MONTHLY REPORT ON STATE CROPS RELEASED TODAY

The Idaho potato crop is estimated at 20,455,000 bushels, or 20,000 less than indicated Sept. 1, according to report released by J. H. Jacobsen, statistician.

This is based on an October condition 75 per cent normal, which indicates an average yield of 174 bushels per acre in 1927. The harvest of 24,200,000 bushels, with the 1928 year average is 12,750,000 bushels. The average yield per acre is the lowest since 1919, when it was 165 bushels. The 1928 yield was 170 bushels per acre.

The United States potato production averaged 461 million bushels compared with 467 million harvested in 1927. The five year average is 394 million bushels. Practically all the important states report less potatoes than promised September 1.

Apples Above Average.
Total apple production in Idaho now promises 4,712,000 bushels. Last year we harvested 6,100,000 bushels, with the average for the past five years is 4,382,000.

The United States total apple crop is now placed at 177,600,000 bushels. Last month it was 171,000,000 bushels, now indicated, with only 125 million bushels were harvested in 1927. The commercial crop promises 22,800,000 bushels against 22,122,000—harvested in 1927.

The United States peach production is estimated at 158,200,000 bushels in comparison with 15,800,000 harvested in 1927. The important bean states of Michigan, New York, Montana, New Mexico and Nebraska show increases over 6 months ago. The Colorado crop was cut severely by drought.

On the afternoon of December 18, 1927, the Parker girl was hurried from the Mount Vernon Junior high school on the pretext that her father, Perry Parker, prominent banker, executive, was injured in an automobile accident.

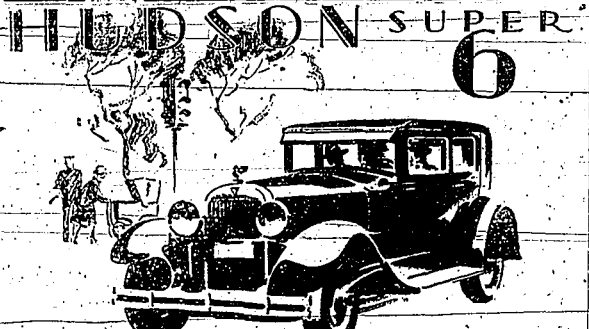

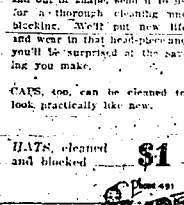
