition of a tax on gasoline, the levy being fixed at eight cents per gallon.

Evidently English railways are also confronted with keen competition by bus lines and the British government is taking a step that this country may yet have to adopt, namely the taking over and operation of competing bus lines by railroads in the territory involved instead of by private bus companies. It is reasoned that inasmuch as the railroads are heavily taxed to pay a portion of highway construction, the roads should have some reward by being able to reap the benefits of highway passenger and freight traffic.

INTERNATIONAL AGREEMENTS AND RUM RUNNERS.

Strange what effects agreements sometimes have in the shaping of human affairs.

Some time ago officials in the Bahama Islands made a protest against the visit of a United States coast guard vessel which probably was chasing rum runners seeking to land cargo on the Florida coast. The Bahama Islanders put up a howl over invasion of home waters by foreign war vessel, the result of which was that Washington ordered all coast guard vessels to stay away from British waters.

And now, the other side of the picture.
A few days ago a five-masted schooner was wrecked on one of the coral islands of the Bahama group, the ship having more than a score of sailors aboard. A distress call was sent to the coast guard base at Port Lauderdale on the east coast of Florida, asking that a coast guard vessel come to the rescue, but under the ruling from Washington the desired assistance could not be rendered.

Presumably the crew was rescued later by some other means but the incident only goes to show some of the ramifications of prohibition enforcement.

CHAMBER OF COMMERCE REPORT SHOWS OUTSTANDING PROGRESS

Report Shows Highways Have Been Helped Greatly in South Idaho.

Outstanding progress in reported by the chamber of commerce of Twin Falls along 20 lines of activity in the report of that body, issued today following a trip up to America.

Four items have been taken toward improving and adding to the work on highways of south Idaho. Construction of the new highway south of the Nevada line has been secured in the face of much opposition and pressure by various highway officials. Work on the first few miles is in progress and the Nevada taxes and committee are working on improved use of that part of the state and developing a more complete road system.

The local chamber is also working on a compromise agreement with the cities in this immediate vicinity to prevent the construction of the American Falls-Midvale, Shoshone-Rice and road as a federal highway. Applications have been placed on the extra expense of the road and the desert character of

the country through which the road would travel as compared with the fertile valleys which will attract the tourists. This will more than counterbalance the shortening of the Twin Falls road.

Work on Jerome Road, the Twin Falls-Lewiston highway, although in a present state of bad condition, is being improved and it is hoped that plans will be developed at once to secure completion of the road.

The chamber of commerce also proposed to the state highway department the designation of the highway south of Twin Falls as a part of U. S. Highway 30. Officials are taking the matter on a compromise agreement with the cities in this immediate vicinity to prevent the construction of the American Falls-Midvale, Shoshone-Rice and road as a federal highway. Applications have been placed on the extra expense of the road and the desert character of

The illumination of the Shoshone Falls dam also been secured for general news and circulation. A picture of the parachute jump of a man from the bridge is now included in the local advertising that has been shown all over the United States.

Theatres Show Profitably.

Figures show that cooperative publicity advertising in newspapers and magazines have brought 1,500 in profits through the months in the past three months, making a total of \$45,000 reported by the state during the month of June 1, 1924. These figures the Chamber of Commerce, making an approximate percentage of 1,000 people during a year.

250 reports of the Chamber of Commerce also show a large total of without services or supplies. Notes furnished for publicity purposes in newspapers, magazines, journals and encyclopedias maps and directories.

The fourth of July celebration was the success of the Chamber of Commerce in many conventions, including the Idaho Business and Professional Men's club, the Idaho State Fair, the Idaho State-Trip Show, the Regional Bank Directors and Advisors meeting and the recent dinner of the Chamber.

Daily Special Hero.

The Highway Bill, the Union Pacific and the Chamber of Commerce are reported at Twin Falls. A United States employment office has been established here by the government. On August 1, 1924, this year 250 men and women have been placed and 2000 were furnished employment last year by the Chamber of Commerce.

During the past three months 21 petitions requested that corporations operate here but not now permitted, which saved money and time in a matter of solicitor without a business not recorded as having the support of the chamber.

The chamber has urged by letters and resolutions the house of the county station at Twin Falls, studied the new city zoning ordinance, participated in the reclamation at Burley, and about 1000 copies of a pamphlet that some battle cruiser built by this may be named in honor of the capital city.

This is considered the first favorable decision and the result of many railroad and freight rate hearings and cases before the U. S. C. which the chamber has worked in during the past year of activity.

A gigantic ceremony was held at the occasion of the illuminating of Shoshone Falls. Motion pictures were taken of the program. Roads to the falls have also been improved.

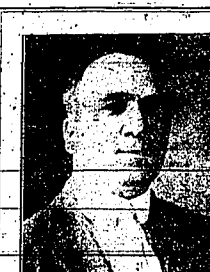


