PROSPERITY MYTHS

(Salem, Oregon, Capitol Journal) THE Hoover campaign is largely based on two myths, that widespread prosperity now exists and that Republican rule always brings prosperity while Democratic rule means hard times. In his acceptance speech, Mr. Hoover went to the absurd extent of claiming the installation of 4,000,000 more automobiles, 7,000,000 more sets, 34,000,000 more automobiles, the construction of beautiful municipal buildings, city parks and playgrounds, and the increased number of school children as due to Republican administrations—which had nothing to do with them.

In his acceptance speech, Governor Smith painted this prosperity picture by pointing out that there are now 4,000,000 men idle, unable to secure work, that 1-20 of one per cent of our 130,000 corporations earned 30 per cent of all the profits; that 10 per cent of the corporations are actually losing money, and that 1-4 of one per cent of the corporations earn two-thirds of the profits of all of them. Such prosperity as exists is spurious and exists only for the few. Adversity has for some years extended to such industries as cotton goods, woolens, silk, wool, lumber and oil, while agriculture has been almost prostrate.

But the myth of Republican prosperity is cleverly worked for appeals to the unthinking, who are willing to believe anything that is said. It reveals that all of our periods of financial depression since the year have occurred under Republican administrations. The panic of 1873 with its years of hard times occurred under President Grant; the economic morass of 1893 occurred under President Cleveland; the panic of 1907 was under President Roosevelt; the federal reserve banking law, passed by the Democrats under President Wilson, gave our banking system an elasticity that effectively prevents such panics as experienced in the past. Even the duration of the depression period did not cause any such tempest as previous disturbances—though widespread depression followed during the first years of the Harding administration, also Republican, and still continues in certain industries under Coolidge.

Republican publicity methods have been skillfully used to paint the myth that prosperity is a concomitant of the party whose regime has frequently been tainted with corruption, whereas the fact is that every major spell of financial depression since the Civil war can be traced to its maladministration. Over in Pendleton, Oregon, during the afternoons of Wednesday, Thursday, Friday and Saturday of this week, the Pendleton Round-up will be held. 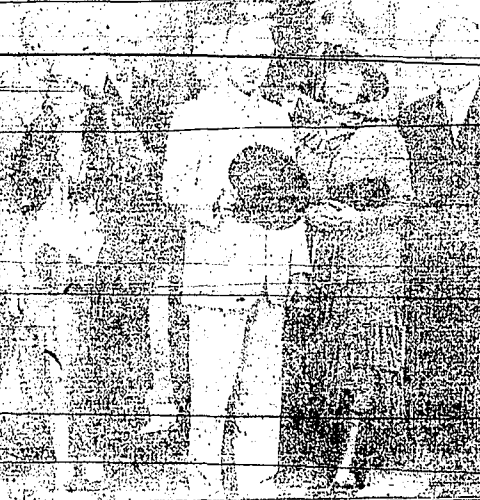

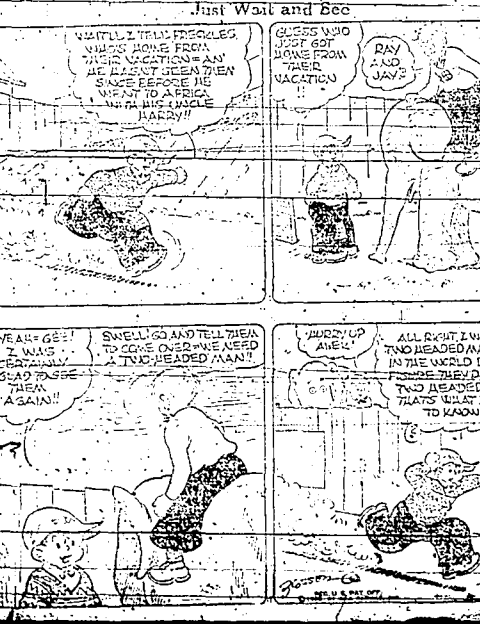

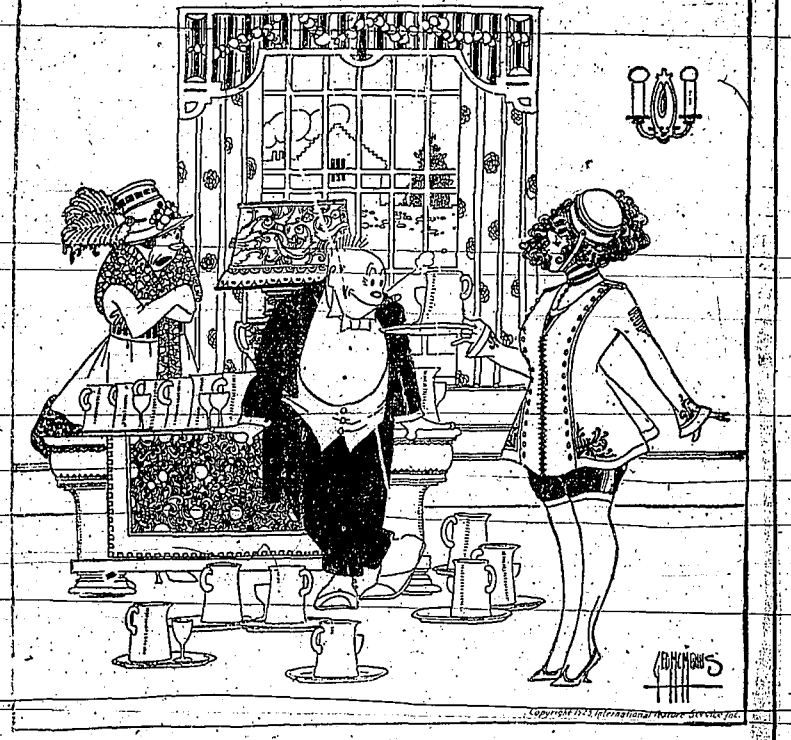
