Gobel and Tucker Span Continent

Last Word From Hassell-Gramer Sunday Morning

Grave Fears Entertained For Safety Two Aviators Who Should Have Landed at the Mount Evans Airport in Greenland Late Sunday Afternoon on Second Hop.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 20.—Operation of the Hassell-Gramer expedition in the search for Bert Hassell and Parker Gramer, lost American fliers, was asked today by the State Department.

JULIANEHAAB, Greenland, Aug. 20.—Lost in a daring attempt to establish a new northern route, Bert Hassell and Parker Gramer were 18 hours overdue this morning on their flight from Cooks Bay, Ont., to Mount Evans, Greenland.

Not a word has been received from their airplane, the Greater Crackler, since early Sunday morning when Hassell reported by wireless that his plane was over Davis strait and had started over the coast of Labrador about an hour earlier, according to Hassell. He was reported to be over Apikamian lake in northern Quebec.

The two fliers had expected to reach Mount Evans within 18 hours after they left Cooks Bay. They were overdue by an hour at that time. A few minutes after noon Saturday and radio reports showed good progress was made in reaching Greenland.

From the lake there was a difficult flying course in front of the two fliers. The terrain was rugged and rocky. The wind was strong and the visibility was poor.

As hour by hour passed without word of the fliers, fears were expressed that the European flight had injured two more men to death.

Aviator Dies From Plane Crash Injury

ALAMOGADO, Cal., Aug. 20.—A "stunt" aviator, Oakland commercial aviator, died at 6 a. m. today from injuries suffered in an airplane crash near Alamogado last night. The plane was piloted by Mrs. Louisa McPherrigan Thaden. It was at an altitude of 500 feet when the motor died. The plane went into a side spin and crashed.

The fliers suffered fractured skulls and other injuries. Mrs. Thaden was married five weeks ago to R. V. Thaden, vice president of the Thaden Aircraft Corporation.

BOMB THROWN INTO WET INQUIRY

NEW YORK, Aug. 20.—District Attorney Charles H. Tuttle brought an abrupt halt to the wholesale questioning by the federal grand jury of prominent night club patrons. The report was made by American investigators in the flooded region. Forty thousand lives were made homeless, the estimate said.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 20.—The murder of Henry C. Schmitt, an American mining engineer, in Trinidad, state of Durango, Mexico, was reported by the State Department today by Consul William L. Jackson at Torreon. According to Jackson's telegram, Schmitt was attacked and killed Saturday by two unidentified persons at Traylor mine, Trinidad, 40 miles southwest of Torreon.

DENTISTS MEET TODAY IN 70TH GREAT SESSION

Several Foreign Nations Represented at Minneapolis Convention.

MINNEAPOLIS, Aug. 20.—Approximately 10,000 dentists from every section of the United States and from foreign countries gathered today for the 70th annual dental convention of the American Dental Association and its allied organizations. Specialists in every phase of dentistry convened at the municipal auditorium and were divided into three groups for the discussion of the latest modern problems of the profession. The subjects to be given major attention include the relation of dentistry to the general health of the body, prevention of dental disorders and the relation of the jaw and minor glandular function to the health.

Twenty-eight scientific sections covering the entire field of modern dentistry, complicated arrangements for holding the scientific presentations of the convention will be given by Dr. Charles H. Mayo, Rochester, Minn., and Owen Wesley, president of the University of Wisconsin.

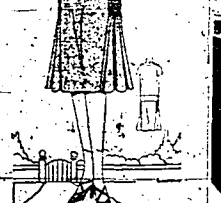

HOW MANY RESIDENTS OF IDAHO
REALLY KNOW THEIR STATE?

Patriotic folk often give the advice, "See America
First."
Patriotic Idaho folk might well urge: "See Idaho
First."
It is undoubtedly a fact that comparatively few resi-
dents of this State really know what lies beyond the bor-
ders of their beaten paths. Residents of South Idaho
know more or less about the Snake River valley, but it is
amazing to know how few have visited that marvelous
national park, The Craters of the Moon, or have pen-
etrated beyond Galena Summit in the Sawtooth range. The
Goose Creek mountains lie at your southern door, yet per-
haps not one in a thousand has ever climbed the sides of
Goose Creek to obtain "the marvelous panorama of the
Snake River valley which spreads out before one's eyes."
A strong pair of field glasses brings to view a dozen towns
and villages along the valley, Rupert, Burley, Hazelton,
Eden, Jerome, Twin Falls, Filer, Blinn, Hollister, Roge-
son among others. And at this season of the year irrigat-
ed areas both north and south of the Snake appear as
brilliant patches of green, affording the picture that once
seen, will always be remembered.
All this leads to special reference to a letter written
by Patrick Gibbons to the Lewiston Tribune in which
the writer calls attention to Idaho's natural resources and
its beauty spots.
There is so much of informative value in this letter that
we make no apologies for appending herewith these ex-
cerpts that are worth reading and remembering:
"The commonwealth is filled to its capacity in this
land where plenty reigns, with its vast timber resources
that are known only in part and are now being linked up
by the railroads which will, in time, form a chain to all
parts of those mountain fastnesses that have been a bar-
rier to the early settlement of the State.
"The time is ripe to develop those latent sources of
wealth that will place this land where the progress of man-
kind has undue difficulties to overcome; but time is cre-
ating a passage in those highways that lead on to where
the raw material can be garnered, to be converted into
commercial products.
"Modern means of transportation form one of the
most potent sources of wealth that this State can secure,
leading to both factories and the mines; also to the thou-
sands of industries and activities in which man has em-
barked his energies. The stability and value of the latter
properties are largely dependent upon the virility, also
the efficiency of those transportation agencies that now
seem assured to the State. Those highways of the State,
let them be railroads, or trunk-line auto roads, will have
the same result in bringing people together for their per-
sonal advancement, which is the essence of progress and
prosperity.
"We find that today the sandstones of the Swallow's
Nest are being furnished to put up a building at Moscow,
Idaho; that will be a masterpiece of its kind. This sand-
stone comes from Asotin county, in the southeastern part
of the State of Washington, along the Snake river. Many
fine buildings of Lewiston are built from this sandstone,
which has durability and is also monumentally handsome
is of a rich brown color and is widely distributed along
the valley of the Snake river, also along the Clearwater
river.
"The finest of mottled blue marbles are in close prox-
imity. Their gravity is 2070, which is the very highest
rating on this valuable stone. We have the gray granite,
protruding from the upper hills, also the red granite, wait-
ing for the mechanic to turn this beautiful stone into some
commodity. The coal will be forthcoming, but it is al-
ways necessary to seek, if you shall find.
"The geology of the State is of vital interest to the peo-
ple that are bound to make this land their home, because
from the toilers will always come the masters. Work has
been the heir of progress. Destiny paves the way. The
hands that toil will mould the future, as well as the past.
The light of hope is an easement to the heart."

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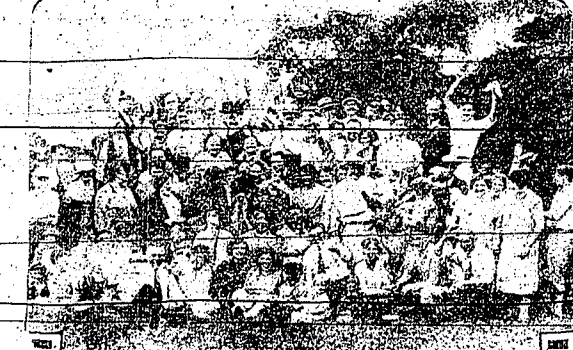

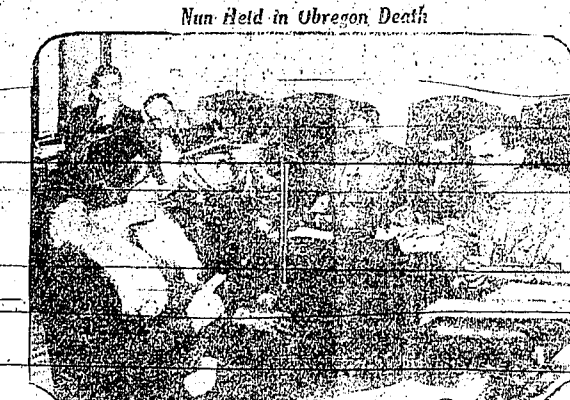

LIONEL DEAN ARRIVES HERE IN AIRPLANE EARLY THIS MORNING

Piloted by James L. Tate, the Landing is Made at 9:25 at Landing Field.

Lionel Dean arrived in Twin Falls this morning at 9:25 in his first... four-hour flight from Rock Springs, Wyoming, where he and his pilot, James L. Tate, spent the night. They left Rock Springs at 9:25 this morning.

The airplane was forced to alight when the wind for some time blowing having about a 60 mile an hour speed... and continues the advance of the plane down to about 60 miles in land.

The airplane is a biplane with a capacity of two passengers besides the pilot, said Mr. Dean. It has a Standard V8 motor of 220 horsepower.

His cruising speed is between 100 and 105 miles an hour with a top speed of 120 miles. At the moment the plane here from Colorado Springs, where Mr. Dean went to meet his pilot and get the plane.

When they arrived this morning the two men flew the plane over the city of Twin Falls and made a circle around the landing field one mile east on the Kimberly road. The machine was placed in the hangar at Rock Springs. A large number of people have been going to the field this morning to see the ship, many being in line for a drop of the hangar to get a glimpse. Some inquired as to when they could take a ride in the plane.

Mr. Dean has with him as pilot James J. Tate. Mr. Tate has made more than 4000 flights in the plane. Charles A. Lindbergh. He states that he has been in the air 3400 hours. He started flying during the year 1913 and has been in the flying ever since. He has been an instructor in the Thompson-Thompson flying school at Salt Lake for some time, having held that position to Jim with Mr. Dean. He will remain in the plane with Mr. Tate until he can learn the art of flying in the air as soon as possible.

Mr. Tate is rated as a splendid pilot, one who can make a plane do anything any plane has ever been made to do.

Just at present the plane will be used for carrying passengers to a mountain trip to far points, said Mr. Dean. The first passenger trips will be made. The prices will be \$5 for a couple of days and \$10 for a week. Mr. Dean this morning, there will be no trip for less than \$10. Mr. Dean also stated that he had received the distributing agency for the Eaglerock plane, which was built in Colorado Springs, he said, and has the agreement all started to sell. At present there will be no student instruction given, said Mr. Dean. "Later on, I will give the best of the express purpose of giving flying lessons, but shall not use this plane for that purpose." This was the only note of Mr. Tate.

IDAHO'S GROSS BONDED DEBT OF \$5,367,000 MEANS A PER CAPITA OBLIGATION TO AMOUNT OF \$10.05

NEW YORK, Aug. 20.—Idaho has a gross bonded debt of \$5,367,000, which means that every resident owes \$10.05. In gross debt the State ranks 25th among the States of the Union, but in per capita it ranks 27th.

These facts are brought out in a nationwide survey just completed by the Bank of America, S. A. of New York, which reveals that the forty-eight State governments of the United States have a total gross bonded debt of \$1,571,254,167.25, or a per capita debt of \$16.63.

The survey also shows that the States have not been increasing debt, with certain exceptions. The survey shows that 16 States actually reduced their gross outstanding debt during the past year and that 26 States or 52 per cent were responsible for the increase of more than \$125,000,000 during that same period.

In a study of the purposes for which the States have incurred this huge indebtedness, the Bank of America statisticians found that construction of highways and bridges was responsible for \$900,930,781.92. Comparison with previous surveys made by the bank shows highway construction absorbing an increasingly larger amount of money raised by bond issues.

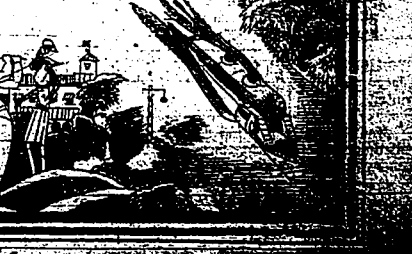
