# ROCKFORD GREENLAND

## Sighted Late Sunday As It Passed East

Entire Population Small Village Plainly Saw Airplane And Members Of Crew Who Were Using Field Glasses In Inspection Of Countryside, According To An Announcement Today By Governor South Greenland; Motor Boats Are Engaged In Hope Of Locating Hassell And Cramer.

MILANESKAB, Greenland, Aug. 23—A plane believed to have been the Greater Rockford was seen late Sunday passing over the village of Fiskenesset, the governor of South Greenland announced today. A message from the governor received at the radio station here said there was no doubt about the plane having passed, as it was seen by the entire population of Fiskenesset and the neighboring village of Lichtenfels.

The natives could see the crew very clearly, the governor said. They were looking over the side of the plane searching the countryside with field glasses.

Motor boats from Godthaab and Fiskenesset were sent out to search for the plane, the governor advised.

## SMITH ON WAY TO JERSEY TO OPEN CAMPAIGN

After Brief Tour of That State Will Swing Back to New York.

ALBANY, N. Y., Aug. 23—Governor Alfred E. Smith's office today kept busy today opening thousands of letters which poured into the executive mansion and into the capital, congratulating the Democratic nominee upon his speech of acceptance last night.

The nominee arose late today, preparing to leave for New York about 10 o'clock. He traveled in the private car of William F. Kenney, accompanying the governor were Mrs. Smith, Kenney, James J. Herndon, Senator Key Pittman of Nevada and Mrs. Pittman, Alfred E. Smith, Jr., Arthur Smith and Joseph Smith.

Senator Robinson of Arkansas, Smith's running mate, left here today in his private car for Little Rock, Arkansas, where he will be notified formally August 30.

ALBANY, N. Y., Aug. 23—Governor Alfred E. Smith turned his face definitely toward the grueling campaign for the presidency, with his inauguration before the people in a three-day address that brought high praise today from his political associates.

The address delivered last night in the small assembly chamber of the Capitol, where he began his political career 23 years ago, has revealed the mammoth celebration planned for the park before the Capitol building.

When he comes to New York, he left Albany early this afternoon for a trip through New Jersey and then to his own State, both regarded as doubtful territory.

From that time on the Democratic nominee will spend much of his time in campaign traveling.

## Editorial Comment On Smith's Acceptance Speech

New York (Morning World): The New York press has been so full of praise for Governor Smith's address, and then, such as to reveal Mr. Hoover's, that the Smith address sounds very much less like a political speech than does Hoover's. The "voice" of Governor Smith's address is that of a man who knows the sure of his own head, talking over this and that, but in earnestly trying to speak his mind.

New York Times: Whatever the Governor Smith may have effected by his speech of acceptance, he has by it presented unquestionably to the country a vivid impression of a strong and vibrant personality. Governor Smith states his position on prohibition with the utmost frankness and with great plainness of speech.

Philadelphia Enquirer: These who had been looking for original ideas and detailed plans (reg. Al Smith in his acceptance address must be disappointed. He talks under the old advantage of having to speak after Herbert Hoover has so ably covered the field of public affairs.

Washington, D. C., Post: Governor Smith's address in endorsing "work out a solution of the liquor problem that will meet with wishes of Americans and do away with the evils that have grown up under the present system. His proposal for far in advance of any other yet made by a responsible leader.

Baltimore Sun: The speech disclosed a letter and in the arrival in the arena of big politics of the first genuine Democratic candidate for the presidency in the United States since Woodrow Wilson. The first proposal for liberalization of the liquor act is sound.

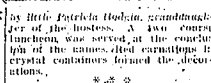

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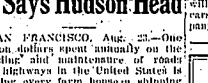

CONGRESSMAN ADDISON T. SMITH GIVES IMPRESSION OF SPEECH

Congressman Addison T. Smith, in commenting on Governor Z. Smith's acceptance speech, yesterday, had this to say to a representative of The Times this morning: "Governor Smith's position on farm relief must be made absolutely clear to the farming interests as he offers an effective remedy which is not arbitrary operating. The Department of Agriculture has been active in extending cooperatively marketing, and further encouragement of farm exports, as recommendations would always result in more delay. What is needed is action during the next Congress on information and data already available. "The Governor's recommendation is equally unpropitious than the one which he reviewed, which would mean in the light of experience with Democratic administrations that hundreds of articles may not be admitted for review. The American farmer needs a higher tariff on agricultural and dairy products imported from foreign countries to protect his home market. "The Governor's recommendation that each State should repeal the archaic code of beverages and make the laws affecting its sale would limit the operation of the Eighteenth as well as all other provisions of the Constitution in those States where the legislature was not clear and would bring chaos and confusion, and undermine our institutions. The Federal Constitution must be applied and be operative in each and every State alike if the stability and safety of our Republic is to continue."

Fifteen Hundred Farmers Are Sure Hoover's Success

CEDAR RAPIDS, Ia., Aug. 23.—Fifteen hundred farmers, delegates from 25 States in the Midwest, today on the side porch of the home where he is guest, shook hands with him and assured him of their States' support in electing Hoover. Hoover received them all, instead of the delegations of 25, as originally arranged. "Between the handshaking ceremony Hoover conducted with three old friends by his home administration, Charles G. Brown, Eugene Smith and O. C. Houston of Missouri, also received a representation from the Iowa Association of Engineers and a delegation representing Iowa labor organizations. Senator James H. Watson of Indiana, who caught Hoover for the nomination, called upon him and told him election was assured. Watson will open the Iowa Republican drive with a speech tonight at the Memorial auditorium. Hoover was to head his train for Washington at 4:30 p. m. central time.

Butler Has Good Word For Smith's View Prohibition

I., Aug. 23.—Dr. Nicholas Murray Butler, who recently attacked Herbert Hoover's prohibition policy, today said that Governor Smith's prohibition policy was "frank, constructive and forward-looking." "Of course the governor's viewpoint is a strictly in-house one," Dr. Butler, president of Columbia University, and a Republican, said. "On all three points—prohibition, immigration and foreign policy, the governor speaks with no uncertain sound. So one can mistake what he means or what he will aim to do if elected. His treatment of prohibition is frank, constructive and forward-looking."

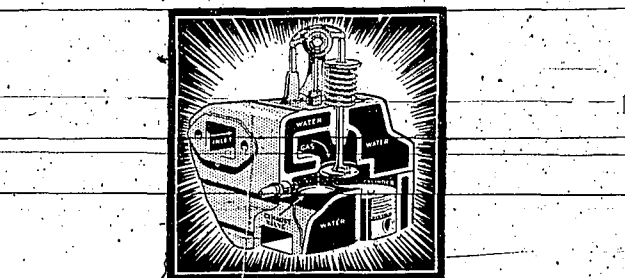

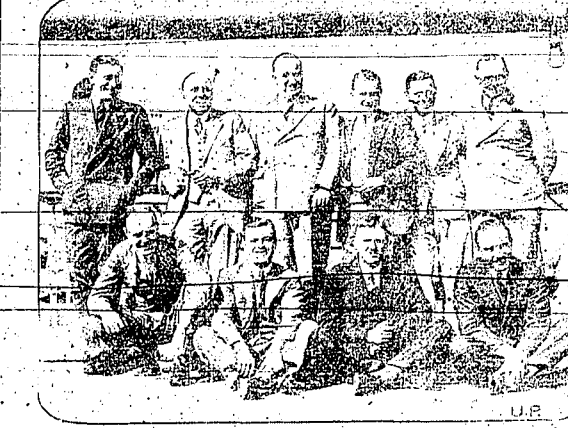

NEGRO FOLLOWING QUESTIONABLE AS TO ITS VALUE TO REPUBLICAN PARTY, UNITED PRESS DISCOVERS

Editor's Note: Following is the sixth of a series of United Press articles by Thomas L. Stokes dealing with the political situation in the South brought about by the candidacy of Governor Smith.

The participation in negro leaders in Southern Republican organizations, some of whom now are under fire for their conduct, may be the decisive factor in leading the South Southward for Governor Alfred E. Smith, according to reports gathered by the United Press.

Democrats, at least, are planning to make the most of recent revelations in connection with the Republican organizations in some cases are split because of recognition by national Democratic committee members and Democratic editors are explaining that the recent cancellations of the justice department investigations in Georgia and Mississippi showed that white postmaster and postoffice inspectors paid to pay tribute to negro Republican leaders to hold their jobs.

The action followed the Senate committee's investigation in Georgia, Congress being in adjournment. However, the justice department investigation in Mississippi, instigated by Mrs. Mabel Whittaker, assistant attorney general, and Hoover's denials as an assistant attorney general in Washington.

Hoover gives credit for ousting Howard and forcing it out of office better toward the Republican candidates since the negro was indicted for obstructing federal justice and dismissed from the justice department.

Some political skepticism is attached to the fact that the crime of Howard and the others had been cleared up until after the November election. But the case is making the usual court record.

There are prospects of investigations later by the Senate committee, perhaps not until after the November election, and then by the House committee. It is known, however, has been informed of federal offices in both these States. This brings four States into the domain of alleged investigations.

Beyond these developments tending to discredit the Republican leaders, there are actual splits in the Republican organizations in two Southern States, Kentucky and Tennessee, which will weaken the Republican campaign.

Negro and white factions are battling now for control of the Republican organization in Tennessee. R. R. (Bob) Church, leader of the negro organization, has been recognized by the national party. He led a successful fight at Kansas City to have his delegates seated over those of the "dry" faction.

Should the fight between Church and the white faction continue until the election, Church's error in judgment, success would be greatly lessened. Own Tennessee political observer reports that negroes of the majority would carry Tennessee until Church and his delegation were seated at Kansas City. Church has been a power in Republican politics, not only in Tennessee but throughout the South.

How Tennessee goes in November may depend on what, if anything, happens in Chicago. It is believed, according to United Press reports from Tennessee, that a substantial victory in Mississippi between Perry Howard and a candidate led by George W. (Bud) Shuford, former governor of Nebraska, Sheldon and his followers, would mean the defeat of the latter. This fight in Mississippi is being planned to carry their fight into the next year.

Howard and his group have been in power in Mississippi for many years. Three of the negro national committee members, H. L. R. B. (Bob) Church, A. M. Redwood and E. I. Patton, were indicted with him for obstructing justice in Mississippi. Each faction has submitted a list of presidential electors to be elected in Mississippi.

The fact over a dozen negro voters has assumed the proportions of a party split. If this split in the grand jury becomes but a party split, it is expected to solidify white opposition to negro influence in Mississippi. It is expected to solidify white opposition to negro influence in Mississippi.

How serious an obstacle Republicans consider the negro party candidate in the South will depend on how they can clean up the Mississippi situation and in Postmaster General Clegg's investigation of the justice department in Mississippi, instigated by Mrs. Mabel Whittaker, assistant attorney general, and Hoover's denials as an assistant attorney general in Washington.

A boy of 16 has been given a new start here, following work by the juvenile court. He had served a period of several months. The boy's name headed back to Los Angeles to be arrested by a patrolman. He was arrested and lodged. The boy was turned over to the juvenile officer but he was not in the juvenile ward because he had consented to tell his friends he had run away from home.

He has his right name and told how he had run away from his Los Angeles home because he had stolen some candy bars and was afraid of being apprehended. He was returned to the juvenile court and then placed in a reformatory school for stealing money and for being a truist. The boy escaped from the reformatory and was taken back to the country, finally being taken into custody in Twin Falls. He said that during his stay in the reformatory he had stolen a pair of tennis shoes.

BEAN GROWERS URGED TO HOLD NET WEIGHT OF BEANS GROWN HERE.

Should Demand \$6 Per Cwt. THE POLITICAL BATTLE IS NOW ON IN DEADLY EARNEST.

With the acceptance speech of Alfred E. Smith, governor of the great State of New York, Democratic nominee for the office of President of the United States was a matter of history, the political campaign of 1928 may be said to be definitely under way.

Unquestionably the program mapped out by the Democratic nominee will create tremendous interest throughout the country. The governor says he believes in bringing back the government as close to the people as possible. He naturally deals with such issues as the tariff, farm relief, foreign relations, efficiency in government, limitation of armaments, agriculture, marketing and distribution, inland waterways, Mississippi flood prevention, public utilities, conservation of natural resources with special emphasis on public ownership and control of waterpower, labor problems, immigration and other activities of government.

But that which will probably be of the greatest interest to the greatest number of people is his proposed solution of the liquor evil.

Governor Smith deserves credit for coming out into the open with a clear and frank statement of what he would like to do if elected president. He takes the attitude that operation of the Volstead act has been the most demoralizing influence in our social and economic life that has been in evidence in many years. He says that he realizes that the President of the United States has two constitutional duties with respect to prohibition. The first, as he puts it, is embodied in his oath of office to preserve and protect the Constitution of the United States. The other duty is to "recommend to the Congress such measures as he shall judge necessary and expedient." He insists that the Wets and Drys in this country represent a cross section of our national life and are not circumscribed by rules of party allegiance. He stamps the operation of the Volstead act as a miserable failure and his remedy is Restoration of State Rights. He would urge an amendment to the present federal law giving a scientific definition of the alcoholic content of an intoxicating beverage, allowing each State to fix its own standard of alcoholic content which, however, should not exceed the maximum fixed by Congress.

And then he gives expression to what he considers the real solution of the liquor evil, which he says:

"The remedy, as I have stated, is the fearless application of Jeffersonian principles. Jefferson and his followers foresaw the complex activities of this great, widespread country. They knew in rural sparsely settled districts people would develop different desires and customs from those in densely populated sections and that if we were to be a nation united on truly national matters, there had to be a differentiation in local laws to allow for different local habits. It was for this reason that the Democratic platform of 1884 announced, 'We oppose summary laws which vex the citizens and interfere with individual liberty,' and it was for this reason that Woodrow Wilson vetoed the Volstead Act.

"In accordance with this Democratic principle, some immediate relief would come from an amendment to the Volstead Law giving a scientific definition of the alcoholic content of an intoxicating beverage. The present definition is admittedly inaccurate and unscientific. Each State would then be allowed to fix its own standard of alcoholic content, subject always to the proviso that that standard could not exceed the maximum fixed by the Congress.

"I believe moreover that there should be submitted to the people the question of some change in the provisions of the 18th Amendment. Certainly, no one foresaw when the amendment was ratified the conditions which exist today of bootlegging, corruption and open violation of the law in all parts of the country. The people themselves should after this eight years of trial, be permitted to say whether existing conditions should be rectified. I personally believe in an amendment in the 18th Amendment which would give to each individual State itself only after approval by a referendum popular vote of its people the right wholly within its borders to import, manufacture or cause to be manufactured and sold alcoholic beverages, the sale to be made only by the State itself and not for consumption in any public place. We may well learn from the experience of other nations. Our Canadian neighbors have gone far in this manner to solve this problem by the method of sale made by the state itself and not by private individuals."

Here we have the proposed remedy for what is generally acknowledged to be a national evil, and in making this suggestion the Democratic nominee states most emphatically that he would not tolerate a return of the saloon which he characterizes as a "defunct institution."

Finally reviewing his suggested solution he says this: "Such a change would preserve for the dry States the

benefit of a national law that would continue to make interstate shipment of intoxicating beverages a crime. It would preserve for the dry States Federal enforcement of prohibition within their own borders. It would permit to citizens of other states a carefully limited and controlled method of effectuating the popular will within the borders of those states without the old evil of the saloon.

"Such a method would re-establish respect for law and terminate the agitation which has injected discord into the ranks of the great political fundamental programs for the nation. I may fairly say even to those who disagree with me that the solution I offer is one based upon the historic policy of the Democratic party, to assure to each State its complete right of local self-government. I believe it is a solution which would today be offered by Jefferson, or Jackson, or Cleveland or Wilson, if those great leaders were with us."

The case is now before the jury. That jury is the electorate of the United States. From now until the sixth of November debate will wax fast and furious on both sides of this all-important issue and it is altogether likely that tariff, farm relief, foreign policy and other kindred items will be forgotten or at least given second place while the battle is on.

Other Viewpoints

COMMUNISM MEANS LABOR

Philadelphia Evening Bulletin: Regardless of its attitude in politics and the American Federation of Labor seems to have adopted the general policy of refraining from partisan commitment—the general spirit of the organization is reflected by its president, J. P. Morgan, when he points to the danger of professional radical agitation in labor circles, trying to control union labor, for its own ends.

New Bedford's textile strike is turning another instance of what Mr. Cross deprecates. In the textile struggle there's some of the same causes that have achieved prominence in the disturbances at Paterson, Elizabeth and in other strikes are beginning to get into the news. 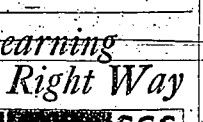
