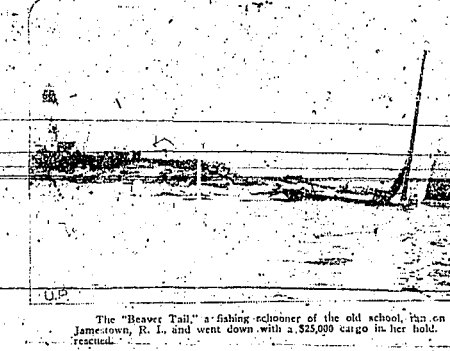

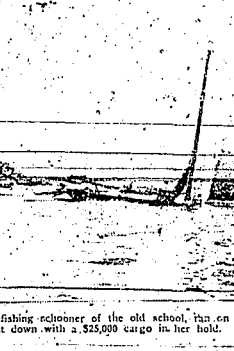

REDUCTION OF POWER RATES IS ANNOUNCED

Idaho Power Company Makes Important Announcement.

The top steps of residence and commercial lighting schedules of the Idaho Power company are each reduced by 9 cents a kilowatt hour according to a schedule filed Tuesday by the company with the Idaho Public Utilities Commission at Boise. The new rates will become effective with the September billings which are mailed to customers after the 1st.

The "top steps" refer to the highest steps in each schedule, officials of the company said. The adjustment in business conditions and the growth of the territory served by the company, with the elimination of many classes of service which were furnished at less than cost, have made the reduction possible, it is stated in the commission pointed out.

But is in line with policy.

Officials said that the reduction were in line with a policy of the company to cut rates from time to time as conditions warranted for those users paying the highest rates.

The Idaho Power company now supplies electric service over 4200 kilometers in southern Idaho and southern Oregon.

14,331 miles of residential, habitation and 2,431 commercial and industrial lines, each of whom will benefit by this reduction in rates.

Service is furnished to a total of 82 communities in southern Idaho and eastern Oregon; of which 41 are incorporated and 41 are unincorporated.

The Idaho Power company is now carrying on an extensive development program of rural electrification. In the first six months of 1928-1929, millions of rural distribution lines have been installed, bringing the total number of miles of rural distribution lines to 1025. In this same period 1170 new rural customers have been added to the lines. The company has a total of 6281 rural customers, of whom 4325 are living on farms.

Idaho Exhibition.

The Idaho Power Company has recently completed a program of rural electrification on the Snake River flat that involves an expenditure of approximately \$100,000. The total of additional new rural lines is somewhat more than 100 miles in this territory.

The added service to rural farms and ranches that heretofore have not had the benefit of electric power and light service.

WINNIFORD, Ariz., Aug. 5.—Mining operations are under way to explore and determine the actual content of the giant "harrier" meteorite of northern Arizona known as "Iron Mountain" and which is estimated to weigh ten million tons and is believed to contain iron and nickel.

The Harrier meteorite, 22 miles from Winslow, created a crater a mile across and approximately 1000 feet deep when it came down some 40,000 years ago. It displaced some million tons of rock in the impact.

The crater thus created has been the center of scientific and geological interest for 50 years and for the past 25 years various geologists have tried to reach the crater's edge in order to determine its contents.

The work has been carried on principally by D. M. Barringer, Philadelphia geologist, for whom the meteorite was named.

Barringer finally located the main body 1.256 feet from the south rim of the crater. Tests showed it to be approximately 100 feet in diameter, 22 feet in diameter, various spots, iron, 7 per cent nickel, 2 ounces platinum and 4 ounces iridium per ton.

Estimated in our report \$200,000,000. The main body is estimated to weigh 10,000,000 tons, and the metal content is worth approximately \$50,000,000.

Actual mining operations just started under the direction of Barringer and J. Edgar Hoover of the United States Geological Survey. The enterprise is being conducted by Barringer and Hoover, after spending over \$100,000.

Barringer, however, has stated with sufficient expertise in bringing in the funds and establishing a company to carry on the mining.

The attempt this time will proceed with more data and directness than any of his previous ones.

The most valuable mineral found in the diannium-iron meteorite is iridium, worth \$250 an ounce.

The Harrier meteorite is the largest of the only three Siderite meteorites remaining from the earth found on earth. The other two are the Cape York meteorite, weighing 57 tons, discovered by a student body and now in the New York Museum of Natural History, and the Lac Seul meteorite found near Lac Seul, Quebec, the other of the other Siderites contained platinum or iridium.

Dear Sirs:

We have your application for filing with your Commission Idaho Power Company's Schedules nos. 1, 2 and 3 covering Residence, Lighting and Commercial Lighting respectively, under which the top steps of the Residence and Commercial Lighting Schedules are each reduced from 9 cents to 8 cents per kilowatt hour. These new rates are to become effective with all bills rendered on or after October 1, 1928, or upon such other date as your Commission may designate.

On July 1, 1927, Combination Rate Schedules, under which Lighting and Cooking or Water Heating Service were supplied through one meter, gave those customers using these services the benefit of an optional rate effecting in nearly all instances a substantial reduction in cost, as the average rate of charge to all customers supplied under these schedules for the year ending July 1, 1928, was 2.9 cents per kilowatt hour.

In October last, the maximum rate for Residence Lighting was reduced from 10 cents to 9 cents per kilowatt hour.

On June 1st of this year a new schedule for Street Lighting service, representing an average reduction of 12 1/2 per cent, was made effective.

As expressed to your Commission at various times by its representatives, the policy and hope of the Company has been that such reductions could be made from time to time, as conditions warranted, for those users paying the highest rates.

The material improvement in business conditions and growth of the territory we serve, together with the elimination of those former rates under which service was furnished at less than cost, and operating economies which have been effected, have made these reductions possible.
