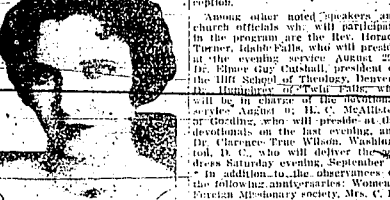

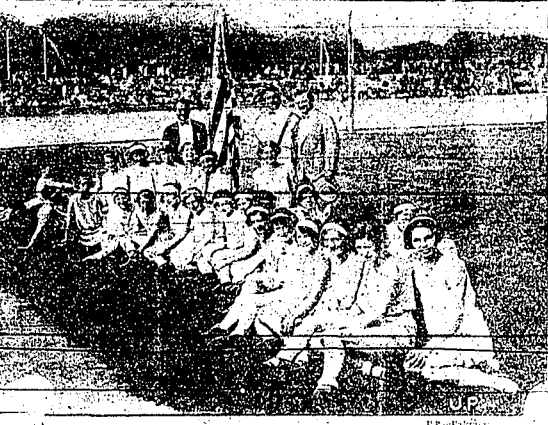

WE ARE ABOUT TO GET THE OTHER SIDE OF THE QUESTION.

The big "third act" of the 1928 campaign drama will play to millions tomorrow evening. Act one was Herbert Hoover's acceptance speech, formally introducing the Republican candidate for President of the United States to the voters of the country. Act two was the notification given Senator Charles Curtis at Topeka, that he is the Republican choice for vice-president. And now comes the third and probably the most spectacular of all; certainly the stellar role to be played at Albany tomorrow evening by the Governor of New York Alfred E. Smith, who will compel public interest and attention as no other political event has done to date.

Because the Democratic candidate's words will be weighed carefully against Herbert Hoover's utterances at Palo Alto, the acceptance speech of Governor Smith may be regarded as a climax to the early campaign.

Yet still another "big scene" was staged today when Herbert Hoover gave the farmers of West Branch, Iowa, additional information on how he plans to solve the farmers' problems if elected Chief Executive of this great nation.

The week holds other important developments. Hoover will return to Washington to take personal charge of his national drive for votes. Smith will hold informal conferences with Democratic national committeemen. Observers expect him to lay plans for provoking Hoover into expanding his previous utterances on prohibition and power development.

On the power issue, Democrats described as "vague" Hoover's announcement at Los Angeles that he favors "the greatest reservoir and the highest dam at Boulder Canyon that the engineers will recommend," but Senator Johnson and Representative Swing of California interpreted him as supporting the Swing-Johnson Boulder Dam bill.

Senator Curtis, in his acceptance speech, did not refer to the "power issue" but he went further than Hoover on prohibition. He said he "opposed the repeal of the 18th amendment or of the Volstead act," while Hoover merely said he "was not in favor of repealing the 18th amendment."

Senatorial and press comment on Curtis' speech divided itself along party lines, with few exceptions. Senator Bruce, Democrat, Maryland, said while Curtis was "an amiable, kindly man," his speech merely "dittoed" Hoover's.

AS THE ELECTION CAMPAIGN GETS UNDER WAY.

Stranged to say, Wall Street does not seem to be one bit alarmed over the general-business situation which is admittedly much better than even the most optimistic Wall Streeters earlier in the year said it would be.

In a summary of the past week's financial situation, Henry Clews & Company calls attention to the fact that before the end of this present month there will be turned loose in the neighborhood of \$331,000,000 in dividends and interest payments which vast amount of cash will probably find almost immediate re-investment in stocks and bonds, thus assuring a liberal supply of funds in the purchase of issues that are steadily climbing to unheard-of heights.

Then too, the vast supply of staples such as cotton and grains assured for this coming autumn season, means that the farmers and growers are to enjoy extensive buying power while these bumper crops also mean that the railroads will find their facilities taxed to handle the crop movement. It is further amazing to learn that the volume of railroad traffic for the week of August 4, as revealed through carloading reports, was actually larger than for the corresponding period of 1927.

United States Steel shows a splendid volume of orders while copper continues in strong demand. Generally speaking, metals and industrials are more than holding their own and all this in the face of the fact that this is a presidential year and that the campaign may be said to be well under way.

THE BRITISH SETTLEMENT MOVEMENT.

(Christian Science Monitor)
The Lord Mayor of Manchester has just opened the new theater of the British Settlement of that city, which is the largest of its kind. 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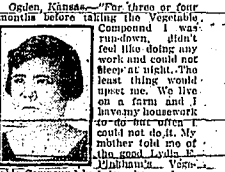

LACK OF EFFECTIVE LEADERSHIP GREATEST HANDICAP TO BOLT OF SOUTHERN DEMOCRATS FOR HOOVER

The following is the first article in the series by Thomas A. Stokes, United Press correspondent, dealing with political conditions in the South resulting from the presidential candidacy of Governor Smith.

The "Bolt Smith" movement in the South is noisy activity, but scattered. Small groups have organized, but are not being drawn together under any leadership.

Given a viable, forceful leader who had the attraction of a William Jennings Bryan, the movement might become cohesive and effective. No such leader has appeared. Southern Democrats who are organizing for Governor Smith say that none will appear and predict the movement will drift toward extinction and do little real damage.

Others are not so sure when they see the fires from the small camps picked about the horizon. The bolt forces are directed largely by party ministers and there is a virginal fervor about their activities. There is an opinion in the ranks that the considerable influence among their groups.

These camps along the principal streets in Montgomery, Ala., have hung signs on their department store fronts.

Such symbols of feeling have caused some uneasiness among the Democrats, but organization leaders there are working vigorously to eliminate a defect in the party. The State will be all right before the election though Republicans will poll many votes.

Newspaper Man's View
One newspaper editor who has lived in the South and Florida for many years has been in touch with the situation throughout the South over many years and has reached the conclusion that the present anti-Smith activity.

Many of these anti-Smith efforts to find themselves. I think most of them will get it out of their heads before election and will go to the Democratic fold.

He does not see how Herbert Hoover can win in the States in the old South.

Largely directed in an active way by the United Church people, the movement lacks leaders of political significance. This will handicap political leaders with their machine organizations co-operating, possess an organized and efficient staff.

Canon a Leader
Most active in the campaign against Smith is Bishop James Cannon, Jr., of Richmond, Va., Southern Methodist Church. He is the prime mover to date. He started by organizing the Asheville conference of day church leaders and is extending his activities to other parts of the South, with headquarters in Florida. He makes speeches and issues statements, and already has convinced many working with national leaders.

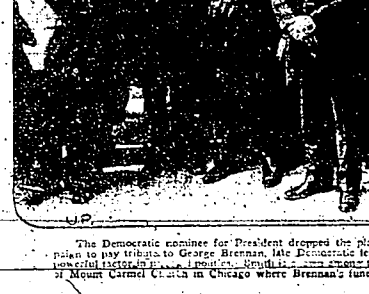

IDAHO BEHIND IN TAX REFORM

Tendency Is Toward Budgeting for Local and State States Mr. Wight.

There is a striking tendency among the Western states in working out and more toward the budget system in both state and local taxation plans, said Newell S. Wight, secretary of the Chamber of Commerce in talking of the taxpayers' conference in Boise, which he has attended.

The addresses of the conference are to be compiled and printed to be placed in the hands of all the delegates who attended the conference and all interested organizations, he said. A tax committee of the State Chamber of Commerce is working on a plan for proper legislation and will include in this program any suggestions offered by the conference through its executive committee, he already made certain suggestions for the program.

Early in September a meeting of delegates will be held in Boise to draft a plan of suggested changes in the state constitution. The tentative program has been made.

A study of the reforms and changes that have taken place in Western states along tax reform in the last few years should aid our state in making a plan, said Mr. Wight. "The changes necessary are difficult to arrange under the present conditions of the state constitution," he added.

Mr. Wight recently underwent a serious operation on the taxation problem and is now quieting down with his program. He is believed to have made the model or ideal taxation plan, said Mr. Wight. Under the present constitution the state is not free to make a budget system. This budget is strictly adopted to.

Mr. Wight stated that the conference was an educational one and of extreme benefit to taxpayers if the state is to make a budget system. He has started action to modify and better the system.

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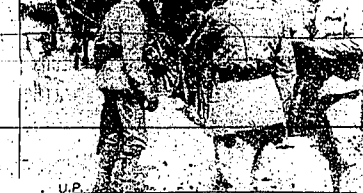

WE ARE ABOUT TO GET THE OTHER SIDE OF THE QUESTION

The big "third act" of the 1928 campaign drama will play to millions tomorrow evening.

Act one was Herbert Hoover's acceptance speech, formally introducing the Republican candidate for President of the United States to the voters of the country. Act two was the notification given Senator Charles Curtis at Topeka, that he is the Republican choice for vice-president. And now comes the third and probably the most spectacular of all, certainly the stellar role to be played at Albany tomorrow evening by the Governor of New York, Alfred E. Smith, will compel public interest and attention as no other political event has done to date.

Because the Democratic candidate's words will be weighed carefully against Herbert Hoover's utterances at Palo Alto, the acceptance speech of Governor Smith may be regarded as a climax to the early campaign.

Yet still another "big scene" was staged today when Herbert Hoover gave the farmers of West Branch, Iowa, additional information on how he plans to solve the farmers' problems if elected Chief Executive of this great nation.

The week holds other important developments. Hoover will return to Washington to take personal charge of his national drive for votes. Smith will hold informal conferences with Democratic national committee. Observers expect him to lay plans for proying Hoover into expanding his previous utterances on prohibition and power development.

On the power issue, Democrats described as "vague" Hoover's announcement at Los Angeles that he favors "the greatest reservoir and the highest dam at Boulder Canyon that the engineers will recommend," but Senator Johnson and Representative Swing of California interpreted him as supporting the Swing-Johnson Boulder Dam bill.

Senator Curtis, in his acceptance speech, did not refer to the "power issue" but he went further than Hoover on prohibition. He said he "opposed the repeal of the 18th amendment or of the Volstead act," while Hoover merely said he "was not in favor of repealing the 18th amendment."

Senatorial and press comment on Curtis' speech divided itself along party lines, with few exceptions. Senator Bryce, Democrat, Maryland, said while Curtis was "an amiable, kindly man," his speech merely "dittod" Hoover's.

Senator Smoot of Utah and Jones of Washington, Republicans, saw Curtis' speech as a safe, sane and conservative statement of party aims.

AS THE ELECTION CAMPAIGN GETS UNDER WAY

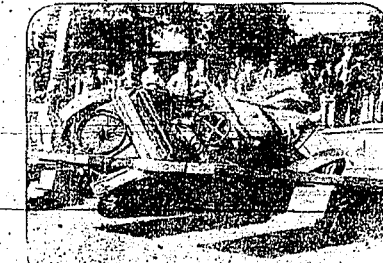

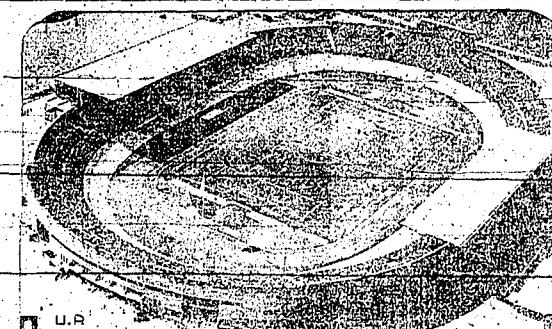
