NEW YORK, Nov. 5 (UP)—Gov. Alfred E. Then he made a non-political speech, telling how he had visited the newswoman once since he first started on his political career.

Smith will wind up his campaign from 10 to 11 p. m. eastern time, with his second speech of the day. The democratic national committee has arranged for a radio broadcast, the coast-to-coast NBC chain and the Columbia system of radio and midwestern stations, for Smith.

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ON THE AIR TONIGHT

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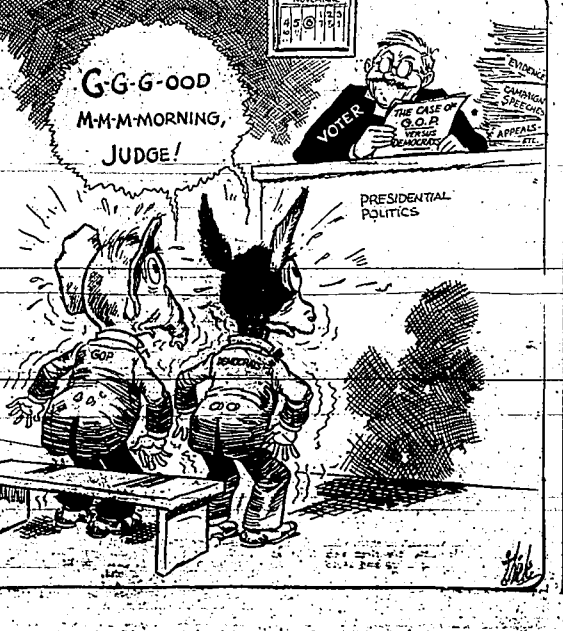

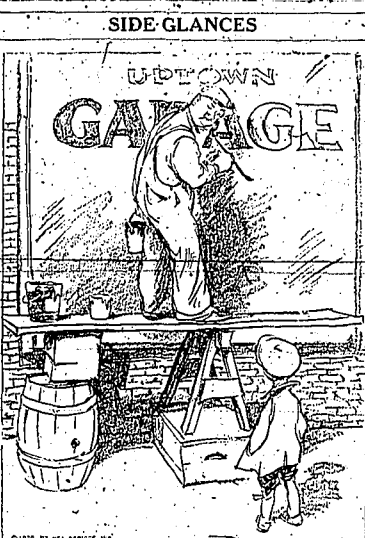

# DIGEST POLL OF LITTLE VALUE IS RASKOB BELIEF

NEW YORK, Nov. 5.—John J. Raskob, national chairman of the democratic campaign, believes very little in the value of the Literary Digest poll. In a statement issued today, he shows that the large number of ballots returned from republicans. Very few democrats took the trouble to read their votes. The Digest statement, in part, is as follows:

"Out of the 12,000,000 ballots distributed by the Literary Digest only 2,688,207 have been returned. An analysis of the New York City poll shows that ballots were received from 70 per cent of the republicans and from less than 10 per cent of the enrolled democrats. In spite of this the poll gives New York City to the republicans in the ratio of 125,020 versus Hoover 102,817.

**FACTS FROM OFFICIAL RECORDS.**

The facts which were taken from the "Proceedings of the Board of County Commissioners," Vols. 6 and 6, open to public inspection.

**LAW LIBRARY.**

On February 5, 1927, (Rep.) made a motion to have a law library in the county building. Moore (Dem.) and Giffen (Rep.) voted YES; BARNES (DEM.) VOTED NO.

Note: The cost of a library for the county law library would consist mostly of newspaper and printing on the shelves about 15 volumes received each month.

**IN THE MATTER OF MILEAGE.**

February 1927, a resolution was offered by Barnes (Dem.) and adopted by the Board fixing ten cents per mile as a fair and reasonable allowance for car mileage on official business. This was a reduction from 12 1/2 cents per mile.

March 12, 1928, Barnes (Dem.) made a motion to allow eight cents per mile for privately owned cars when used on official business, which was adopted by unanimous vote.

**OFFICIAL COUNTY PAPER.**

March 19, 1927, the Board considered the "Matter of an Official County Paper." Three bids were submitted. One offered to publish 45 cents a column inch. Another paper bid 40 cents an inch, with an alternative bid to publish in one west end paper at 40 cents an inch, or in both west end papers at 80 cents an inch. BARNES (DEM.) moved to accept the bid of 40 cents an inch. This was adopted by a second. Thereupon he moved to accept the 50 cent bid, which motion failed for want of a second. He then moved to accept the bid of 40 cents for publication in one Twin Falls paper and publication in the two west end papers. THIS MOTION WAS ADOPTED BY A UNANIMOUS VOTE. A SECOND. Giffen (Rep.) then moved to designate the present official paper on a basis of 25 cents an inch. THIS MOTION WAS ADOPTED BY A UNANIMOUS VOTE. THIS ACTION IN ANY OTHER PAPER. This was recorded by Moore (Dem.) and the vote was—Giffen and Moore for Barnes (Dem.)

The examination of the bills paid by the County for printing shows that acceptance of 45 cent bid would have meant a saving to the county of about \$1200 a year.

When the tentative budget came up for discussion on March 19, 1928, the printing of the proceedings of the Board of County Commissioners was considered. There was a proposal made to print all proceedings on one inch, whereupon Barnes (Dem.) moved that the county printing be let by competitive bidding. This was adopted by a second.

**BOARD FOR COUNTY PRISONERS.**

February 11, 1928, Barnes (Dem.) was largely instrumental in cutting the rate from \$9.00 to 75 cents a day for the board of county prisoners.

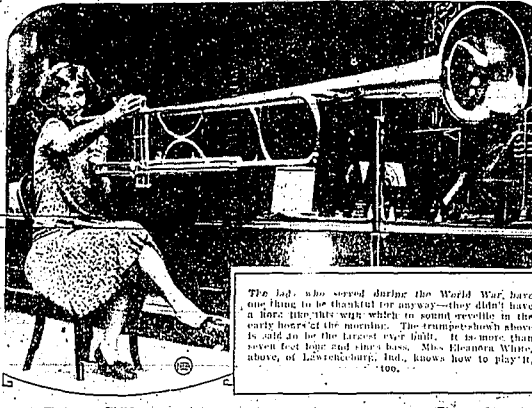

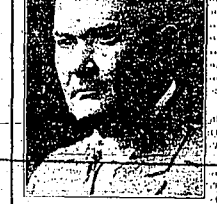

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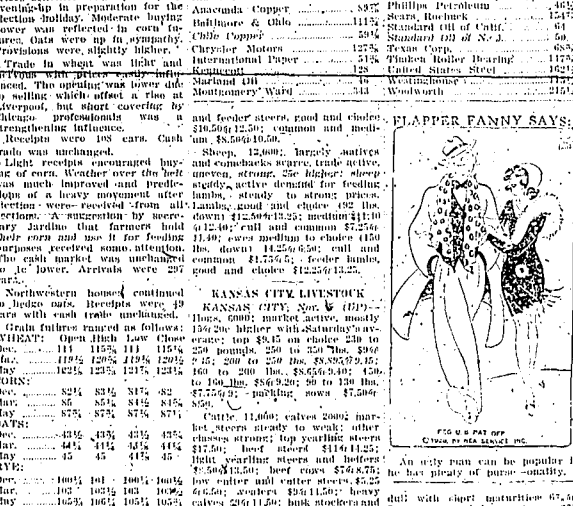
