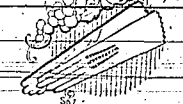

**WE HONOR THEM**  
NOT so many years ago the three R's made up the educational program for our youth and they were not always regarded as the early educators' has gone forward and today and tomorrow 800 teachers from the eight counties of southern Idaho will be the guests of Twin Falls while attending the annual teachers' institute.

**THE LITERARY-DIGEST BALLOT**  
SMITH reduces Hoover's lead more than 5 per cent as the first major returns are received from the south and several large cities in the fourth week's returns of the Literary Digest's 19,000,000 ballot presidential poll published today.

With 10,000,000 received from thirty-nine of the forty-eight states, Hoover has 1,200,000 votes of a grand total of 1,911,237 tabulated, while Smith pulls 688,829. This gives Hoover approximately 63 per cent and Smith about 37 per cent of the total vote as compared to the respective totals of 69 per cent and 31 for Hoover and 31 for Smith.

A new feature of this month's "postcard election" is the introduction of separate urban returns, included in the total, from Chicago, Philadelphia and New York where the entire electorate is being polled, while Smith is leading in those cities with 153,000 votes to Hoover's 177,401.

Arkansas, Georgia, Louisiana and South Carolina are the only states that have as yet given Smith a plurality. Though Hoover has a slight advantage in the present returns in Alabama, the vote is practically a draw.

Virginia and North Carolina give Hoover a definite lead but the returns from the south, the Literary Digest cautions, are less than half completed and should not be taken as indicative of the final returns.

The first separate returns from New York City, reported this week, go to Smith, 102,230, and Hoover, 92,204. Hoover almost 30 per cent of those voting for Smith here report that they voted the republican ticket in 1924, while Hoover gains less than 15 per cent from the Democratic ranks of four years past in the same city.

New York returns as a whole, where it is stated that the returns are more nearly complete, Hoover is leading by 170,113 to 140,276. This ratio may be reduced next week. The Literary Digest points out, when the next votes will be received from New York City.

A tabulation of "how the same votes in 1924" shows that Smith receives nearly one-half of his support from those who voted for the Republican candidate four years ago and a lessening of support from Hoover, one-half of his vote was from Republicans.

Over 76 per cent of Hoover's vote came from professed Republicans at the last election and about 23 per cent of his strength is coming from those who state they voted the Democratic ticket in 1920.

Hoover, it is shown, is receiving more than one-half of his support from the Democratic ranks in the States of Alabama, Arkansas, Georgia, Louisiana and Texas.

Of the 10,000 participating in this "straw poll" who had voted in 1924, 1,000,000 included those who have since arrived at voting age and others who failed to vote their previous political affiliation, over 30 per cent are voting for Hoover and 39 per cent are backing their ballots for Smith.

Previous polling records for the fourth week of a national poll set by The Literary Digest's "Presidential poll of 1921". The Literary Digest states editorially, "are left behind with this week's tabulation of nearly 20,000,000 votes from the thirty-nine of the forty-eight states. The present tabulation shows an increase of almost half a million votes over the fourth week of the 1921 poll, or practically 23 per cent."

"The Digest's present totals, if will be noticed, show that 100,000 Democratic votes are now in the Hoover column, while Mr. Smith claims the considerably larger figure of 230,000 votes from Republican voters as of 1921. On the other hand under the terms of the column head "No Yes" which includes those who vote for the first time in this election, and those who neglect to state whether they voted or not, Mr. Hoover has the advantage by 180,002 to 119,754 for Smith.  
"In the final analysis, of course, the majorities in the separate States expressed through the votes in the Electoral College will determine the election."

**THE FACT AND THE PRESIDENCY**  
Not even America could pledge itself to an unreserved loyalty in the conception of enduring peace, enforceable with all the moral and material strength of the nations assembled in the League of Nations.  
It is not possible to exclude the possibility of any European or other power challenging the validity of the Monroe Doctrine.

This reservation limited the scope of the pact and impaired its efficacy as a preventive measure.

There is a beautiful irony in the stream of events that it is to have no more certain that ever in the land of its origin—America—the pact will secure the necessary ratification of the senate.  
The late President Wilson fought at Versailles for a treaty that his own countrymen, by an overwhelming majority, subsequently repudiated. The commission, failure of a people to endorse the acts of their own official and accredited representatives surprised and shocked the world, to whom the explanation did not seem satisfactory or adequate. That Wilson and his principal supporters had offended the public conscience, to preclude the possibility of any European or other power challenging the validity of the Monroe Doctrine.

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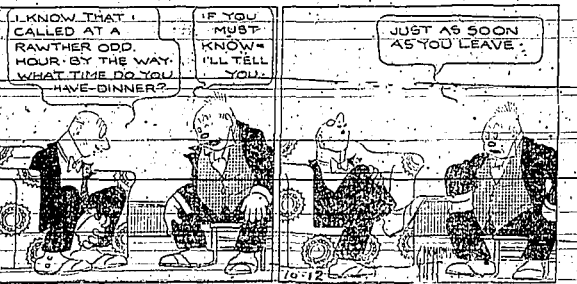
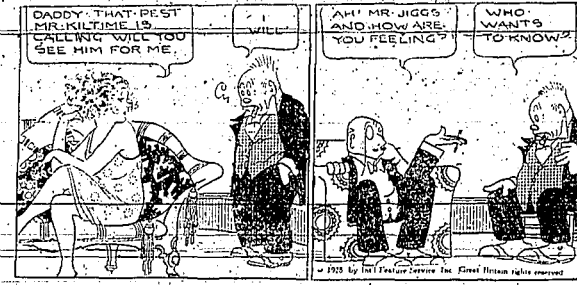
