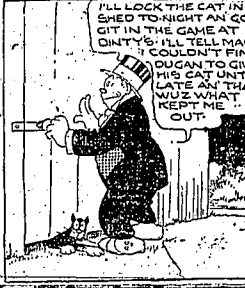

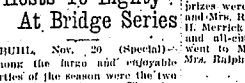

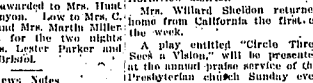

# INSPECTOR CLAIMS VESTRIS RECEIVED GOOD INSPECTION

### Lifeboats Were All Right, but Some of the Ports Were Not Given Examination

NEW YORK, Nov. 20. (UP)—The traditional story of steamship disasters—that combination of mechanical imperfection and human frailty—was traced more deeply today as U. S. authorities sought to learn why the S. S. Vestris went down with 114 lives a week ago.

Today the investigation switched from a U. S. commissioner's office to a little room filled up in the Customs House, a room that overlooks New York harbor from where the Vestris sailed.

There it was testified six of the coal ports on the Vestris were thoroughly inspected before it left New York.

Edward F. Keane, inspector of the steamship inspection service and one of the inspectors to clear the Vestris, admitted under questioning by Dickerson N. Hoover, chief of the inspection service, that he had thoroughly examined only one of the coal ports.

"We were able to examine only four ports on each side because we could not reach the other six which were filled with coal," Keane said.

"Where were these ports that you could not reach?" Hoover asked.

"They were on the after end, but I am certain they were shut tight," Keane replied.

One Door Open

Members of the committee from crew, upon returning to New York on rescue vessels, said one of the doors leading to the coal port was open from the time the Vestris left New York and that when the Vestris struck a rock, the door was in at such a rate, that the "black gang" had to work in water up to their necks.

Immediately after Keane had made this testimony, Hoover read a letter which charged that Keane and Inspector Bruning were trifling during the inspection and that they had not made a thorough inspection of the Vestris.

The letter was written by Sams, and Lansing and was sent to J. L. Groene, the chief supervisor of the inspection in New York. It said:

Letter Sent  
"My Dear Sir:  
"Your statement in yesterday's paper that the Vestris was inspected November 7 is correct. The inspection of Messrs. Keane and Bruning consisted in that two or three gentlemen had a hearty breakfast and luncheon on board and the rest of the time was spent in sitting in the saloon, drinking great amounts of Scotch whisky and English beer and sipping cigarettes of inspection.

And they in the afternoon the gentlemen left the ship with square packages and certain weaknesses in their legs. This is the kind of inspectors you have and if the people wish to put their trust in murderers this is what they get."

"Samuel Lawson."  
"Now Captain, what do you say to that?" Hoover asked.

Keane was indignant and he spoke loudly.

"That is the most outrageous lie I have ever listened to, I never touched a drop of liquor in my life and no man can say I ever took a drink."

Keane's Know Man  
"Do you know this Samuel Lawson?" Hoover asked Keane.

"No, I do not, but if I ever meet him I don't think he will appear before this committee," the inspector replied.

Officials of the investigating group indicated they would attempt to trace Lawson and bring him before either of the two inquiries—the inspection service inquiry and that being conducted before U. S. Commissioner Francis A. O'Neill.

"How many days were spent in the inspection?" Hoover asked.

"Keane replied, he had been aboard four days.

"Was that sufficient time?"

"Yes, ample. During those four days we made a thorough inspection of the Vestris," Keane replied.

The first day was spent in inspecting the 60 life preservers, Keane said, and 65 of those were found to be rotten. These were replaced by the inspector testified.

Lifeboats Equipped  
Contrary to testimony brought out at the government inquiry before Commissioner O'Neill, Keane insisted the lifeboats of the Vestris were fully equipped and were in good working condition. The equipment, he testified, included two pounds of bread, one quart of water for each person, a gallon of oil, sea anchors, lanterns, compass and flares.

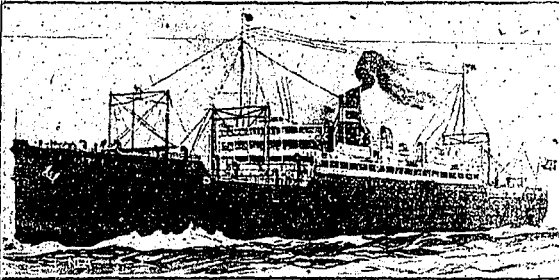
Hoover questioned Keane particularly about lifeboat tests he had described and the inspector admitted that the boats were not lowered completely into the water.

"Why not?" Hoover asked.

"Because coal barges were too close on one side and the ship was too close to the dock on the other," Keane replied.

He added, however, the tests had been most thorough and that he had placed two more men in the lifeboats than the boats were equipped to handle.

# Mutilated Body Is Put In Coal Shed

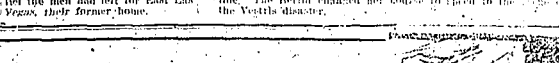

# World Wide Trade Essential Claims United Press Man

CHICAGO, Nov. 20. (UP)—To maintain her prosperity America ought to have, he believes, the most liberal international trading nation the world has ever known.

Charles A. Gifford, president of the United Press, said last night at a banquet given in his honor by Sigma Delta Phi, national journalistic fraternity, which has held its annual convention here.

"America is going to have to do that," said Gifford, "in the face of the keenest competition that the nation encounters in any such venture for new and expanding markets every day."

Gifford said that in view of the importance of foreign trade President Hoover's trip to South America was especially significant.

"No more sentimental notions were ever made by a president of the U.
