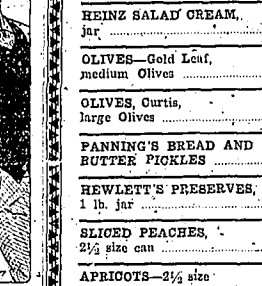

FEDERAL AID FOR STATE HIGHWAYS FAVORED BY WOOD

State Commissioner of Public Works Tells of Highway Association Meeting in Chicago

HOISE, Nov. 27 (Special) — More federal aid for highways of the nation was one of the chief themes of the annual meeting of the American Association of Highway Officials in Chicago, November 11 to 15, according to Tom H. Wood, commissioner of public works, who attended the meeting. Mr. Wood also attended a meeting of western state highway officials held at the same time.

Delegates numbering 320 were registered from 41 states and 15, S. Bureau of public roads. Mr. Wood was on the resolution committee and the administrative side of the highway work.

For Federal Aid Specifically, the association voted as follows on increase in federal aid from 75 million to 100 million dollars annually and Mr. Wood said this would increase Idaho's allotment, which is now more than \$300,000, about \$250,000.

A favorable vote was also taken on a resolution providing an increase in federal highway funds of 25 million dollars. Should congress adopt this policy, Mr. Wood said, Idaho's present allotment would be increased some \$200,000.

Another important resolution put the association on record as favoring identification of road-aiders. In addition to the aesthetic feature of this resolution it has a utility purpose in that the planting of trees and screening along highways and the providing of parking places tends to hold off banks and other dirt slopes in place and thus prevent slides.

Should Regulate Speed The association thinks the speed of big buses and heavy trucks should be more closely regulated. Experience has taught that the limit, controlled by weight, has speed, soon plays havoc with highways, whether they be gravelled or hard surfaced.

Other resolutions adopted called for regulation and control of signs along highways and for increased appropriations for national parks.

Snow removal was one of the important topics of discussion on the administrative committee. Mr. Wood said, as this is one of the serious problems that has not been completely solved. The administrative committee also approved the co-ordination of highways and airways.

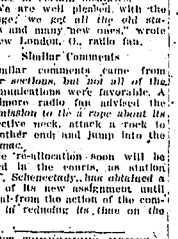
