DAKE PASSES KANSAS FLIER IN AIR DERBY

Tex Rankin of Portland Still Holding Third Place; Race Today Is Biggest Jump of Entire Trip, 564 Miles, Fort Worth to El Paso.

By United Press. MIDLAND, Texas, Sept. 8.—Robert Dake, Pittsburg, Kan., in the hop of the national air race from Abilene, Midland today, landing his American Moth at 9:30 a. m.

Although Dake passed Rowland on the Abilene-Midland hop, it was hoped that Rowland still would be in the lead when the flight was completed. Officials at the field were checking the time of the leader.

FORT WORTH, Texas, Sept. 8.—All of the 25 planes remaining in the national air race left Abilene this morning for today's hop to El Paso. The flight today will include flights by Albert Stinson and Cecil DeWitt, who were reported to have the course by the weather bureau.

Rowland First to Leave. Earl Rowland, Wichita, Kan., flying a Cessna monoplane, was the first to leave the field. He got away at 6:30 a. m. on the 142-mile hop to Abilene. Then seconds later, Robert Dake of Pittsburg, Pa., who followed Rowland, took off for Abilene. Dake's American Moth left the ground and disappeared in the western haze over Rowland's trail.

Tex Rankin, Portland, Oregon, took off at 7:27, with the remaining 22 planes leaving at one minute intervals thereafter. Heavy misting caused the race to be held westward flying at a low altitude.

Rowland's hop will be the second longest of the race. It will cover 564 miles. The total mileage covered to Fort Worth was completed in 1,652 miles. Rowland's hop will be the longest of the race.

Rowland's elapsed time to Fort Worth was 14:14; Dake's 15:08, and John Livingston, Monmouth, Ill., flying a Waco plane, led the transcontinental class B race into Fort Worth today when he arrived at 12:05 p. m.

Rowland's hop is the over-night stop and a race which is held in the afternoon and tonight, before leaving for St. Louis at 4 a. m. tomorrow.

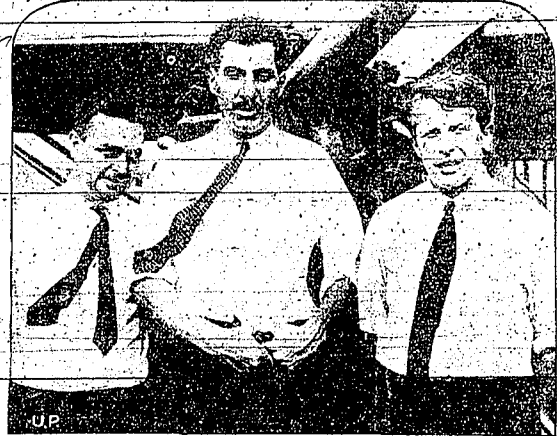

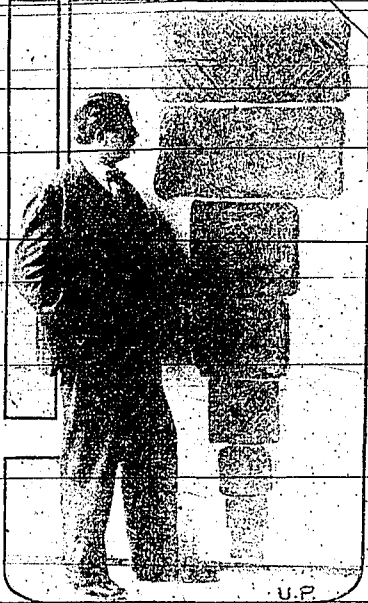

# CHILDRENS DAY ADDS PLEASURE TO BIG EVENT

### Receipts Expected to Show That Fair Has Paid for Itself; Exhibitors Not Removing Entries in Haste; Thousands of Children Make Merry and Take in the Fun.

Under persistently sunny skies and with no break in the perfect autumn weather, the first fair Twin Falls county ever held Friday was thronged with children. The grounds were completely filled with groups of youngsters and the fair was the most of the day which had been set aside for their particular entertainment. At Twin Falls under 11 years are admitted free until the show closes tonight.

The race program and all entertainment features are being carried out in the usual manner, while a special effort is being made to preserve intact the exhibit which has been the superior quality of the county exhibition. Under the rules, exhibitors may remove their exhibits at 4 o'clock, but many have already signified their willingness to extend the time.

**PAIR IS SELF-SUPPORTING**

It is certain that the fair will be self-supporting, says C. D. DeWolfe, treasurer of the fair board. "There is every indication that the receipts are better, or perhaps be slightly in excess of the expenses. This is the goal toward which we are aiming," he aimed during the day. Receipts Wednesday were \$6725.05 and \$4719.15 Thursday. Though the fair is held at the gate was 125 more on Thursday, the difference came in the grandstand receipts. There were 200 more than the best day we had last year."

Members of the board have been keeping a careful check on the operation of the different departments with the view of making weak spots before the next annual event. Individual exhibitors are making plans to exhibit for the fair which opens next Monday. From the dairy building will be the International Institute, M. J. delatard, Grandville Quennessy and perhaps the St. Anthony Holstein prize winners. All these exhibitors have added many ribbons to their previously long lists, and are well satisfied with the treatment they received at the fair. Plans are being made today by Twin Falls Jersey men to enter a herd of prize winners. This will be the last year for the Midland state herd, since 50 of the 80 individuals are to be offered at public sale during October.

It is hoped that the Twin Falls county herd of Guernsey cows will be taken to the eastern county, though arrangements for that are not yet complete. Exhibitors took their place with county herd of both Jerseys and Holsteins.

Going to State Fair

Both Eric Sandquist, Pirih, and Thomas Parks, both, are expecting to send swine exhibits to the state fair at Boise this fall. Breeders are finding a very responsive market for their pigs at the fair, and many good sales have been made.

"Farmers have been forced out of the hog business during the past few years," said L. S. Otto, superintendent of the department. "but these sales are indicative of the revived interest in swine breeding that is seen every hand." The largest animal that was shown in this building is "Colonne," the prize duror Jersey boar, weighing fully 1000 pounds, two years old and bred at the Golden Livestock show last winter.

"We have learned a lot about raising pigs in the last year," said Otto. "It has been in the business for some time. We now grow pigs at marketable size in half the time and at half the expense that used to be involved. A five-month pig is now the size we used to expect at 10 months. I find that the best market guido is the government report, and when I follow them, I am increasing or decreasing the output. I know that there is an unfounded suspicion that reports are false, but I have found that they suit my interests admirably."

Boy Makers a Record

Outstanding achievement among the juniors was the record herd shown by George Evans, son of Mr. and Mrs. Roy Evans of Twin Falls. George is 16 years old and has been conducting a pig project as part of his high school work. Buying for \$15 a dozen every day last February, he now has eight young pigs, five of which were shown at the fair, winning a fine collection of trophies. He was paid the litter of \$200, and figures that they represent a net profit, after paying all expenses, of about \$120.

Another litter will arrive before the end of the year, doubling this profit and the original investment will instant.

"Of course, I got into it at just the right time. The price of hogs had been picking up ever since I couldn't expect to enlarge and remain in the business without raising a string of cows to help with the feed and take up part of the losses that might come from time to time."

## Texas Executes Pair Convicted of Criminal Assault

HUNTSVILLE, Texas, Sept. 8.—Clement Rodriguez and Equival Servin Friday were executed in the electric chair at state prison here for criminally assaulting a San Antonio high school girl.

Servin's plan to cheat the chair was thwarted when guards, in searching for the electric chair, found a hidden dagger there. It was promptly followed out of a wagon, Warden E. F. Bennett said, a public of inflicting a mortal wound.

Rodriguez went to the chair first. He was pronounced dead at 12:25 p. m. Servin was pronounced dead at 12:40. He protested his innocence to the last.

Even New York, Monaghan said, was receiving supplies from a \$10,000,000 bootleg ring with headquarters in the small but active underworld section here.

Monaghan said that 350,000 gallons of alcohol had been diverted from two distilleries into the hands of bootleggers.

"The alcohol was shipped by rail to all parts of the country," Monaghan said. "Bootleggers employ trucks to haul the stuff to and from railway yards."

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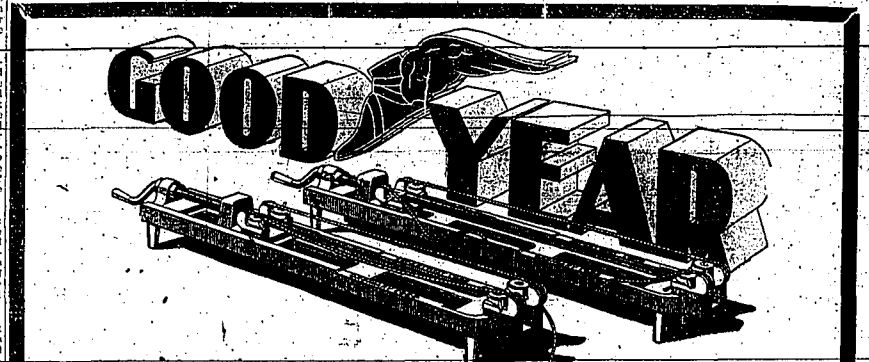
