Pacific Coast Football Will Reach a Climax

TWO MAJOR GAMES BETWEEN FOUR OF BEST ELEVENS ON

Two contests on California grounds will mark the climax of the University of California's football season in one of the annual football classics of the west.

The University of Oregon plays the University of California Golden Bears at Berkeley in an equally important game.

The University of California remains undefeated in conference play. Oregon, despite an early season loss to Stanford, has proved and is accorded a chance to beat the Bears.

Four possibilities hinge on tomorrow's game.

If S. C. and Oregon win, Southern California virtually will have the junction with Washington State and Idaho remaining on its schedule before the inter-colonial conflict, with Notre Dame.

If California and Stanford win, the result of the contest to be played between the two schools probably will decide the title.

Stanford and California were the two schools in the west which were considered so evenly matched that a single error might prove decisive.

SERVICE STATIONS FOR APPLES

(Morning Oregonian)
 AN important development in the apple
 marketing situation is revealed in the
 New York Star's recent summary of the
 activities of our Canadian neighbors. The
 country estimates its current crop at 3,000,000
 barrels. It will have about a million barrels
 for export. Quebec, it is tacitly agreed, will
 consume her own product. Nova Scotia, which
 accounted for 65 per cent of the entire export
 surplus of a year ago, will send fewer apples
 overseas and will have fewer for local con-
 sumption. Ontario will have an increased yield.
 The significant apple news comes from the
 Canadian west.

The growers of British Columbia, ap-
 proximately one-third better than in 1927, are
 using new methods to market apples. Service
 stations for distribution will be set up in
 important markets. Cans containing six
 or 12 apples will be used in these stations for
 purchases in small quantities. Such apples
 will be used to peddle apples at 5 cents apiece.
 The British Columbia apple growers will reach
 out for neglected markets in Denmark, Swe-
 den and other European countries.

The apple and machine is no novelty in this
 country. Nothing, however, is the idea of
 the small unit. The point of these Cana-
 dian expedients is that they are the taken of
 a very high degree of organization, and of the
 well-known Canadian brand of determination
 to let no grass grow under Canadian feet.
 It is probably true that Canadian growers learn
 most of what they now know about apple
 culture from northwestern American pioneers.
 The latter, however, will need to stir them-
 selves in order to catch in the work they
 have done in the past. They must be pre-
 pared, among other things, for strenuous com-
 petition, and must organize their affairs in
 that expectation.

The Smith Side of the Case

TOLERANCE
 Prof. Edward Wood of the University of California
 in The Nation

THE real issue in this campaign is tolerance.
 This may not be altogether obvious to the re-
 sident of New York City, but to a New Yorker
 transplanted to the West, it is a matter of
 common knowledge. It is a matter of common
 knowledge of prime significance. I am not speak-
 ing of religious intolerance—although Protestant
 prejudice is a thing of the past. I am speak-
 ing of the intolerance of a candidate who
 happens to be a Catholic, whose Catholic
 beliefs are about less than his words he taken as
 orders direct from heaven. I am speaking of a
 kind of tolerance which is free from snobbery,
 which is not afraid of her own derides, a nasal
 sneer or an unbecoming smile. There has suddenly
 sprung up a new qualification for office in the
 United States—that the president must be a catholic
 candidate. As a professor in a great American
 university, this strikes me as the chief sort of
 nonsense. At Smith's education in dealing with
 men and women is much more to be valued than
 the sort of book-knowledge or lack of it which
 one acquires in our best country-club colleges with
 their ranking football teams and high social prac-
 tice.

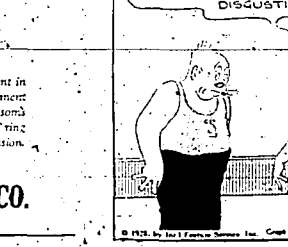
Hoover Is Winner In Straw Votes At Western Colleges
