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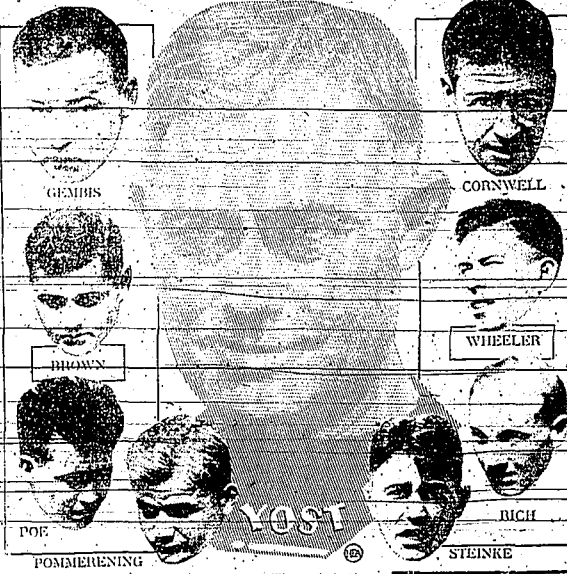

SEATTLE, Oct. 11 (AP)—A five-year football pact among the "Big Four" colleges of the Pacific coast conference was announced today by Earl Campbell, executive manager of the University of Washington. The agreement, he said, has been signed by Stanford, California, University of Southern California and Washington.

The pact will begin in effect in 1929 with Washington, Stanford and U. C. in Seattle and California at Berkeley. The pact is a three-year pact for an intercollegiate game with University of Chicago at Chicago.

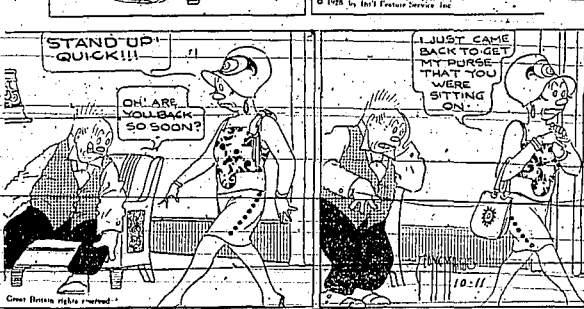
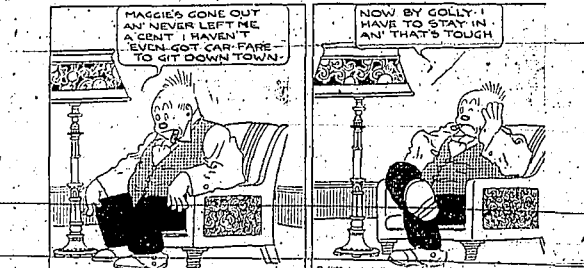

SEARCH ON FOR MRS. ED SNIDER

Mrs. Bertha Snider disappeared from her home on Tuesday night, one mile west and one-fourth mile south of the South Park grocery at eight o'clock Sunday morning and no word has been received from her since that time. She was tracked to the high-bank canal banks one mile east and a mile north of town and there the trail ended. Unless word came to the whereabouts of the woman it is believed in a few days the high line canal will be dragged in a search for the body.

Mrs. Snider, the wife of Ed Snider, and mother of nine-year-old Helva Snider, was in poor health according to her neighbors. She had been some slight domestic affliction but nothing of serious nature. Mrs. Snider does not habitually the missing woman committed suicide by plunging into the canal but it is hoped that she will be found alive and well.
