**"WHAT HATH GOD WROUGHT?"**  
The critics who are qualified to know tell us that one of the chief problems of oil painters working on big canvasses is to keep a true perspective. Compelled as they are to work out details bit by bit in close proximity to the canvass while in the spirit of fine creative fervor, they must from time to time withdraw from the close view to one farther removed in order to see the picture as a whole.

On returning home to the Twin Falls country after an absence of seven years, relieved by an occasional visit that made it possible to maintain some idea of values, the writer is of the opinion that the "makers of the picture," the "picture" in this case being the Greater Twin Falls Empire, may have been so close to their work as to dim the perspective in some degree, and that the point of view of one who has watched in neighboring states the battles agriculture has fought in its efforts to readjust itself to new conditions may have some value.

Suppose we refresh our memories in sketchy fashion of the Twin Falls country in 1911, which happens to be the year in which the writer arrived. Of such highways as we have today there was not a foot then. Twin Falls, the city, was a lusty small city with very little paving, a water system that soon had to be replaced, many less substantial buildings than it has now, fewer business concerns, a much smaller wholesale business, and the city, while thriving, was in no sense the place it is today.

On the farms the cloysed crops were approaching the peak of their popularity. Wheat and alfalfa were both grown in greater acreages than is the case today. Potatoes, then as now, were popular with farmers. Peas commanded greater acreage than beans, the latter crop being in the initial stages of development. Sugar beets were being grown on a comparatively small scale and had to be shipped away for manufacturing. The roads we hauled our mighty full-of-chuck-holes, particularly as the end of the harvest season approached.

Wartime conditions and demands soon stimulated prices of farm products, and a country that had been gradually finding and establishing itself and its practices began to forge ahead at a speed that was nothing if not positively intoxicating. Land values began edging upward in keeping with increased returns and the optimistic temper of people in a new country, and finally reached high figures.

What of 1928?  
The country appears to have practically emerged from the period of deflation and readjustment. To be sure, some scars may be found yet that were inflicted by the keen edged knife of economic change. Land values have stabilized themselves at ranges permitting operators to make interest on the investment, if the private word of representative farmers be accepted at face value. Both in city and country there has been an appreciable amount of building, probably not so noticeable to those who have been here working close to the canvas but strikingly apparent to one who returns after an absence.

Excellent highways have been and are being constructed with the results that those communities, unknown to each other before, now are bound by strong ties of kinship. Two bridges have been constructed over the canyon of Snake river in these past few years to subdue that scenic wonder and unite North side and South side in one big district.

All the communities in this big valley of the Snake have gone forward in stable development. Young in years, they have demanded for themselves and their children, and have secured, those necessities and some luxuries that make for happiness. The day approaches rapidly when in much greater measure than ever before these communities will see themselves as one big empire, the very heart of Idaho, able to help themselves and the state do tasks that before may have seemed mere dreams.

"What hath God wrought?" in this big country. Time will tell. He has already wrought much, but the story is only in its first chapters. The future promises a vast development. It may come more slowly than it did during the rush period of our growth, but, come, it must.

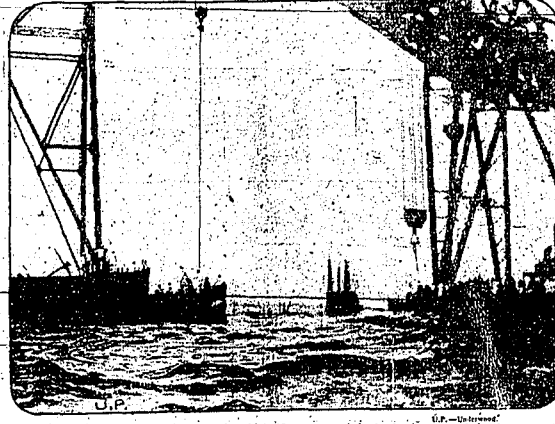
The future submits a challenge to us that has vast possibilities.

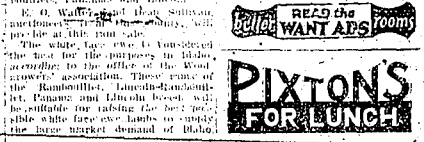

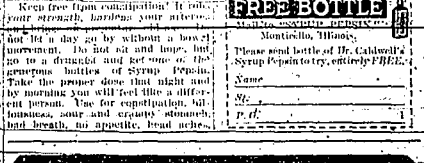

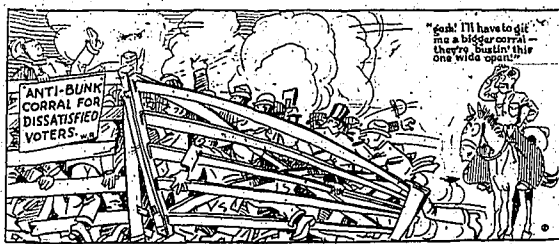
# THE FARMER-LABOR PARTY

## Dead Men Tell No Tales Probable Result Plane Quiz

POCAHELLO, Sept. 6.—A sweeping investigation to determine the cause, if possible, of the fatal plane crash here Tuesday to which seven lives were lost, got under way this morning, when W. Shields, inspector of aircrafts of the division of the department of commerce, came to take charge of the probe. The wrecked plane, a Pokes and passenger aircraft, was one of the fleet, operated by the National Parks Airways, Inc., operating between Great Falls and Salt Lake City. Shields arrived here Wednesday night from Hillville, Mo. "I have formed no theory as to the cause of the crash," he told the Tribune in a correspondence, "and am entering upon the investigation with an open mind. The pilot was not only experienced in commercial aviation, both in Washington and California. The fact that the plane circled the air port here three minutes before the crash, indicates no mechanical trouble existed to hurry his attempt to land. These things just happen and dead men tell no tales."

### "WHAT HATH GOD WROUGHT?"

THE critics who are qualified to know tell us that one of the chief problems of oil painters working on big canvasses is to keep a true perspective. Compelled as they are to work out details bit by bit in close proximity to the canvass while in the spirit of fine creative fervor, they must from time to time withdraw from the close view to one farther removed in order to see the picture as a whole.

On returning home to the Twin Falls country after an absence of seven years, relieved by an occasional visit that made it possible to maintain some idea of values, the writer is of the opinion that the "makers of the picture," the "picture" in this case being the Greater Twin Falls Empire, may have been so close to their work as to dim the perspective in some degree, and that the point of view of one who has watched in neighboring states the battles agriculture has fought in its efforts to readjust itself to new conditions may have some value.

Suppose we refresh our memories in sketchy fashion of the Twin Falls country in 1914, which happens to be the year in which the writer arrived. Of such highways as we have today there was not a foot then. Twin Falls, the city, was a lousy small city with very little paving, a water system that soon had to be replaced, many less substantial buildings than it has now, fewer business concerns, a much smaller wholesale business, and the city, while thriving, was in no sense the place it is today.

On the farms the cloverseed crops were approaching the peak of their popularity. Wheat and alfalfa were both produced on greater acreages than is the case today. Potatoes, then as now, were popular with farmers. Peas commanded greater acreage than beans, the latter crop being in the initial stages of development. Sugar beets were being grown on a comparatively small scale and had to be shipped away for manufacturing. The roads were hauled over were mighty full of chuck holes, particularly as the end of the harvest season approached.

Wartime conditions and demands soon stimulated prices of farm products, and a country that had been gradually finding and establishing itself and its practices began to forge ahead at a speed that was nothing if not positively intoxicating. Land values began edging upward in keeping with increased returns and the optimistic temper of people in a new country, and finally reached high figures.

### What of 1928?

The country appears to have practically emerged from the period of deflation and readjustment. To be sure, some scars may be found yet that were inflicted by the keen edged knife of economic change. Land values have stabilized themselves at ranges permitting operators to make interest on the investment, if the private word of representative farmers be accepted at face value. Both in city and country there has been an appreciable amount of building, probably not so noticeable to those who have been here working close to the canvas but strikingly apparent to one who returns after an absence.

Excellent highways have been and are being constructed with the results that those communities, unknown to each other before, now are bound by strong ties of kinship. Two bridges have been constructed over the canyon of Snake river in these past few years to subdue that scenic wonder and unite North side and South side in one big district.

All the communities in this big valley of the Snake have gone forward in stable development. Young in years, they have demanded for themselves and their children, and have secured, those necessities and some luxuries that make for happiness. The day approaches rapidly when in much greater measure than ever before these communities will see themselves as one big empire, the very heart of Idaho, able to help themselves and the state do tasks that before may have seemed mere dreams.

"What hath God wrought?" in this big country. Time will tell. He has wrought much, but the story is only in its first chapters. The future promises vast developments. It may come more slowly than it did during the rush period of our growth, but come, it must.

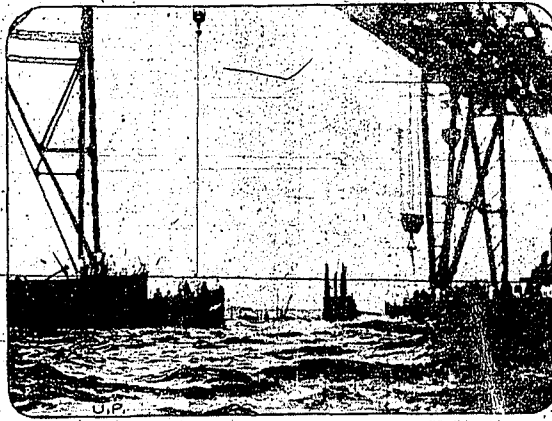

William became president of Kansas State agricultural college. While rendering distinguished service there he was called to the cabinet of the president of the United States as head of the department of agriculture, where he has served with great ability.

James rose to high position in the United States forest service in duties that with headquarters at Washington, carried him all over the United States, was an important figure in accidental war work during the World war and an instrument of Dr. Wilbycombe, was called to the directorship of the United States experiment station at Oregon State college, where he is rendering distinguished service.

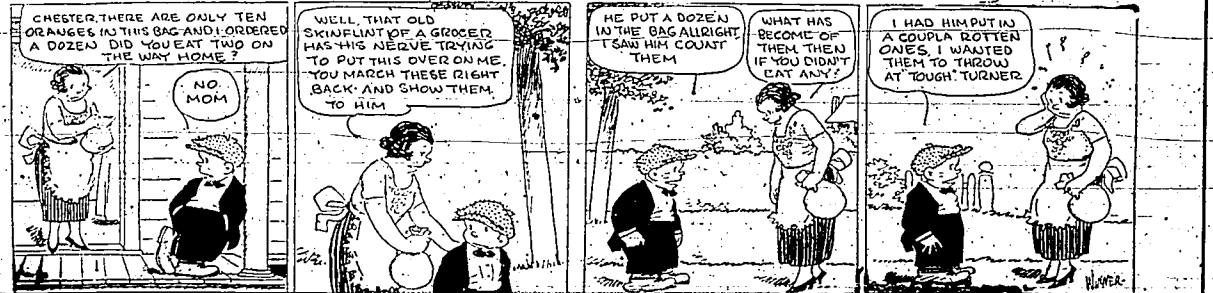

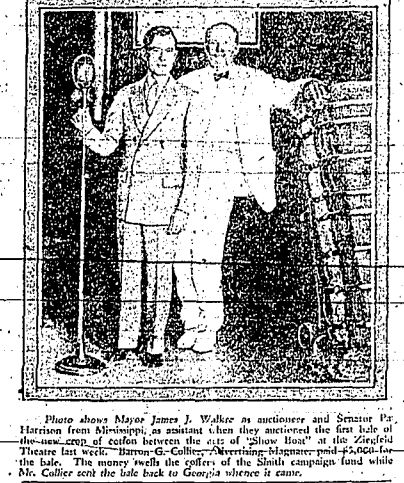

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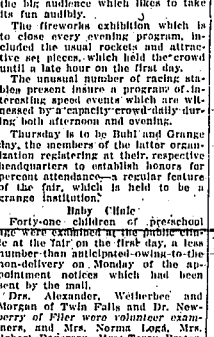
