Just after Babe Ruth had finished taking four straight games from the Pittsburgh Pirates last fall in the world series, newspaper editors of the nation began clicking but tales that dubbed the Yankee the greatest ball player of our time.

Literary boppers showered at the feet of Babe Ruth and Miller Huggins and all members of the team came in for a share of the praise. It was the Babe who reaped the lion's share of the glory.

It probably will be that way no longer. Ruth's right field and keeps hitting his homers. His remarkable baseball feats are overshadowed by some of the greatest baseball players who ever stepped on the diamond.

Bob Meusel is a star and has been for years, but because his name is a trifle less than that of Ruth, he receives scant attention when baseball men gather to win and lose pennants at the Hot Stove league.

**Meusel Is a Star**

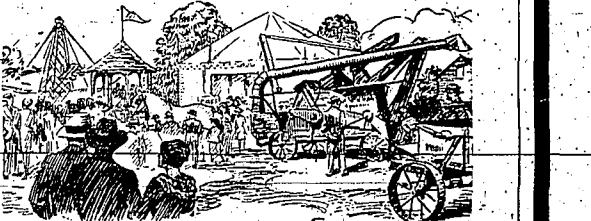

Gehrig hit a hit above his head last year and for a time threatened Ruth's supremacy as King of Clout. He had his fiery personality publicity then and got the fat contract for this year. But now that Lou has settled down to his normal pace, Ruth again reigns supreme.

His injuries this year have not prevented Tony Lattin from being a tulwar for the Yankees on both offense and attack. The second baseman is hitting at a .460 clip and will still be finding his position with all the old wizardry. Lattin is the spark plug of the Yankee infield; he provides the dash and fire that makes it one of the strongest teams in the American league.

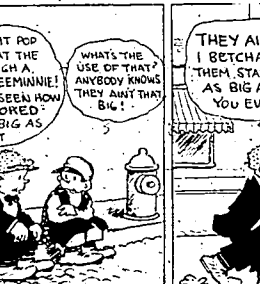
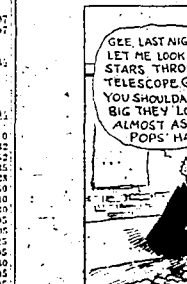
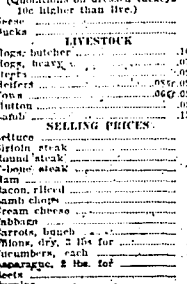
