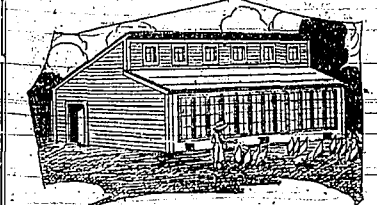

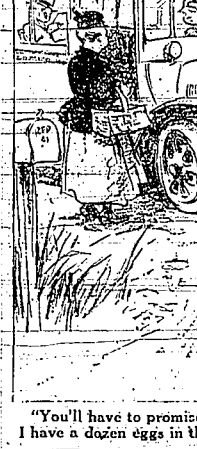

# REPUBLICANS TO CLIP WINGS OF SENATOR NORRIS

OMAHA, Neb., Oct. 25 (AP)—praised on one side and condemned on the other, Senator Norris is due tomorrow night to deliver a speech urging voters to support Governor Alfred E. Smith of New York for president.

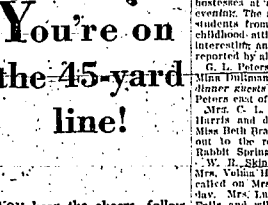

## YOUR CHILDREN

**POSTURE IS ONE OF THE MOST IMPORTANT FACTORS IN CHILD PHYSICS.** A child is never too young to be taught the habit of holding himself straight, sitting upright, and lying straight.

Frankly, I believe posture to be improving. There isn't much doubt that American men and women are straighter than they used to be.

And it could be strange if it were otherwise. For, after all, the campaign for posture is not new. But we have other things to thank for the straightening of spine and lifted chin beside the potent admonitions for Johnny to "sit up" or Mary to hold her shoulders back.

The public schools, especially in the case of our boys and girls. Not only have they given perhaps attention to the science of daily exercise and posture, but they have seen to it that child study desks in school rooms are constructed in such a way that children can rest without strain. There are chairs with curved, rounded, and desks, are at correct angles so that pupils can sit in a normal position and not be compelled to create or drop one shoulder when writing a report that often requires all cause distortion in later life.

We need to speak of "stuffed shoulders" meaning a hunched right shoulder, or slumped shoulders, due to poor classroom conditions.

Not the least of these was poor lighting. Now the lighting facilities in schools are just about perfect. They will "soil" call the modern school houses class houses. Dark houses are no disadvantage either for electric lighting arrangements are reduced to cleanliness perfection.

A thousand other things are contributing factors in the triumph of good posture. One of them, it is obvious, is the exercises made for girls.

But mothers must be eternally vigilant. Little children must be looked after. They should have their morning massages to lie on—not too soft, nor too hard. They need no pillow, or at least a very thin one. It is better for children to sleep alone.

Their clothing should be loose enough to be comfortable. Their shoes should be big enough to allow them room for growing feet. Their tables should be the right height at table. It is important for them to sit up properly while they study.

They should not sit hunched up while studying. Upright and poised to the eye should be properly adjusted for comfortable study of there is some home work to do.

If your boy or girl slouches or stoops when walking, heart, lungs, and other vital organs are strained. He can't be 100 per cent perfect. A dropped chin crowds the throat gland and impedes breathing. Proper breathing should be taught concurrently with posture.
