

HUNDREDS OF OUR BELIEVED DROWNED

ASSAILANT OF BOISE GAME WARDEN CAPTURED AND CONFESSES TO TALK OF MURDERING UNCONSCIOUS MAN

Posses of Game Wardens and Ranchers Comb Country for Man Thought to Be Murderer and Wanted by the Officers; He Is Still at Large.

BOISE, Idaho, Nov. 15 (UP)—Zari Shields, one of two bear trappers who reportedly knocked down a hunter, game warden Saturday and then debated killing him, was captured last night by a posse of game wardens and ranchers. The assault occurred when Malcoe attempted to arrest or illegally trap a protected animal.

This state game department has requested that you report on the capture and what Shields came to his cabin for food. Eaton furnished a revolver which he promptly discarded. Shields said he took him to the ranger station.

Officials said Shields readily confessed being one of the attackers and offered to plead guilty to illegal trapping. He also confessed to having Malcoe's life by persuading his companion not to shoot him when he lay on the ground semi-conscious.

The companion was tentatively identified as a man from Oregon who was wanted in Oregon for two murders.

Shields' story, officers said, was plausible. He is contending that Webb had struck the game warden on the head. He himself suggested methods of getting Malcoe to get Webb's mind off the shooting.

Shields said that as soon as he had disarmed Webb from the forehead, he put him in his pocket. Then he persuaded Malcoe to get up and come along with him.

Shields has no criminal record, and the state game warden's life should mean only a light sentence for him. Webb had a criminal record and that he had been his companion in a number of cases.

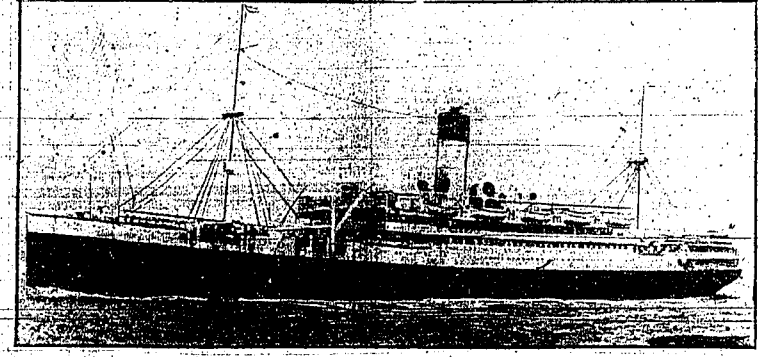
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FIRST PICTURE OF STEAMSHIP VESTRIA ABANDONED BY 300 IN MID-OCEAN

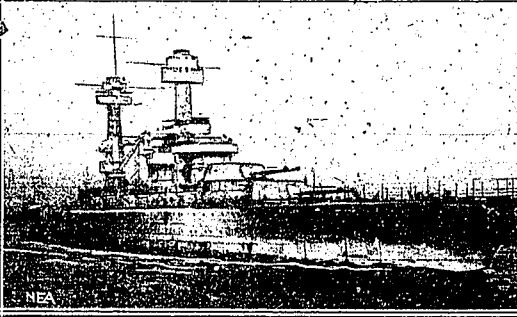

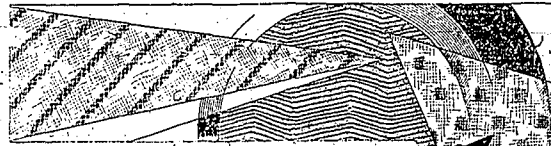

DEMPSY MAY DECIDE TO FIGHT AGAIN

SHARKEY MAY BE FIRST OPPONENT IN RING RETURN

"I Don't Know What I Am Going to Do," Says the Famous Manassas Man.

NEW YORK, Nov. 15.—Jack Dempsey may meet Paolo Uzcudun or Jack Sharkey in a bout at Yankee stadium next Sunday and the announcement of the former heavyweight champion is likely to be made after a conference with Tex Rickard at Miami Beach, Fla., in January.

Those are the paramount points which fight fans are taking for granted today after three days of conferences between Dempsey and Rickard.

"We have arranged for Dempsey to visit my place in Miami Beach," Rickard said after the last conference, "and shortly after his arrival I expect to be in a position to say whether Dempsey will attempt another comeback. There is no secret about the matter now. He doesn't know his own mind yet and there is still plenty of time for him to make it up one way or another."

Although everything points to Dempsey coming back, again, the thing that is troubling both Rickard and Dempsey is that neither of them is sure the former champion can get himself back into shape to meet a first rate contender.

Dempsey is 33, and began fighting in 1916. He has fought only three times since he knocked out Luis Firsiroti in the two 10 round bouts with Tunney and his bout with Sharkey. Dempsey is overweight and out of shape now, he admits it himself.

A strong indication that Dempsey plans to enter training now is provided by the fact that Gus Wilson, his former camp attendant, has increased his close training at the West Hotel in Miami for the winter as a step toward returning Dempsey.

Dempsey will return to California the first of next week and may go into the hills and start training secretly. "I don't know from day to day what I'm going to do," Dempsey said. "I return to the ring. It will be for Rickard and on Rickard's terms."

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YALE-PRINCETON CLASSIC RENEWAL BILLED SATURDAY

For 52 Years the Two Teams Will Have Driven at Each Other on Gridiron.

Yale and Princeton played their first football game in 1872, Princeton winning 3 goals to none, and they played every year since except in 1875 and the war years of 1917-18. Yale has won 27 games, Princeton 16 and nine have ended in ties.

Since the war Princeton has an edge of five games to four. The most crushing defeat Yale ever administered to Princeton was in 1929 when the Yale won 22 to 0. In 1920 Princeton won the game by a 10-0 score.

Honors on individual scores were about evenly divided between the two teams.

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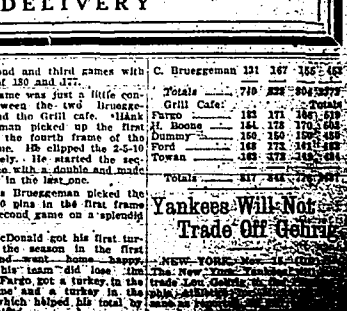
