MEXICAN PRESURE TO RETAIN CALLES
Leaders Urge Alfred Smith to Tour Country

WOULD AMEND CONSTITUTION TO GAIN GOAL

Governors of Mexican States Uniting in Petition Based on Plea That Peace Will Be Assured If Present President Is Continued in Office for Another Term

MEXICO CITY, Aug. 7.—Possibility that Mexico will demand that Plutarco Calles serve two more years as president of the republic appeared stronger today. Governors of all Mexican states this week will receive a petition from Governor Amado Aguirre of the southern district of Lower California, urging that the constitution be amended so as to permit Calles' term of office to run six years. The president's term expires December 31, according to the constitution he cannot succeed himself.

Governor Aguirre's petition will say that Calles is the only person who is fitted to assure peace inasmuch as Gen. Alvaro Obregon, the president-elect, has been assassinated. A similar petition has been voted by the party of Atahualpa Toledo, who Sunday was elected governor of Yucatan. And several agrarian groups have made similar motions in the last fortnight.

Another important angle on the hot Calles will be requested to continue in office is the statement of Amado Aguirre, the Obregon headquarters in the capital will be dismantled. Some quarters interpret this as meaning the Obregonists actually are leaderless with Calles their only hope.

MISSOURI HAS WET-DRY TEST AT PRIMARIES

Reed Backs Anti-Prohibition Candidate for His Seat in Senate.

By United Press ST. LOUIS, Mo., Aug. 7.—The wet-dry test was given with the prohibition issue in Missouri today as voters of the state cast ballots in the biennial primary.

The issue of prohibition was shortly drawn as the most important in Missouri when Reed, on his return from the Houston convention where he had announced his support of the Democratic, unconditional prohibition, publicly espoused the cause of a wet Missouri.

James A. Reed of St. Joseph, Mo., one of Reed's life-long friends and a symbol of the anti-prohibition cause held for years, voted the senior senator's support against Reed's latest political and personal enemy.

"I am in favor of Missouri sending to the Senate another Tom Heflin," Reed declared in a candidly worded statement issued in behalf of Reed's opponent.

Reed's change of policy was the subject of a speech six years ago in a campaign that would have benefited the cause of prohibition.

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Repair Magic Dam Tower Will Begin In Next Few Weeks

According to the Shoshone Journal, directors of the Big Wood Canal company at their regular monthly meeting in Shoshone Wednesday discussed plans for repairing the tower and gates at Magic Dam.

The closing of the present irrigation season, Manager S. T. Howe was authorized to secure estimates on concrete and gravel and other materials for the tower.

Quantities of materials required and the amount of labor necessary will not be known until the reservoir is emptied. The directors, however, look kindly to the recent offer from the United States reclamation service to assist in the work.

Plans for possible reconstruction of the central tower, which became cracked around the base by ice pressure last winter, are expected to be completed by September 2, on which date it is expected that the dam will be emptied. Water is now being set out into water users to the full capacity of the one gate in operation, and will continue to be, though the rate of outflow will naturally decrease with the gradual lowering of the water level in the reservoir.

Though water supply prospects and conditions at Magic dam were both threatening character at the beginning of the irrigation season, actual conditions have developed favorably for users and the present year will be a good one agriculturally.

Two crops of hay were produced through the project, and the prospect for grain in 1929 sections of the country gives promise of a larger yield than in 1927.



LEARNING SOMETHING ABOUT THE STATE IN WHICH WE RESIDE.

Perhaps Idaho folk are not different from residents of other States in the Union in that there is comparatively little personal knowledge of the State in which they reside. That may be why Byron Defenbach, treasurer of the State of Idaho, has been writing some very interesting articles on "The State We Live In." In his most recent contribution to Idaho facts he deals with one of the most weird and famous rivers on the North American continent, "The Snake." He says that nowhere in the world, in territory of equal size, is there to be found a more distinctive and interesting group of streams than that formed by the varied rivers that weave their winding ways across the State of Idaho. And then he adds:

"The site of the great temple in Salt Lake City was once 8500 feet under water, the valley in which a quarter of a million people now live was then a vast inland sea. Its fresh waters found a shallow outlet over what is now the head of Cache Valley, flowing thence through the Portnoy to the stream later known as the "Lewis River," now the Snake. Rainfall decreased as the ages swept by the surface of the lake fell below its outlet, its waters became salt and its molluscan life died out.

There remain to the Snake two principal living sources, one in Idaho, the other in the Yellowstone Park; the latter flowing through Jackson Lake and out of Jackson's Hole through a terrific gash in the Teton Range. These branches unite near the town of Lorenzo at an altitude of 4,800 feet.

The greatest length of the Snake is just under 1,000 miles, four-fifths being in, or on the borders of Idaho. It separates us from Oregon for 100 miles, and from Washington for 80 miles.

From the junction of the two branches to where it leaves the State at Lewiston it falls 4,100 feet, including several abrupt drops. The greatest of these drops is Sho shone Falls, near the city of Twin Falls, which forms one of the most impressive cataraacts in the world. A stream over 900 feet wide falls 210 feet, 46 farther than Niagara.

"Snake River has storage dams at four points, Jackson Lake, Henry's Lake, American Falls and Minidoka. The American Falls dam creates the largest artificial reservoir in the world.

The normal flow of Snake River below Lewiston is about 70,000 cubic feet per second, or 70,000 "second feet." It is navigable for flat bottom steamers up to Lewiston and for smaller power-boats to the mouth of the Grande Ronde, a total of 140 miles. Its outlet at Pasco Washington, is 340 feet above sea level.

Such is the crooked Snake, with its tail in the Tetons its sinuous curves in Idaho, and its mouth at Pasco."

Not only is this information of moment locally but its dissemination is calculated to attract attention to and in crease interest in Idaho wherever it may be read. People who know their State well, its resources, its wealth and its possibilities, make the best citizens because they are an abiding faith in their home community and section, knowing on what its future is based. With regard to Idaho there is so much of an interest and charm that a study of the State must prove a never-ending joy and inspiration.

HUMAN BRAVERY NOT AN ELEMENT IN ATLANTIC FLIGHTS.

It must be evident even to the most casual thinker, that the important element in accomplishing a successful flight across the oceans of the world has not consisted solely of human bravery.

The record of attempted westward flights across the Atlantic bears ample evidence of the truth of this statement. Possibly a score of lives have been lost, lives of men and women who did not hesitate to set out into the unknown, facing grave dangers and never returning to family and friends so that their fate has remained a mystery. The past few days have witnessed numerous attempts of a similar nature, all of which have failed because of some imperfection in the mechanism of the airplanes with the oil supply, the fuel supply, the exhaust of the engine itself; there was something out of true somewhere to foil the ambitions of those engaged in the enterprises.

Therefore it must be apparent that perfection of mechanism has not yet been reached. Flaws have been developed and there is much to be said about the seemingly unnecessary sacrifice of human life, that without these sacrifices these flaws would never have been detected nor their effects demonstrated. It seems entirely too bad that men and women have had to give up their lives in the interest of the progress of aviation but there seems to be an indomitable will actualizing those who are determined to conquer the elements at all hazards.

FAMOUS TILDEN FACES REVERSES IN EIGHT YEARS

Returns in Defeat to Face Charges August 24 on Standing.

NEW YORK, Aug. 7.—Eight years have brought a change in the tennis fortunes of William T. Tilden II, who returns to the United States aboard the Paris tomorrow, facing the possibility of an unfortunate end to his brilliant career on the courts.

Tilden is returning in defeat. The Davis cup team that he picked and coached headed by himself, failed to lift the Davis cup from France, which took the cup from the United States in 1927 after the Americans had held it for seven years.

In addition, Tilden must answer charges on Aug. 24 that were made by the amateur rule of the U. S. Lawn Tennis association, a charge that if upheld will necessitate the withdrawal of Tilden's number one ranking and amateur standing in the United States.

It was eight years ago that Tilden first flashed into tennis prominence. He led the attack on the Australians and New Zealanders who had won America the coveted cup.

From that time Tilden was considered the greatest of living tennis players.

But in 1924 he first started having trouble with the United States Lawn Tennis association. There was a new amateur ruling that players could not receive prize money if they competed. Tilden threatened to withdraw from the Davis cup team. Finally he was permitted to play the United States won.

In the following years Tilden's trouble with the tennis body increased. There were constant arguments over amateur rules and over prize money.

In 1927 Tilden's greatness began to dim. He was beaten for the United States title by René Lacoste. There were speculations he would quit the game forever.

This year, Tilden was picked to head the team against the French. Hardy, announced that Tilden had violated the amateur rule by writing of the Wimbledon match and therefore could not be a member of the Davis cup team. Tilden denied playing back and forth on the subject about the United States Lawn Tennis Association and its officials.

French players protested Tilden's disbarment. They urged he return. Lacoste announced he would defend the United States title and many considered it as a rebuff to the American governing body. Finally the French went to the Amateur French T. Herrick in Paris and it was not until he intervened that Tilden was permitted to play.

Then Tilden called the Meadowbrook club at Southampton that he would enter the tournament running there now. The United States Lawn Tennis Association had consented only that he play at Forest Hills. Samuel Collum, president of the United States Lawn Tennis Association called the club's action in violation of the body would be on Aug. 24, after both the Southampton and East West tournaments, and it was Collum's chairman of the amateur rules committee, said Tilden might decide himself on the propriety of playing back for the national body and whether he was an amateur.

SMOOT SAYS DEMOCRATIC VICTORY WOULD BE INJURIOUS TO BUSINESS

WASHINGTON, Aug. 7.—A warning that a Democratic administration would hurt business was issued here Sunday by Senator Smoot of Utah, chief member of the Senate finance committee.

Repair Magic Dam Tower Will Begin In Next Few Weeks

According to the Yellowstone Journal, directors of the Big Wood Canal company at their regular monthly meeting in Shoshone Wednesday discussed plans for repairing the tower and gates at Magic reservoir following the closing of the present irrigation season. Manager S. T. Beer was authorized to secure estimates on concrete and gravel and on the materials which may be needed.

Quantities of materials required and the amount of labor necessary will not be known until the reservoir is emptied. The directors, however, look likely in the recent offer from engineers of the United States reclamation service to assist in the working out of plans for possible reconstruction or reconstruction of the control tower, which became cracked around the base by ice pressure last winter.

Work at the dam will start shortly after September 15, on which date it is expected that the dam will be emptied. Water is now being run out to winter users in the fall rapidly. LEARNING SOMETHING ABOUT THE STATE IN WHICH WE RESIDE.

Perhaps Idaho folk are not different from residents of other States in the Union in that there is comparatively little personal knowledge of the State in which they reside.

That may be why Byron Deffenbach, treasurer of the State of Idaho, has been writing some very interesting articles on "The State We Live In." In his most recent contribution to Idaho facts he deals with one of the most weird and famous rivers on the North American continent, The Snake. He says that nowhere in the world, in territory of equal size, is there to be found a more distinctive and interesting group of streams than that formed by the varied rivers that weave their winding ways across the State of Idaho. And then he adds:

"The site of the great temple in Salt Lake City was once 850 feet under water, the valley in which a quarter of a million people now live was then a vast inland sea. Its fresh waters found a shallow outlet over what is now the head of Cache Valley, flowing thence through the Portneuf to the stream later known as the 'Lewis River,' now the Snake. Rainfall decreased as the ages swept by the surface of the lake fell below its outlet, its waters became salt and its molluscan life died out.

"There remain to the Snake two principal living sources, one in Idaho, the other in the Yellowstone Park, the latter flowing through Jackson Lake and out of Jackson's Hole through a terrific gash in the Teton Range. These branches unite near the town of Lorenzo at an altitude of 4,800 feet.

"The greatest length of the Snake is just under 1,000 miles, four-fifths being in, or on the borders of Idaho. I separates us from Oregon for 100 miles, and from Washington for 30 miles.

"From the junction of the two branches to where it leaves the State at Lewiston falls 1,400 feet, including several abrupt drops. The greatest of these drops is Shoshone Falls, near the city of Twin Falls, which forms one of the most impressive cataraacts in the world. A stream over 900 feet wide falls 210 feet, 40 farther than Niagara.

"Snake River has storage dams at four points, Jackson Lake, Henry's Lake, American Falls and Mindokta. The American Falls dam creates the largest artificial reservoir in the world.

"The normal flow of Snake River below Lewiston is about 70,000 cubic feet per second, or 70,000 "second feet." It is navigable for flat bottom steamers up to Lewiston and for smaller power-boats to the mouth of the Grande Ronde, a total of 140 miles. Its outlet at Pasco, Washington, is 340 feet above sea level.

"Such is the crooked Snake, with its tail in the Tetons its sinuous curves in Idaho, and its mouth at Pasco."

"Not only is this information of moment locally but its dissemination is calculated to attract attention to and in crease interest in Idaho wherever it may be read. People who know their State well, its resources, its wealth and its possibilities, make the best citizens because they have an abiding faith in their home community and section, knowing on what its future is based. With regard to Idaho there is so much of interest and charm that a study of the State must prove a never-ending joy and inspiration.

HUMAN BRAVERY NOT AN ELEMENT IN ATLANTIC FLIGHTS.

It must be evident even to the most casual thinker, that the important element in accomplishing a successful flight across the oceans of the world has not consisted solely of human bravery.

The record of attempted westward flights across the Atlantic bears ample evidence of the truth of this statement. Possibly a score of lives have been lost, lives of men and women who did not hesitate to set out into the unknown, facing grave dangers and never returning to family and friends so that their fate has remained a mystery. The past few days have witnessed numerous attempts of a similar nature, all of which have failed because of some imperfection in the mechanism of the airplanes that were being flown. Either something went wrong with the oil supply, the fuel supply, the exhaust or the engine itself; there was something out of true somewhere to foil the ambitions of those engaged in the enterprises.

Therefore it must be apparent that perfection of mechanism has not yet been reached. Flaws have been developed and there is this much to be said about the seemingly unnecessary sacrifice of human life, that without these sacrifices these flaws would never have been detected nor their effects demonstrated. It seems entirely too bad that men and women have had to give up their lives in the interest of the progress of aviation but there seems to be an indomitable determination in those who are determined to conquer the elements at all hazards.



COUNCIL NAMES MAYOR BOBIER AS INSPECTOR

Adequate Records of Building to Be Kept by Clerk and Inspector.

An ordinance was passed by the city commissioners last evening establishing the office of building inspector. Mayor H. K. Bobier, was duly appointed to the position.

Each additional job is necessary may be required by the commissioners. It was necessary to have the building inspector serve without salary as it was desired that the mayor take the position temporarily and to continue to give for a number of the council to accept any from the city other than his regular salary, which is established by a state law. Bobier agreed to accept the responsibility for a time at least, until the zoning ordinance is definitely established. From then on the inspector's job will be largely a matter of visit and another inspector will probably be appointed.

The city will also establish an adequate system of records of the operation of the ordinance. Captain Crowley, city attorney, told the commissioners that it was absolutely necessary to keep adequate records of the regulation would be a failure.

Records will be kept of all buildings now used for non-conforming uses. The owners of these buildings are required to make a showing within a certain length of time which they desire to continue in that manner under zoning ordinance. If the permitting continued non-conforming use will be issued by the building inspector. Buildings requiring building permits under the zoning ordinance will be required to submit a plan showing the location of the proposed building on its site and place this plan on file with the application for the permit. The street along the New school and the Golden rule addition must be 40 feet it was agreed upon last evening that zoning ordinance will be submitted to the city council. Fred Harter, assistant city auditor, asked for an estimate of the cost of the building permit. He stated that the zoning ordinance showed a discrepancy in the width of the avenue, New School and Golden rule additions calling for 30 foot streets and the street along the Blue Lakes addition being 40 feet wide. The zoning ordinance requires that all streets except Main avenue must be 40 feet wide.

Permitting permits were granted to Kate Gott for rebuilding a house at a cost of \$200; to Carl L. Hater to erect a 12x24 garage on the corner of 3rd and Main east at a cost of \$400; and to J. W. Wood for the erection of a 14x20 building on 3rd Main east at a cost of \$400.

FOUR SEQUELS YET TO COME IN OIL CASES

Teapot Dome Actions May Not Be Finally Ended For Three Years.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 7.—Four court developments in the famous Teapot Dome case are expected to continue for at least three years, according to a statement by Secretary of Interior Albert Fall in 1922.

It is likely that some of the cases will be appealed to the United States supreme court, and they may not be finally ended, with jail, or freedom for the principals, for two or three years.

The case of Columbia court of appeals, meeting here October 1, after its summer recess, is expected to be the first to be decided. The chief justice's appeal from a three-month jail sentence imposed for contempt of court is expected to be decided in the next few days.

Contempt Appeal Put Off

Then the case is expected to be heard in early November, in expected to be the last of the Teapot Dome cases.

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WELLS MAY BE MILE FROM NEW ROUTE TO ELY

Latest Survey Through Nevada of Twin Falls Highway Makes Cut.

Prospectivity that the Nevada portion of the Twin Falls to Ely section of the Yosemite to Yellowstone highway will pass Wells by a mile, as tentatively planned by the state highway department, was made a vigorous protest.

The protest, in last week's issue, said that the proposed Twin Falls-Ely highway through the Snake river valley, near Wells, by nearly one mile was known to a Herald reporter.

The highway would cross the city of Wells, crossing over the main line and numerous sidetracks of the Southern Pacific railroad on F street. The old survey called for a grade crossing at this point, or any other type of crossing there would be out of the question.

In an interview with Mr. Glock yesterday he stated that his party came here this week with orders to make a new survey of the city, where the highway would cross the S. P. tracks with an overcrossing, and three orders are now being followed.

Mr. Glock was asked if he was certain that this latter survey would be the definite route and he replied that he was not certain on this point, but expected that it would, as he would think the state would put a better highway through the city, and they would have to make a dangerous grade crossing over the railroad.

If the highway is finally constructed a mile out of Wells this city will lose thousands of dollars in tourist trade, as that would otherwise be in the city to get if the highway were allowed through the city. It is understood that a number of business men of the city are planning to take the matter up with proper officials and see if some change in the plans can be made, whereby the road will come through town.

LARGEST SHIPS OF AIR NEARLY FIT FOR TESTS

R-100 and R-101, Accommodating 100 Passengers, Almost Completed.

LONDON, Aug. 7.—The two largest ships in the world are nearing completion in England. At Howland, Yorkshire, the R-100 has progressed far enough for parliamentarians and visiting dignitaries to make inspections and take on her spacious promenade deck. Test flights are scheduled for the end of the month. The type of ship, it rapidly being completed, is a dirigible.

The ships are being built to carry 100 passengers and 100 tons of cargo. They will be used for transatlantic service, and will be able to fly from London to New York in 10 days.
