No Engagements Ahead and Leaving Campaign to His Subordinates.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 24 (UP)—The so-called "growing intensity" of the presidential campaign, as reported by official political observers, today found Herbert Hoover at his desk as usual, no noisier in his working mode than when Elizabeth Smith was in the White House.

Statements made necessary by developments were again handled by his two spokesmen, Hubert Work, chairman of the Republican committee, and George Akerson, Hoover's private secretary.

Mr. Hoover has taken no decisions of a kind of liquor since he has been a constitutional executive officer of the United States and has never served liquor in his home.

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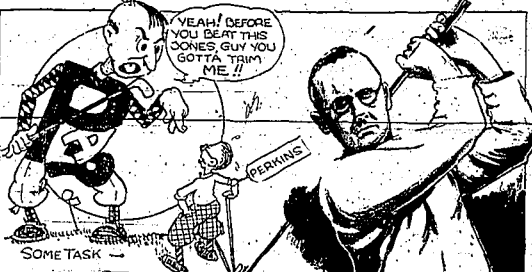
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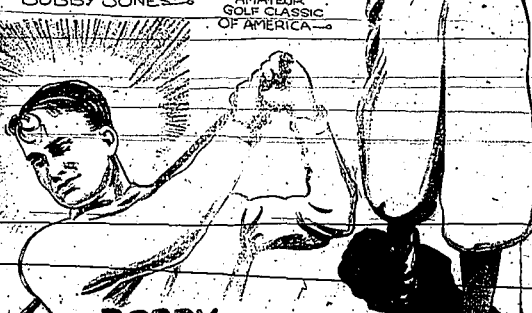

Annual Report Shows 118 Cows in Association Producing More Than 40 Pounds of Butterfat to the Cow.

The August report of the Pioneer Cow Testing association as prepared by W. J. Tyrone, shows that 118 cows in the district produced 40 pounds or more of butterfat each during the month. There were 222 cows from 25 herds tested. Average production of butterfat for each cow was 26.3 pounds and 23 pounds of milk.

NEW YORK, Sept. 24 (UP)—Jews the world over are bowed in prayer today, marking Yom Kippur, the day of atonement, the most solemn holiday on the Jewish calendar. Twenty-four hours of fasting and prayer began Sunday night and will continue until dusk today when the ten days of penitence ushered in by the Jewish New Year end.

New York's vast Jewish population is worshipping today and the streets in sections of the city occupied predominantly by Jews are deserted. Last night cantors sang the Kol Nidre while rabbis delivered appropriate sermons.

Rabbi Nathan Kraus, addressing the overflow meeting at the century theater last night, told his congregation that Yom Kippur possesses three great functions: prayer, resolution to rectify wrong, and reformation.

Rabbi Stephen S. Wise, at the Peas Peas synagogue, said a century ago denounced that "the Jews search into his soul with the Jews" whether it be true that we Jews constitute a nation.

State University Head Inaugurated in Moscow Today

UNIVERSITY OF IDAHO, MOSCOW, Sept. 24 (Special)—Fundamental changes which he feels must come in higher education to develop the right kind of a university or college to serve most effectively in training the youth of a state were pictured comprehensively by Dr. Stanislas J. Kelly, new president of the University of Idaho, in his inaugural address here this afternoon. The new president considered the changes with special reference to the institution which he now officially heads.

Dr. Kelly's philosophy of higher education, which he pictured completely before a large audience of people representing all sections of Idaho, are found three fundamental principles. He feels there should be a closer cooperation between the various stages in education from the primary grades through the colleges and the graduate schools. He is particularly concerned at present, however, with the relationship of high school and college work. He feels a need for changing the view that high school is a place where one step of the educational procedure is finished and that college is a place where another step is commenced.

Probably the college should be divided more definitely into lower and upper divisions, the first of which, dovetailing with the high school, should constitute the finishing point for a considerable proportion of students who now enter colleges and for many who do not now enter, he said. "The senior division," he would be organized, for those young people with sufficient intellectual gifts to profit by specialization and a large amount of independent study.

"First and Last" Saloon, Haunt of Jack London, Burns

OAKLAND, Cal., Sept. 24 (UP)—The "first and last saloon" once the haunt of Jack London and later of Louis Slotson, burned to the ground here early today.

The largest known collection of literary manuscripts, pictures and letters of Jack London was destroyed in the blaze. Johnny Heintz, London's former publisher and "best friend," had been carefully gathering the collection for years.

Heintz built the saloon in the days of the old city and turned it over to the late bar at a young age. Heintz furnished financial backing for London during his early literary struggles.

When prohibition came Heintz converted his old saloon into a soft drink parlor and kept building up his collection of London souvenirs.
