HOOVER TRYING TO COMBAT WHISPERS DIRECTED HIS WAY

Quicker Were Disloyal in Wartime, Is One; Other Involves Negress

POSTMASTER GETS AXE FOR HIS PART

Governor of Mississippi Says Hoover Danced With Dusky Maid

WASHINGTON, Oct. 20 (UP)—Herbert Hoover's campaign since his election to hold the office of postmaster, showing definite evidence that this presidential campaign is developing bitterness in the closing days.

In the first place, George Akeron, Hoover's secretary, has been denounced as "negrophobic" when a "whisper" that Hoover visited and danced with Mary Doane, negro, and danced with a woman from Mississippi at Mound Bayou, Miss., while on flood relief work last spring.

Secondly, Postmaster General Now had suspended, pending further investigation, the Postmaster and assistant postmaster at Sanford, Pa., because allegedly they had assisted in sending out, without proper notice, circulars attacking Hoover and local candidates in that Pennsylvania district.

Denial Is Wired

Denial of the Hoover story was sent in a telegram to the governor with Hoover's advice, sent to Gov. Theodore G. Bilbo of Mississippi, who, after his election, denied the story in a recent speech in Memphis.

"There is no truth in the slightest foundation for the 'Hoover' wire-films. It is the most indecent and unworthy statement in the history of the United States, more untruthful and ignominious than any ever uttered by a public man in the United States than that attributed to you."

The move to halt this "whispering story" against the republican candidate was sudden and dramatic like the alleged statement issued a few weeks ago by the department of justice, which charged the secretary of the Syracuse state fair after that incident Hoover made it clear that there were no "whispering" stories circulated about him.

FOREIGN POWERS WRANGLING OVER DEBT TO AMERICA

Uncle Sam Insists Money Be Paid Regardless of How Germany Pays Them

DEADLOCK APPEARS AT PRESENT STAGE

Each One of the Big Powers Has Its Own Pet Plan, but Gets Nowhere

PARIS, Oct. 20 (UP)—Europe, striving hard to settle the "young" reparations and war debt problem after eight years of unsatisfactory bargaining, began to realize today the difficulties that must be overcome before a solution can be reached.

Great hopes were raised by yesterday's conference of Premier Raymond Poincaré, of France; Secretary Gustav Stresemann, of the reparations payments, and Winston Churchill, British chancellor of the exchequer.

It developed today that the result of the first conference was unsatisfactory and that the second were as far apart as ever in their ideas of how the problem should be solved.

A DRUNKEN DRIVER GETS FOUR YEARS

A KANSAS CITY man has been sentenced to four years in the penitentiary for driving a car while intoxicated. His complete delirium while driving knocked over a boy and girl, injuring them badly, and crashed into another automobile. The sentence given him is undoubtedly the stiffest ever given for the offense charged.

Even so, it is hard to see where it is really severe. We must recognize that no one has any business driving an automobile unless he is in complete control of all his faculties. A drunken man in a car is a potential killer. It is time that every driver understand that he is not only responsible for his own safety, but also for the safety of the public. A few more penitentiary sentences for this offense might go far toward stamping it out.

PUBLIC HANGINGS

THE varieties of freak and nonsensical legislation proposed in our American state legislatures are almost endless. But California legislators have thought up one that ought to take the grand prize.

This session, according to press dispatches, plans a bill which would require each California county to hang all its offenders on a public gallows erected in an open square in the county seat. All hangings would have to be advertised in advance, so that as many people as possible could attend.

It is a bit hard to believe that anyone would take this idea seriously, and the California legislature unambiguously will toss the measure into the discard without delay. It is interesting to note that the health department has used as a precedent for eradicating a child immunization very expensive or difficult to administer; and the old prejudice against it is rapidly dying. The health department hopes especially to reach the group of children most susceptible to diphtheria, those between nine months and five years of age.

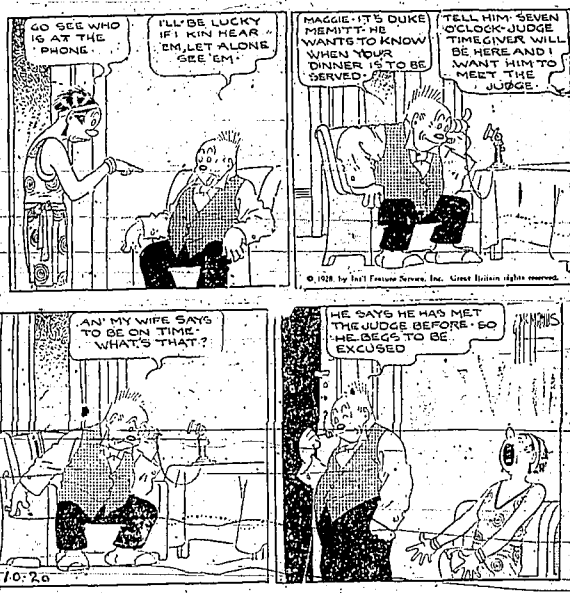

Referendum Ballot Sent to Chamber of Commerce Compiled

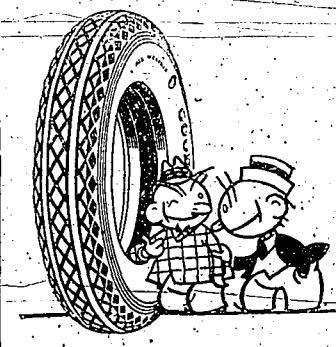
