REPUBLICANS LOOK UPON HOOVER AS IDEAL CANDIDATE TO BREAK INTO THE HISTORIC 'SOLID SOUTH'

Editor's Note: Following is the fourth of a series of Tilled Press articles dealing with the political situation in the South governing out of the candidacy of Governor Smith.

Republicans believe they have in Herbert Hoover an ideal candidate for an attempt to break into the South.

Hoover has not been a strong partisan. He is not identified closely with the old Republican machine. Politicians in the South who do not count on his support, but who have been of pronounced political coloring as an attraction to the so-called independent voters and those Democrats of the South who do not lean strongly toward Smith.

This election in the Kansas City convention charged that Hoover did not know in 1920 whether he was a Republican or Democrat. They charged that over and over, he came out in the Democratic ball in Michigan in that year, and he won both the Democratic and Republican primaries in that State. There was a movement to place his name on the Georgia platform, but he was not in 1920, but this was checked.

Associated With Wilson
Hoover was close to President Woodrow Wilson during the war. His name of the war president is still one in conjuncture with the voters. Republicans strategists, while they can say nothing about this fact, it is a source of strength to the South among those who do not favor Smith.

It is with that background, which makes Hoover a name of respect toward him, that Herbert Hoover, South before the voters in the South. Republicans will not emphasize this plume of Hoover's past history. They do not wish to speak for him, but on account of this and because of other phases of his career which they will emphasize, they regard Hoover as the "strong" candidate they could carry before Southern voters.

They will make a positive pro-Hoover campaign. They will not devote any attention openly to attacks on Smith, leaving to Southern "fire" Democrats in the fire, but serious fire they already are directing against the Democratic candidate on account of his previous record and his former association with Tammany.

This can best be explained by silence.

Main Republican Issues
1. Hoover's record as director of Mississippi flood relief.

2. Hoover's efforts on behalf of business through the department of commerce.

3. Hoover's record as a humanitarian in relief work in Belgium and Russia.

They also make a special campaign among women, capitalizing the fact that they say they find him among the female voters. They will capitalize, negatively, the opposition toward Smith among the "dry" women and their organizations. They will present Hoover as a militant "dry" to the women.

Hoover, himself, in his acceptance speech, emphasized that his campaign was on efficient government and finally toward "happy homes."

Interesting The Women
The home will be stressed by his campaigners and especially among the women voters. He will be given credit for inspiring many reforms in domestic conveniences for the housewife. The campaign will be carried into the housewife's domain, into the kitchen, the pantry and the nursery. He has participated in child health organizations and Mrs. Hoover has worked for years with the Girl Scout movement.

Hoover's work as an industrial efficiency expert will be translated into terms in raising the American standard of living. His campaigners will explain that steps taken by Hoover at his suggestion to reduce waste will inevitably reduce costs of production and make the article cheaper to the ultimate consumer.

This talk will be directed at the home and likewise to the business man. Hoover has made many friends among business men in the South as in other parts of the country. Frequently he has called attention to the natural resources of the South with predictions of the wealth which

will flow from their future development.

The humanitarian work in Belgium and Russia also directed on food conservation during the war when he pleased the themselves by a direct appeal to them that save their money in the scheme of winning the war, all this will be stressed in the campaign to win votes among the Southern women.

Hoover's most recent entry into the South as director of Mississippi flood relief will be a factor in the campaign. He was highly praised in the South for his work and was additional friends there. Many people who opposed his help will not vote for him for president, of course, though reports from some areas of the devastation flood are very good.

Of interest to a large number of residents of this section is the announcement that the Jerome cooperative, which is offering, five creamery that it is offering, five prizes totaling \$50 in cash and in addition, some of the famous Jerome for the best slogan submitted to it before September 10.

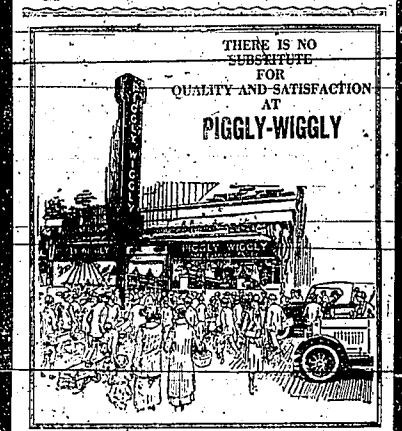

ROCKFORD PLANE FOR STOCKHOLM Carolinas And Georgia Swept By Floods

HASSEL AND CRAMER MAKE START TODAY

Two Daring-Aviators—Get Away on First Leg of An Aerial Trip That They Hope Will Take Them to Europe by Way of Greenland—Sighted This Morning Enroute.

ROCKFORD, Ill., Aug. 16.—(U.P.) J. J. Hassel, pilot of the Stinson-Detroler monoplane, "Greater Rockford," in an attempt to make the first crossing of the Atlantic from the mid-west, left the United States and passed into Canadian waters.

Hassel, who left here at 6:45 a. m. today, flew over White Sulphur Springs, N. D., and then to radio advice received here and a few minutes later was over eastern Ontario.

Sighted Over Sturgeon Bay, ROCKFORD, Ill., Aug. 16.—The monoplane "Greater Rockford," carrying J. J. Hassel and Parker D. Cramer, navigators, left here today in their monoplane, "The Greater Rockford," on a three-stop flight to Stockholm, Sweden.

Rising gracefully from Rockford airport, the huge blue and yellow craft, the most feasible airplane between the United States and Europe, began the long journey at 6:45 a. m. The plane will follow a semi-circular route, touching the waste lands of Canada making stops at Cochrane, Ont., Moncton, N. B., and Halifax, N. S.

It carried 200 gallons of fuel for its first leg of the flight, a distance of 750 miles.

Hassel and Cramer made a previous start for Sweden, but after 15 minutes of flying the heavy load plane was unable to gain altitude, and it crashed in a corn field.

To Make Three Flights.
This time it is to start with a lighter load of gasoline and make the flight with three stops instead of one to avoid possibility of another crash.

The trip to Stockholm will be 3,725 nautical miles long, but the longest water jump, that from Norway to the coast of Sweden, is only 516 miles. Backers of the flight contend this time, because of the weather and practicality, will be the one eventually adopted by establishers of regular trans-Atlantic passenger service.

The "Greater Rockford" is equipped with radio and expects to keep in touch with land and ship stations throughout its flight. Its transmitter operates on a 3.5 meter wave length and does the call "WJL."

Weather reports today indicated Hassel and Cramer would encounter ideal flying conditions over Canada.

The date of their arrival in Stockholm will depend on the weather. The weather continues favorable, the fliers said. If it remains good through the trip, they will make only overnight stops.

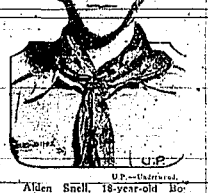

ANOTHER ELECTION IMPROVEMENT POSSIBLE

Diverging as we have from the initial idea of the government founders, of the functions of the electoral college, there seems little indeed to warrant its perpetuation as a part of electoral machinery in the choice of the president and vice-president. Although the fiction is still maintained, the action of the presidential electors has come to be an empty formula, scarcely even regarded as a news item. It would seem that there is left little logic or reason for its continuance.

In the Convention that formed the Constitution, the original scheme for electing the president was through the two houses of Congress. This plan was favored by eight States with but two in opposition. Subsequent voting brought the vote six to three, with one delegation favoring a separate body formed for the purpose—the beginning of the electoral college idea, which was finally adopted as a compromise measure, as so many of the Constitutional provisions were. Being unable to agree on the manner in which these electors should be chosen, the delegates agreed that the several States should determine their manner for themselves.

This is uniformly confined to the people of the State; who in reality vote directly for their choice for chief executive. At the time of the adoption of the Constitution, no one favored the direct vote of the people in this highly important matter. It was designed that the people would choose for presidential electors, men of wisdom and experience who would possess the necessary discernment requisite to so complicated an investigation. No senator, representative or other person holding a position of trust or profit in the country might become a member of the body. To prevent the segregation of voting privilege, the electors should be of the same number as the representation in Congress, and both aspirants for the high office to be filled might not be from the same State.

Now but little attention is given to the fitness of the men who are chosen for the office of elector, since they have no independent duties to perform. Their votes are cast according to the mandate of the party to which they belong. Legally they are in no wise bound by this popular expression, but it would be a bold spirit indeed who would run counter to it.

When any office becomes so perfunctory in its operation, there seems little argument indeed for its existence. With the constant encroachment of the more direct action in every phase of governmental administration, the electoral college is one of the superfluous institutions due to be lopped off.

GROWTH OF IDAHO REVEALED BY ACTUAL FIGURES.

Thanks to a Western news agency, figures are available and are being widely quoted, showing what progress Idaho has made agriculturally and industrially within the last three or four years.

There is truth in the statement of the agency that States progress is indicated not only by what it produces and sells but by what it buys so that a comparison of purchases made by residents of Idaho in 1927 with those made in 1924 would go to show that the State has increased in population and has widened its market for its staple things of every day life.

Structural steel received at cities and towns in southern Idaho in 1924 amounted to 1524 tons; in 1927 the tonnage was 6485.

Furniture received at these points in 1924 amounted to 591 tons and in 1927 to 1838 tons.

Flour and mill products received in 1924 totaled 17,940 tons and in 1927 the total was 23,417.

Lumber, shingles and lath in 1924 amounted to 48,875 tons and in 1927 to 71,321.

Agricultural implements shipped in 1924 weighed 3278 tons while three years later the tonnage was 8929.

Gasoline and kerosene shipments in 1927 were 70,905 tons and in 1927 they were 107,914 tons.

Salt imported in 1924, 11,104 tons; in 1927, 15,084.

Corn in 1924, 492,020; in 1927, 553,880 tons.

Fresh and cured meats and packing house products shipped in 1924 totaled 1893 tons. In 1927 these shipments were 2987 tons.

Fruits and vegetable packages purchased in 1924 totaled 1401 tons while three years later the total was 7573 tons.

Numerous other commodities coming into southern Idaho have increased in similar proportions in the past few years.

The steadily larger and more widespread distribution of Idaho products in recent years has meant a corresponding advance in the purchases of Idaho people and in their standards of living.

SURVEY INCOMES STATES GIVEN BY IDAHO STATE CHAMBER COMMERCE

BOISE, Aug. 15.—One of the important comprehensive surveys ever undertaken by Idaho's State government, including the comparative study of the States of the country, has just been completed by the Idaho State Chamber of Commerce. It will be presented for the committee's consideration and recommendations when the Idaho State Chamber of Commerce meets in its bi-monthly session of the Western States Taxpayers' conference which opens this morning at 10 o'clock and tomorrow. This committee will formulate a tax program which will be submitted to the membership of the chamber for consideration.

The work of the survey has been carried on under the direction of Charles E. Thomas, secretary, and George H. Mulliken, chief of the department of Idaho, made the compilation.

Official auditors' reports for 1926 and 1927 from 35 States of the nation are the basis for the survey which involves the 1926-1927 figures for the government by 56,713,539 people living in the 35 States. The average income of these States is \$109,531,014. Each year the Idaho State Chamber of Commerce receives by \$300,000,000 in general property tax for State government.

For convenience the States were separated into groups of geographical divisions and Idaho falls into the group known as the "Mountain States." The States of this group are Montana, Idaho, Utah, New Mexico, Arizona, Oklahoma, Texas, Nevada, and Colorado.

On the other hand New York, with its 13,204,000 people and an assessed valuation of \$1,200,000,000, raises over \$100,000,000 annually for State purposes by a tax on general property.

According to Mr. Mulliken's compilation the 35 States have a total of 35 different sources of revenue, including general property taxes, inheritance taxes, and other various sources of State government. The various sources of revenue for Idaho are the amount they raise annually follow:

General property tax, \$1,039,566; insurance companies' tax and fees, \$15,642; insurance companies' premiums, \$142,000; other insurance fees, \$1,000; express companies, \$7,385; corporation license tax, \$4,622; incorporation fees and tax, \$21,616; miscellaneous license fees, \$24,512; inheritance tax, \$15,692; occupational tax, \$10,000; transportation and motor vehicle license tax, \$12,000; auto license tax, \$15,000; automobile tax, \$10,000; fish and game license tax, \$10,000; and station and livestock tax, \$10,000.

Under the classification, "Miscellaneous license fees," are included a special compilation showing the different classes and kinds of license fees, used by the 35 States. The source of income for Idaho is \$1,039,566, approximately \$25,000 from this source.

Inheritance Tax Revenue. Practically all States have inheritance tax laws. Nebraska and Alabama being the exceptions in the 35 States under survey. In the wealthier States the inheritance tax is a source of income. For instance, New York collects more than \$200,000,000 from this source while Pennsylvania collects \$17,000,000. California collects over \$7,000,000 yearly from inheritance taxes. In the Mountain States Idaho, with its \$15,692 from this source, is next in the lowest in the division.

Nebraska's collections amount to \$1,641,919, Wyoming \$49,485, Colorado \$100,000, New Mexico \$234,000, Arizona \$121,610, and Utah \$294,969.

Three States, Iowa, Louisiana and Nebraska, derive income from a tobacco sales tax which returns each approximately \$1,000,000 a year. Five other States, Ohio, the two Dakotas, Arkansas and Utah, impose cigarette taxes. This tax returns \$1,000,000, North Dakota \$27,818, South Dakota \$20,000, Arkansas \$52,823, and Utah \$127,823.

All States have an auto license tax.
