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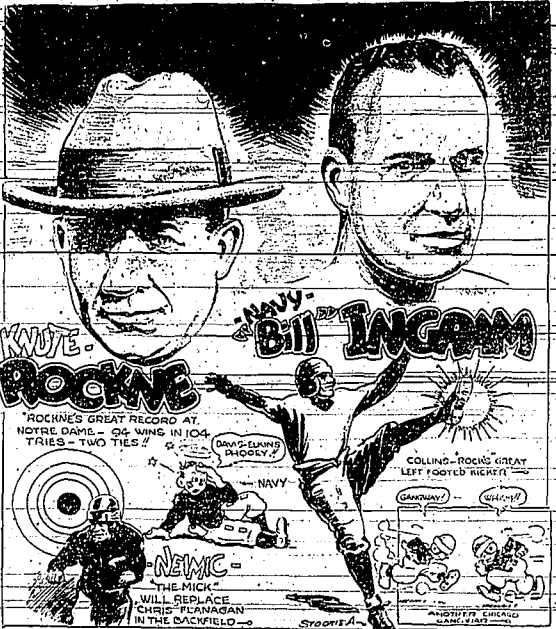

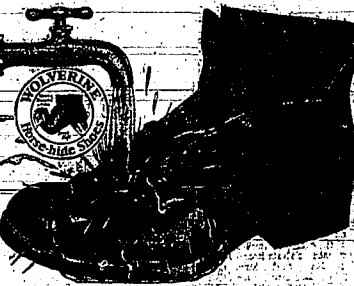

A HEALTHFUL OCCUPATION

COMES on a large insurance company claim that the low sickness rates prevailing among American teachers have made their chances of long life so good that the teaching profession has come to rank among the healthiest in the country.

This should be encouraging news for the educators recently assembled here for the annual teachers' institute for the eight southern counties of Idaho, for health plays an important part in any calling.

We learn from the insurance companies' reports that although long and arduous, the work of a teacher is not as taxing as many would think. As a class, they are relatively free from respiratory diseases, they nevertheless show such tendency to acquire colds, influenza, and tonsillitis, that one authority has summed up the teachers' health situation as being a simple succession of minor ailments in a life comparatively free from serious risks.

A perusal of the report reveals the fact that the chief cause of sickness among teachers consists of nervous disorders.

In explaining these favorable trends, the fact is pointed out that teachers, in general, are less susceptible to the most serious side of the teachers' health situation.

Much of the nervous trouble among teachers is explained by the lack of rest and sufficient sleep or rest, inability at night or during rest to ease into the perplexities and problems of the classroom.

The sanitary and modern school buildings of today have done a great deal to make better health conditions for both teachers and pupils alike.

UPPER LAKES OF THE SAWILOOTH

(By Byron Diefenbach)

MILLIONS of years ago, glaciers sliding slowly down the deep canyons of the Sawtooth range picked up great masses of earth and rock, and at their lower melting ends deposited this material in terraced basins, forming something like thick dams. Behind these dams the ice returned to water as the gradually warming countries rolled by, resulting in such lower lakes as Alluree, Pettit and Yellow Belly, at elevations about 7,000 feet above the sea.

At still higher altitudes up to perhaps 10,000 feet the irresistible force of these rivers of ice, perhaps encountering softer formations in the rocks, wore or tore great holes in their beds and basins. These holes are known as "cirque" basins. Geological definition "Cirque is a steep-walled recess in a mountain supposed to be caused by glacial erosion.

These cirque or bowl basins now contain the upper lakes of the Sawtooth. These are deeper than their, ranging in size from 1 to 100 acres. Some of them have been named: Aizen, Somers, Fairly, Foxway, and others. Lakes, Upper Clampton, McDonald, dozens of others are unnamed—still other dozens are unexplored. No two are exactly alike; each seems more beautiful than the other.

Hon. R. E. Thomas, state game warden of Idaho, pays them this eloquent tribute:

"The lake region of the Sawtooth is one of indescribable beauty, with the snow-capped jagged peaks piercing the sky and living glaciers on their sides pointing immemorially to torrents into the lakes at their feet. The waters from these high peaks, as they come down through tortuous canyons supplying the lakes and larger lakes, which nature has created an outdoor land second to none in the world."

These waters were partially known to white men at least as early as 1878, but it was not until 1924 that the discoverer of high ore deposits near Inley, brought the prospector on his tireless quest into these remote places. For the next ten years these hills were full of men—and miles.

The lake region of these upper lakes is deep and still and cold. Perhaps it does not thaw out until July; perhaps not even then. Sometimes it lies in the summer clouds, often far above them. A phantom lake, hiding among the ghostly, heavily peaked, snow-capped peaks, is visible only on each day. Twilight comes on in early afternoon. In the dim light the stag comes down to drink his fill. A trout lies languidly on some hovering fly; the rump of the sun. Silence, the silence of the ages, is the only sound to be heard.

THE LAW'S QUEER QUIRKS

THE ways of the law are perplexing and strange. In Vancouver, B. C., Gordon Northcott was held on a murder charge brought by California authorities. He was first taken into custody on a mere notification that the man wanted, but to hold him for extradition it was necessary that he be arrested on a definite warrant for murder.

The warrant arrived and was served. But Canadian laws forbid the serving of a warrant on a man in jail. So Northcott was formally released, then, as he stepped out of the jail, he was re-arrested, served with the warrant and led back to his cell.

All of this hoop-punch was undoubtedly necessary. But, as we say, it makes the devious ways of the law seem a bit involved and confusing.

THE WAR AND TROPICAL DISEASE

AS the world war recedes farther into history, it is interesting to note that in some ways this great tragedy had what we might call by-products of inestimable value to humanity.

The epidemics which the war have aviation is well known. The art of building and flying planes made far greater advances than it would have in an equal period of peace.

Now comes Hygiene, a health magazine, to point out that the development of tropical medicine was aided more by the war than by any other event in world history.

Dysentery in Egypt and Gallipoli, malaria in Salonika, beri-beri in Mesopotamia and scurvy and sleeping sickness in East Africa illumined the attention of military medical authorities—and not it. As a result, doctors know much more about fighting these diseases than they ever knew before.

Best Editorial of the Day

LAWBREAKING LAW ENFORCEMENT

IT is to be regretted that the supreme court has refused to grant a writ of prohibition to the wire tapping cases. The decision of the court upon which the rehearing was asked was by a majority of one only, and the four dissenting judges included some of the most highly regarded members of the tribunal.

Justice Mr. Justice Oliver Wendell Holmes, with four dissenters, are of course, inevitable, but they are not to be welcomed. They leave the law in a doubtful state, and in cases involving questions of general moment and principle of serious import every opportunity to bring the court to a common judgment should be favored.

In the wire tapping case five justices held that it is not obnoxious to American procedure in the enforcement of the laws that evidence gathered by government agents through the breaking of law shall be used against defendants. Four judges held that evidence procured in such manner is not available. In our opinion there is an issue of public policy and legal rights here involved which ought not to be determined upon a divided opinion of the court. To the average lay mind we think the majority decision will seem deplorable and the rule asserted "profoundly demoralizing."

If there were the shadow of a hope that the court might be reversed, or even that every opportunity be brought to a more general agreement a rehearing should have been granted.

Perhaps there was no hope. At any rate, since the opinion affirms the duty of congress and the president to act in such cases, an extra session is a short one with much to do; but it should not adjourn without enacting a law making evidence procured through the willful breaking of law by agents of the government inadmissible against any defendant. As Mr. Justice Brandeis says: "The government is become a hydra with its heads contempt of the law." The principle should be inherent in our forensic law, but if it is not it should be explicitly put there by legislation.

THE SMITH SIDE OF THE CASE

CORRUPTING THE PRESS

THIS method used by Mr. Hoover's backers to corrupt the behavior of the republican party are not different from those employed elsewhere. They are for fair means or foul to get their man elected, and they will do it.

Mistake to Force Youngster to Take Nourishment When He Has No Desire for It; Lengthening Time Between Meals May Solve the Troubling.

NO mother can be happy unless her baby is eager for food, increasing in weight, and giving every indication of good health. The youngster's attitude towards food and his ready digestion, really measure the state of his health.

It is dangerous to be hazy in the normal condition of infancy and childhood. Something is wrong when there is loss of appetite. The anxious mother runs to the doctor at once to find why the baby does not eat as he should.

Signs of trouble. The baby may look well and in other respects be quite as usual. But it does not cry for food and show its old-time eagerness. Perhaps the amount of food that has been taken every day. Perhaps it has been overfed.

It is frequently true. Sometimes the milk is too rich. It carries too much fat, too much cream. You and I do not know how much fat is in the milk.

DR. COPELAND. It is a great mistake to force the child to eat. It is not to be trusted wholly. But in babyhood it is different. Appetite has not been particularly strong. Nothing is more important in infant feeding than regularity. Under no circumstances should the child be given food except at the regular intervals between feedings.

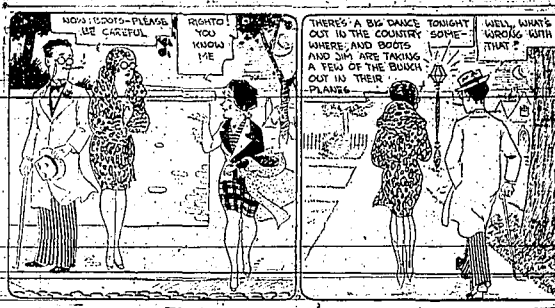

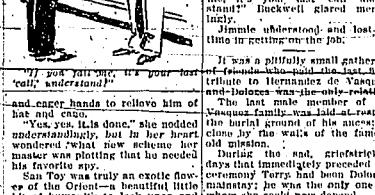

Spring Wheat Does Well in State This Year Report Shows

Spring wheat in Idaho has come through the season with an average yield of 28.5 bushels per acre, according to a report issued today by J. H. Jacobsen, statistician of the United States department of agriculture, who has been in the state for a week.

This gives a production of 20,061,000 bushels on 704,000 acres. Combined with the winter wheat crop of 10,688,000 bushels, Idaho's total wheat crop is approximately 31,749,000 bushels, while the 1928 year average is 24,225,000. 1929 is the best year and winter wheat were very good and, except for depressed yields in the north due to

Large United States Wheat Crop. The United States total wheat crop is estimated at 904 million bushels, which has only one per cent over last year's crop. Last year's production was 874 million bushels, and the five year average is 897 million.

Foreign Wheat Prospects. The 1928 wheat production in 30 foreign countries is reported at 2,222,000,000 bushels in 1927, or an increase of 9.8 per cent according to reports from various countries. The average of the bureau of agricultural economics, the three years of 1926-27-28, was 2,000,000,000 bushels, is progressing rapidly and is nearing completion. Production of 1929 wheat crop totaled 440,025,000 bushels. Wheat market in England and Europe is showing a decline and three months, although there is a fair probability of a bumper crop in 1929.

The time hay crop in Idaho is estimated at 1,000,000 tons, based on an acre yield of 27. In 1927 a yield of 3.11 tons per acre produced 3,515,000 tons. The five year average is 2,745,000 tons.
