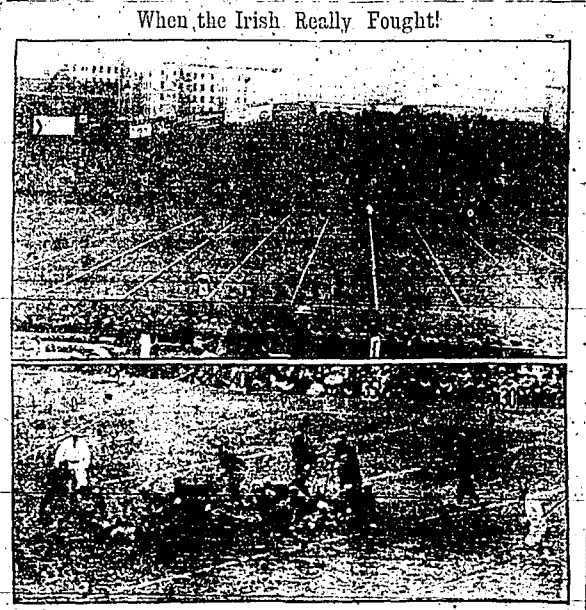

Bankers have advised against speculation to a long time and now appear tired of making further observations public. Those who sought advice and were told to get out of the trading except in the best of issues, have seen the stocks they wished to purchase swoop to sensationally high levels.

Investment trusts also have been buying heavily. These trusts formed to enable investors to "spread" risks and losses over a wide variety of shares, have had their holdings. Today the Fisher Brothers of Detroit and their associates, who are said to have multiplied their security holdings in the present "bull market," are reported planning the largest investment trust in the world, to act as a holding concern for more than \$50,000,000 of their securities of the outset. Arthur Cullen of Chicago is said to be interested in this project.

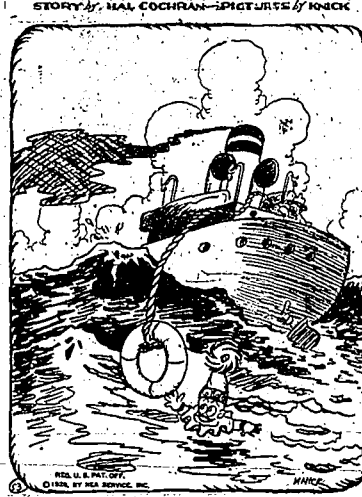

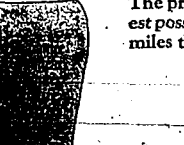

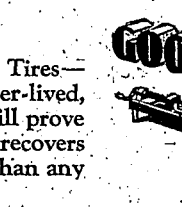
