SEEKING WHAT SHOULD BE
 EDWIG VON BEHVOVEN, greatest of composers, would not have been a great composer if he had not suffered from deafness. So says a French student in a recent communication to the Paris Academy of Scientists.

Behoven, according to the Frenchman's theory, was able to put together great harmonies because he could not hear the noises of the outer world. The sound that he heard, were sounds within his own brain; from them he got the materials to make music that the world will always remember.

Behoven could not hear the music that really existed; he could only hear the music that ought to exist. That is the way it is with most of the men we honor highly. They devote themselves to what ought to be rather than what is.

To be sure, they are usually called "impractical idealists" by their contemporaries. But that does not matter. Since the days of the Platonists, the world has followed meekly at the leading strings of the impractical idealists; and it will continue to do so until it stops spinning.

What is an idealist, anyway? He is a man who is not of patience with the existing order. Like Behoven, his mind is aimed at communications that "the rest of us cannot hear"—in addition to being an idealist he is a man of force. This bears fruit, and he gives us a new world, not always very inspiring; it is worth noting that the "realists" in the world of fiction—the writers who boast loudly that they "see life just as it is"—are the world's profoundest pessimists.

But the world within—ah, that is different. Anything is possible there, anything that we individually are capable of conceiving. There we can see the world as it ought to be; there, like Behoven, we can hear harmonies that should exist but do not. And, if we are strong enough, we can help transform these visionary sights and sounds into realities.

Never look to the outside world for strength and inspiration. You will not often find them there. Look within yourself. Imagine what things should be of the world were remade—and then go ahead and try to shape the reality to fit.

You will be a visionary idealist, to be sure. But it is the visionary idealists to whom the world owes everything it prizes.

THE LOST BATTALION
 EVER since the end of the World War Americans have cherished the story of the famous Lost Battalion. This story has been considered one of the "great tales" in American military history. As an example of pure heroism and endurance it ranks with anything in our annals.

But a disagreeable cloud has been rising about it in recent years. Strange rumors and whispers have passed back and forth. It has been hinted that the Lost Battalion did what it did only because of a gusty blunder and not unlike that which sent the British Light Brigade to charge the Russian guns at Balaclava.

Incompetent leadership has been charged. When Lieutenant Colonel Whittlesey, the commander of the unit, committed suicide by jumping from the deck of an ocean liner a few years ago there were many furze and muds of hands. A magazine writer not long ago wrote a short story, telling of an imaginary incident closely paralleled to the Lost Battalion, and setting forth that the commander, Fred for his bravery, had really bungled the affair frightfully and caused hundreds of brave men to go to their death.

So the story of the Lost Battalion has been robbed of its savor. A lot of us have not known whether to be proud of it or ashamed.

Now a book, "Without Censor," written by Thomas M. Johnson, who was a war-time newspaper correspondent with the A. E. F., has appeared to clear up the whole situation.

Johnson tells the entire story. In the battle of the Meuse-Argonne, the greatest fight American soldiers ever participated in, the 77th division was pushing forward, over difficult ground against still resistance. Whittlesey's battalion was one of several moving forward on a wide front. Whittlesey and his men gained their objective and dug in in a remarkably well-chosen site; the flanking battalions were driven back. Whittlesey and his men found themselves left "up in the air," without support. Strict orders had been given not to retreat. The detachment dutifully held on.

It was not really "lost." It knew precisely where it was, and so did the rest of the army. The only trouble was that the supporting troops could not break through to reach it. The battalion was isolated within the German lines. Time and again efforts were made to relieve it. They failed. The Germans attacked this outpost repeatedly, without success. They finally called on it to surrender. Whittlesey refused—although it happened that he did not use the words "no to" attributed to him. He had his orders, to stick and to die, and his citizens' soldiers stuck, as manfully as any soldiers in history.

Finally, after five days, the American attack caught up with the Lost Battalion and relieved it.

Mr. Johnson pays especial attention to the derogatory rumors and reports that Whittlesey, he says, was brave and wise. He did exactly what any good leader would have done, except that he did it better than some might have done. There was no blundering.

U. S. HIGHWAY, ATLANTIC CITY TO ASTORIA
 (Spokesman Review)

LONGING for a transcontinental highway was expressed in the first republican platform of 1856. After the lapse of 72 years the dream has come true.

The United States department of agriculture reports that United States highway No. 30, the federal aid transcontinental route from Atlantic City, N. J., to Astoria, Ore., is now all improved except for 21 miles in Nebraska.

Of the total 3347 miles, 1623 miles were improved with federal aid, at a total cost of \$11,065,421. More than 41 per cent of that was federal funds.

Of the total route, 1417 miles are surfaced with brick, concrete and bituminous macadam; 365 miles are surfaced with oiled gravel and selected materials; 629 miles are graded and drained earth roads.

The department informs the country that route 30 follows old Indian trails, traders through historic Pennsylvania and Gettysburg and busy Pittsburgh. West of the Missouri it follows generally the historic old Oregon trail into Oregon, and then the majestic Columbia river to Astoria.

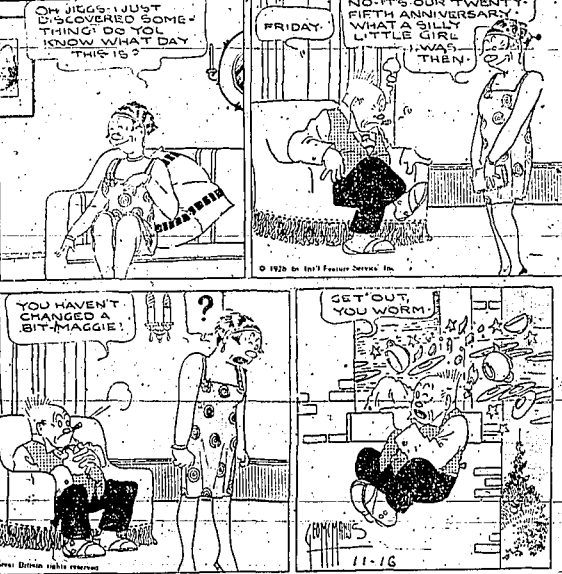
Oregon Grid Squad Attacked By "Flu"

Thousands Trout Rescued By Work Of Many Sportsmen
 LA JARA, Colo., Nov. 16 (AP)—Thousands of trout that formerly swam about the La Jara reservoir in an unimproved condition now thrive in a spot of water that is a paradise for sportsmen.

The task of saving the fish from death because of lack of water was a delicate one. The task of that (thundered about the muddy, fast-draining reservoir) had to be transferred to their new homes by pack trains because of extremely rugged ground.

Several weeks ago a valve head of the reservoir was blown up, apparently by some one seeking revenge against authorities who caused fishing to be prohibited in the reservoir. In order to repair the break, water had to be drained out, and when the task was being accomplished "into" rain and fish were being killed by the plight of the fish. A. Mrs. H. C. Leth, the first mass rescue of the Excelsior game, was formed. Many of the trout were being elected voters. Game wardens arrested several (about 10), but he is able to about poachers who used clubs and pitfalls in catching trout when the water was low in the reservoir.

The task of transporting the fish to new ponds and keeping them alive in the meantime, was performed in open cut at one of the biggest in Colorado's fish culture history.

VESTRIS THOUGHT OLD DEATH TRAP

Investigation Started by the Government Regarding Condition of Ill-Fated Boat.

NEW YORK, Nov. 15 (AP)—The federal government opened today a criminal investigation of the sinking Monday of the British steamer *Vestris*, 240 miles off the Virginia coast with the loss of probably 114 lives, including Americans.

The proceedings began at 2:15 p. m. when U. S. Attorney Charles A. Tuttle filed a formal complaint against the captain and crew of such an investigation.

Tuttle in reading his complaint, charges had been made by survivors that there was incompetence among the crew of the vessel, and that the captain, who was ordered to land, was negligent and that the boat had, supposedly, been left sailing, instead of being towed to a safe anchorage.

Tuttle cited the fact that many American citizens were aboard the ship, and that the captain had been ordered to land, and that the survivors were in New York.

He stated those reasons in justifying the holding of an investigation although the *Vestris* was a British registry.

Tuttle said he was filing the complaint because he wanted a copy of the report to see whether any American maritime laws had been violated or whether any American citizens were injured unnecessarily.

The first witness was the captain, who was asked to describe the events of the sinking of the *Vestris* en route to Argentina with his wife and several young children. The wife and baby are missing. Tuttle testified that "everything was carried aboard the *Vestris* from the start of the trip until the danger was thrown suddenly into the water from the sea."

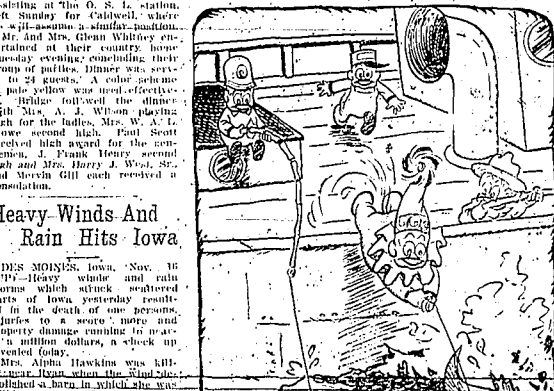

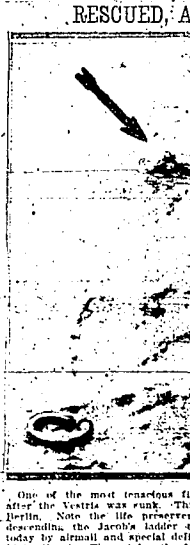

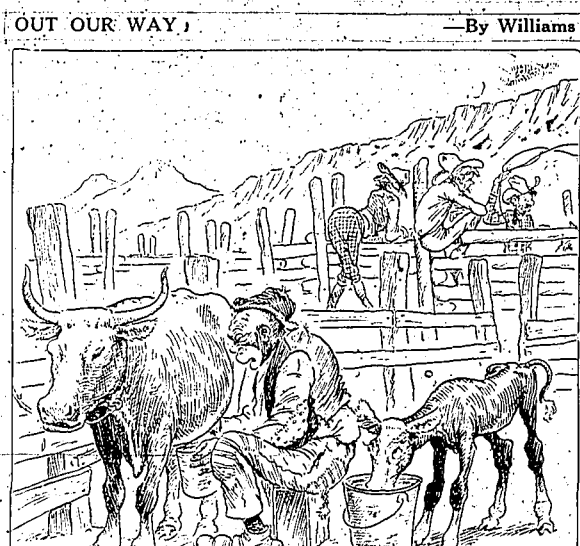

Many Stories Run Riot Concerning Attack on Warden

BOISE, Idaho, Nov. 16 (UP)—Indian detail was made today by R. T. Thomas, Idaho game warden, of a statement attributed to Earl Shields, that J. M. Mabie, one of Thomas's deputies, was attacked as he claims last Saturday. The statement attributed to Shields was that Mabie was an "idiot" when he caught Shields and De Webb illegally trapping beaver that he turned them loose and was permitted to help them.

"Why that makes the game department look like a bunch of school kids," Warden Thomas said. Mabie was struck on the head, his right eye treated here in Boise by a physician, Thomas elaborated, indicating as correct the original version of the encounter as furnished by Mabie and confirmed by Shields.
