Hoover Gets 453 Electoral Votes To 87 Captured by Governor Smith

WASHINGTON, Nov. 7 (UP) President Coolidge today sent congratulatory messages to President-elect Hoover and Vice President-elect Charles Curtis. His message to Hoover read:

NEW YORK, Nov. 7 (UP)—Herbert Hoover of California was elected president of the United States. Running for office for the first time in his life, he defeated Governor Alfred E. Smith of New York, a veteran master of politics, in one of the most spectacular victories in the history of American campaigns, according to nationwide returns collected by the United Press today.

On the basis of United Press figures from all sections of the country the tallies today stood as follows: HOOPER 453, SMITH 87. Total 26,253,467, 892. Outlying possessions and Alaska are not yet reported.

Smith, who has drawn greater crowds than Bryan or any other candidate ever in this country appears to have suffered the worst defeat any major presidential candidate ever suffered in the electoral college. By carrying all but 21 electoral votes which still remain in doubt Smith could only equal the low vote of 127 cast for him by Woodrow Wilson in 1912.

Hoover is upsetting all expectations by his terrific vote in the south, where he carried Virginia and Iceland in Florida. In Texas he and Smith have been seen again back and forth for twelve hours.

Smith took Rhode Island out of the count column when he carried it by the slender margin of 1,493 votes, according to unofficial reports. He thereby gave Smith 115,851; Hoover 117,468. In only two southern states did Hoover carry the vote. South Carolina and Louisiana. He has carried the latter.

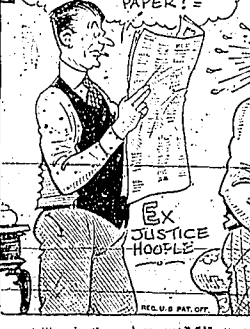

OUR MODERN DAFFODILS

The English gentleman who is trying to exchange cable messages with the mysterious long-eared lady on Mars is entitled to our respectful sympathy. Probably no one has already written him down as an evildoer, indeed, his own earth-bound spouse seems to have done; but there is no real need for us to be unduly critical.

After all, the border line between genius and ordinary lunacy is pretty hard to locate. We classify a man as a half-wit and find to our surprise that his particular brand of lunacy is quite sensible; he turns out to be an Orville Wright or a Guglielmo Marconi, and we replace "half-wit" with "genius."

There are men in this world who cannot quite grasp the universality of the matter of fact, and dread affairs that the majority consider to be quite ordinary. They are moving behind the outer ships of the material world; they catch hints that the rest of us cannot get. They refuse to accept life or its surroundings as settled and unalterable.

In short, they believe in the possibility of miracles. They live in a world where anything can happen, where man merely needs to dream a thing to make it possible.

Some of them, of course, go off on woolly tangents. They try to communicate with Mars or with the spirits of the dead men as Julius Caesar or Frederick Barbarossa. They lose contact, as we say, with the real world, and we, who do not share their enthusiasm, chuckle and agree that the world is, indeed, full of daffodils.

But what is this "real world" we talk about? The world of houses and railroads and stores and factories and movie theaters? Such things do not last very long. They are little more than shadow shapes, clothing for the time the eternal universe in a manner that disguises it. They come and go, changing with the changing years. Back to them, unaffected by them, remains something greater, something that never changes, that was the same in the streets of old Athens and on the hills of Judea as it is today.

What is that? A spirit and a substance; a vague musing of all the hopes and prayers and ideals of the world since the first cave man was struck dumb with wonder at the sunshine and the wind and the night. It is the only reality.

To be in touch with it is to see visions and to dream dreams. Sometimes the visions and dreams do not go quite right; then we adopt a superior attitude and talk about added wits. But sometimes the visionary dreamer gets hold of something solid—and London talks to New York through the air, or man develops wings for his travels about the earth.

Beware how glibly you poke fun at the London radio fan. No living man can tell you just where genius leaves off and foolishness begins.

Best Editorial of the Day

SEVENTEENTH-CENTURY ADVERTISING

MOST people regard advertising as an art sprung to a state of intricate perfection within recent times. Yet it had its beginnings at the very dawn of the newspaper. It is true that there were no articles or "double columns." These early advertisements were more closely related to our classified ads or to the English "Agony Column." And their subject-matter curiously and closely resembles that of their modern successors. In an article in the Nineteenth Century Current Column are examples of old advertisements from the London Gazette of the 1680s, half of dozen of which appeared at the end-of-each-column. Descriptions of light-weight, lost dogs, stolen horses, stray children, and misplaced property make up a large part of them.

Whereas the Chester Mail was on Friday set up by a Person on Harsechick, between Duverney and Coventry, who unhorsed the Boy, after having wounded him, and beque on the Mail, and for the sake of the letters. The said Person had three or four hair and a great coat, with a black hat, and a Seemiter, and rid without Boggs, on a Little Horse with a white slip down his face.

A reward of 20 guineas was offered for information of the said Person. "Piracy on the high seas, forging and counterfeiting letters from Edward Merchant, London," purloining silver plate from the King's own "pantry," were the occasion for other notices.

The escape of bond servants and runaway apprentices was frequently the reason for other advertisements. The descriptions of these unfortunate are very close and accurate, which makes them interesting reading. Thus: John Bolton (born at Dunham) about 20 or 23 years of age round faced with a fresh complexion, full Ey'd, short brown hair curled very little, pretty, tall and slender in a broken Cloth Suit, and a little bowed-Hair. Run away from one Master on Monday the 10th Instant with 735 to an Alley, besides Tobacco, etc.

In these days, too, children were sometimes lost, and without the excuse of a Coney Island crash. Here is an advertisement by an unfortunate mother who had a large daughter: Mary Pount, a girl about eleven years old, little for her age, with small black eyes, a round Pale Face with full red lips, dark brown hair cut short, long bodied with a black ribbon, Gold Knobby Ear-Rings in her Ears; a little Pearl Gold Ring, with a little ring eyes fit on her middle finger; a black and white striped Bangal-night Gown unlined, a black Cape under Petticoat, White Thrud Stockings, and Black Cloth shoes, worn from her Mother's house.

As Mr. Bolner remarks, it was foolish to let the little thing go abroad with so much gold upon her. "And how strange it was that she should fare forth in a nightgown; other mothers treat of the sale of animals—elephants, rhinoceros and a dromedary; the manufacture of pills; cockfighting and horse racing. Any of these things might have attracted the small black eyes of little Mary Pount and caused her to stray from home and a worried mother.

Egg is Cause For Break in Relations

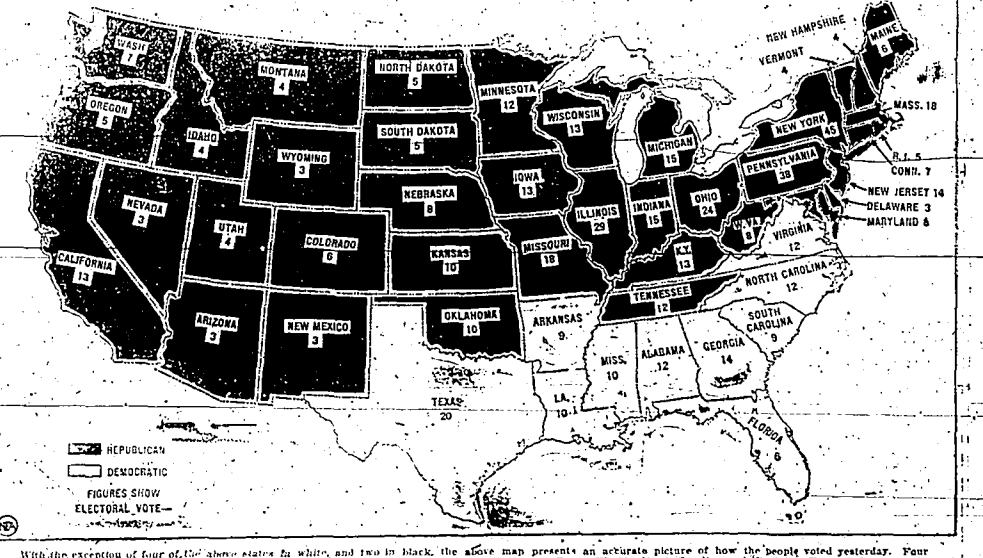

MORTALITY RATE ON TUBERCULOSIS IS GETTING LOWER

low any previous figure for the corresponding period of the year. With the exception of males, the four principal communicable diseases of children are causing lower deaths than in 1927, and even including males the death rate for this group is well below the average.

NEW YORK, Nov. 7.—The end of 1928 will see the lowest mortality figure ever recorded for tuberculosis among the wage-earners of the United States and Canada, according to Dr. Louis I. Dublin, statistician of the Metropolitan Life Insurance Company. Dr. Dublin's latest statement on the mortality rate of tuberculosis among the more than 1,600,000 white industrial policyholders of his company and their dependents during the first nine months of 1928.

"This prediction can be safely made," said Dr. Dublin, "because the end of the year has passed when the maximum mortality from tuberculosis invariably takes place. It is highly improbable that any condition will arise during the final quarter to bring the death rate for the year up to the former minimum. The rate of 72.1 per cent, over last year, of 12.7 per cent over two years ago and of 44.4 per cent since 1924."

Why this experience has been among the industrial policyholders of his company, Dr. Dublin states that in next years the mortality rate of this large group will have invariably proved to be reduced off to find another man to take hold of conditions in the population as a whole.

"The general health conditions in the United States and Canada have been more than satisfactory during the first nine months of the year, according to Dr. Dublin. In only two prior years, 1927 and 1921, has the year's health record for any January-September period been so excellent. "The year 1928 probably will register the lowest death rate for any group of insured persons in the industrial population," said Dr. Dublin, "with another example of a lower death rate, seems destined to show a lower mortality for the year than ever before. Many Fruits Good To Make Vinegar

Vinegar is not necessarily made from apples, although many of the late and windfall apples are utilized in this way. Vinegar can be made from any fruit, or, in fact, from any material which contains enough sugar and is in no way objectionable according to the United States department of agriculture. Vinegar of good quality can be made from oranges, peaches, pears, plums, berries, honey, maple products, watermelon and grapes. Large quantities of some of the fruits mentioned are wasted each year in the United States.

In England vinegar was first made from malt liquor, a method of disposing of ale and beer which had surplus. Malt vinegar is still the standard in the British Isles. Here apple juice is largely used for home-made vinegar, and color is added to the product for household purposes. Whether it is done on a small scale in the home, or on a larger scale in the factory, the production of vinegar is the result of two distinct fermentation processes—an alcoholic fermentation followed by an acetic fermentation. Sugar is the base of vinegar production. Any watery solution of a fermentable sugar may be transformed into vinegar under favorable conditions. Many fruit juices are well suited to this purpose, and they contain sugar in the proper proportion and other necessary or desirable substances.

Distilled or spirit vinegar made from molasses or alcohol obtained from a by-product from the manufacture of other products, is highly compressed yeast, is nearly always colorless and lacks the aroma and flavor of fruit vinegars. For this reason it is not commonly desired for table use, but is extensively used for pickling or preserving.

Directions for making any of the above-named fruit and other vinegars will be furnished by the United States department of agriculture.
