ARGENTINA TRADE PROBLEM WILL BE TOLD TO HOOVER

Must Dispel Suspicion That United States Has Put Ban Upon Argentina's Products - BUREAU ARGENTINE, Nov. 22 (AP) - Argentina's present economic problems are so largely related to her growing trade with the United States that this visit of Herbert Hoover will be particularly important. The visit, it is hoped, will afford the American president an opportunity to explain the American viewpoint on commercial questions in which there is now a divergence of opinion and to hear the viewpoint of Argentina. One of the tasks of Mr. Hoover here will be to dispel the suspicion that many of the American restrictions on Argentine products is a commercial ban in disguise. It will be the task of Hoover, according to the statement, to make it clear that Argentina's outspoken criticisms of the American restrictions in Havana, are the action of a man die-hard rather than one who is in the habit of making a habit of it. For example, the average citizen in Argentina views as unreasonable any restriction on Argentine meat, feeling that the recent British investigations proved beyond a doubt that the Argentine inspection service are so rigid that there is no danger of carrying dangerous contagious diseases.

Believes a Ban - He believes that the "ray of hope and much peace" is a banney used by the American farmer and politician to establish a standard ban on Argentine meat importations. The average citizen here believes that the present discussion of a tariff on meat is a step in the same direction, especially since the Argentine inspection service to the U. S. are very small proportion of the domestic consumption.

Another sore point to the Argentine classification of Argentine alfalfa seed, producers here believe that they were eliminated as competitors in the market by the arguments that the seeds were not wholly suitable. In Herbert Hoover, the Argentine people see not a politician, but a man who has accomplished great work and who will appreciate the Argentine viewpoint. He will come here with the full advantage of commencing the results of the people he is visiting-somebody which some others in such a mission might not have.

DO WE NEED MORONS?

"We are coming to recognize," remarks Dr. C. E. A. Winslow, professor in the Yale Medical School, "that the high grade moron is perhaps a necessary and desirable element in a civilization that involves the performance of so many routine tasks repulsive to the mentally alert."

This statement is taken from an article by Dr. Winslow in the current Golden Book, in which he sets forth the pleasing proposition that it is a good thing that all of us are not quite bright.

If we were all gifted with alert, capable brains, the doctor says, we would not be happy. There are in the world many unpleasant jobs to be done, and intelligent people do not want to do them; hence, indisputably, it is necessary that we have a host of morons who will do the work without getting discontented and dreaming of better things.

This is a very fine doctrine if you are sitting somewhere near the top of the social hierarchy, and if, in addition, you feel that our civilization is being run by a little bit of guttering here and there to be absolutely perfect. Otherwise, however, it is apt to be rather depressing.

For it happens that the world changes. We no longer assist to the old Bourbon idea, that all is well if only the well-born few are happy. During recent years there has come to us that it is precisely the average man—the man who has to do the unpleasant tasks, repulsive to the mentally alert—that is important. If he is not happy, then the world needs rethinking.

Dr. Winslow's idea, apparently, is that if this average man is only dumb enough he will be content with his lot. But the world did not spin into form out of glowing stardust merely in order that we should raise a hundred million people content with cheap movies and tavern amusement parks. The moron, submerged in poverty and not caring to rise, was not designed by heaven for that lot.

To be sure, from certain viewpoints a population of morons would be an advantage. A big industrialist would delight in having a breed of workers who were just smart enough to operate machines but not smart enough to organize for better pay or shorter working hours. A political boss would be highly pleased with an electorate that could not see through his output of bunk. All of the forces of reaction would exult in such a situation.

But the democracy of which we have dreamed would die.

We need more education, and not less; broader horizons, not narrower; higher aspirations, not lower. If the time ever comes when the moron is "the necessary and desirable element" in our national life, America is done for.

Best Editorial of the Day

THE WAY TO NAVAL LIMITATION
 (Portland Oregonian)

WHEN congress meets, discussion of the bill for construction of cruisers will be renewed in the senate, but this time in the light of an agreement between Britain and France on strength in cruisers and submarines on the line "United States refused consent at the Geneva conference. Secretary Kellogg refused assent to that agreement on the ground that it proposed to restrict cruisers of 10,000 tons and of six to eight inch guns and proposed to limit on cruisers of smaller tonnage and guns, or on submarines of less than 600 tons. The effect would be to limit cruisers of the type peculiarly suited to the needs of the United States and to leave unlimited the type suited to British needs; also to leave unlimited submarines which "are formidable combatant vessels."

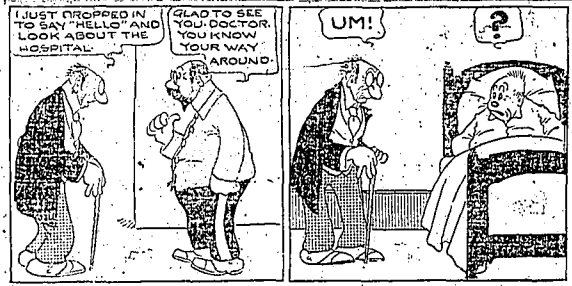
That agreement was a renewed attempt to prevent the United States from attaining naval equality with Britain and to bring France to the aid of Britain in that endeavor. Serving that purpose is the propaganda in this country to incite the idea that defense of American territory and foreign trade does not require a navy equal with the British, that 10,000-ton cruisers are offensive vessels and that construction of such vessels is militaristic. In advancing the last argument pacifists serve the end of foreign naval propagandists, whose aim is stopped up by Rear Admiral Schofield in an article in the Heart of the Navy.

"Disarmament for us (the United States) but preparation for them."

Large cruisers are needed by the United States strictly for defense because the long distance in our island possessions requires wide radius of action and because we lack naval stations on our long trade routes. If it is said that Britain's life depends on foreign commerce, foreign trade is necessary to the life of the American people, also. This country imports \$250,000,000 more of foodstuffs a year than it exports, and it imports raw materials essential to its industries, such as manganese, rubber and tin. Our standard of living requires these materials to keep our industries in operation, which to a growing degree depend on export trade for sale of their products, as they depend on imports for raw materials. Hence, to have our great country, the United States, must keep open trade routes to the continents on the further sides of these Europe and Africa to the east, Asia to the west—defense of which requires a navy equal to that of Britain.

Denial of this need by Britain is the absurd sole to reduction of armaments. If Britain would accept equality in fact as well as in theory and if the peace already established for other nations should be maintained, all-round reduction should be comparatively simple, and disarmament would begin. The only way to bring Britain to those terms seems to be "construction of an American navy equal to hers, American determination to attain and maintain equality being thus demonstrated, Britain might well desist of retaining supremacy and should be ready to accept equality between navies of reduced strength. Pacifists by their opposition to the cruiser bill play into the hands of the big navy-men of Britain and delay actual disarmament.

HEAT BEARS DOWN ON MARYLAND BECK

Hoover Party Forced to Sleep on Deck as Shipping Mexico

HOARDING THE U. S. S. MARYLAND, AT SEA, Nov. 23 (AP)—Awakened over the spacious quarters of the Maryland, sheltered president-elect Herbert Hoover today as he sought a cool spot to breathe his Latin-American speeches. The entire party was getting its first taste of the tropical sun as heat bearing on the deck was intense.

Mrs. Flenore testified that one day she saw her father and said: "People are angry, my eyes are beautiful, aren't they?" She said she was crying and that she was troubled with the neighbors and to the knowledge that her father says "I'm a man in a holster."

Mr. Flenore, son-in-law of the accused man, was called and testified that Thorne would take a shower to be bright and then do the water cleaning with his hands. On cross examination he testified that there was no blood in the dishes to be dried and moved. He also testified that he had cleaned the back of the car in the truck and counted more than 30 shot gun bullet holes and bullet slugs both inside and outside.

Mr. Flenore stated that he had gone to Holme with Mr. Thorne to see the doctor to obtain relief from penitentiary.

"Thorne had never told me where he had had to hire a doctor," testified Old Stand.

Mrs. Ellen Thompson, school teacher, Thorne, son called to the stand and testified along the same lines as her sister had done. She said she had known her brother or to sit for long times grinding and laughing to himself.

He told that Thorne, in leading and unbalancing children, always took the pick off the table. He thought the house in the body of the truck, Mr. Thompson also testified as to the holes dug in the ground and the trip to Sheriff Finch about them.

In the evening session John Thompson was called to the stand for additional cross examination, and Judge Bothwell inquired by detail as to the manner of how a pick was carried on the Thorne truck by the defendant in one instance when a witness said he had helped haul children to be spread on the road. The pick was hoisted from the handle and both were thrust into the embers along the side of the bed, the witness said.

L. O. Havens, automobile battery and accessory man, said he had known the defendant ever as far as 10 years, that his milk tank milk from the defendant and that he worked on cars owned by the defendant.

Believed, Perceived

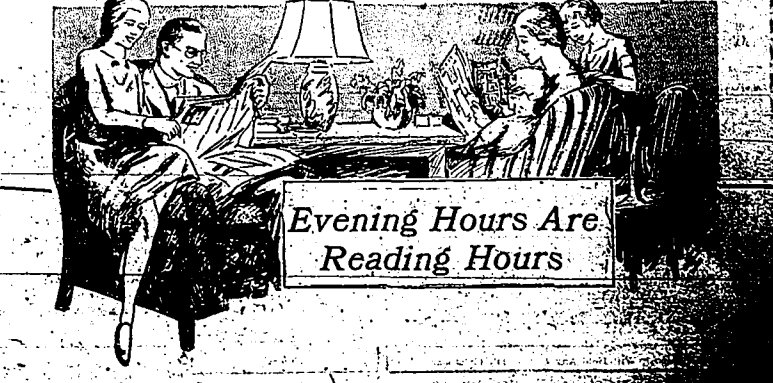
