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DELEGATES SPEAK OF BUSINESS END OF MAJOR SPORTS

First Day of Annual Meet Is
Held Behind Closed Doors
at New Orleans Yesterday.

NEW ORLEANS, La., Dec. 28 (UP)—Executive business will continue today of more than 500 athletic directors and coaches of American universities who are here as delegates to the 22nd annual convention of the National Collegiate Athletic Association.

The first session of the convention was held yesterday behind closed doors when the executive committee of the association announced the awarding of the annual track and field meet to the University of Chicago, and the swimming championship tournament to Washington (St. Louis) University. The first meet will be held June 7 and 8, the second March 29 and 30.

Included among the features of today's concluding program were the annual election of officers, the address of President Palmer K. Pierce and the meeting of various committees.

Naming Committees
Committees for the coming year also will be selected before adjournment and a successor will be named to take the place of Thomas N. Hilde, representative of the southwestern section of the football rules committee. Hilde, former head coach at Texas A. and M. University, is leaving the southwest to become coach at University of Nebraska.

The football committee's rules were being thoroughly discussed in informal meetings of coaches from all parts of the country, who are here for the annual meeting of the football coaches' association which opens tomorrow.

COMMANDER BYRD REACHES BOTTOM OF GREAT WORLD

Message Sent by Explorer to New York Tells of Ice and Snow in the Bay of Whales.

NEW YORK, Dec. 28 (UP)—Commander Richard E. Byrd and his south polar expedition, who reached the first objective in his trip to the bottom of the world, the great ice barrier known as the gateway of the south pole, was said today that the expedition had reached a point 2,000 miles from the bottom of civilization. Through the New York Times, the St. Louis Post-Dispatch and associated newspapers, Commander Byrd sent the following message to Secretary of the Navy, Curtis D. Mearns:

"We have reached today the great mysterious ice barrier. It presents to us an ice ceiling higher than the roof of the ship. This Christmas day, we are thankful and proud to report that we have been able to carry to America the several hundred miles farther south than it has ever been before. We are justifying that airplane which reached its farthest point south on Christmas day, 1919. We are, 2,000 miles from the nearest human dwelling in the only area in the world where a ship can get so far from civilization. HISTORY'S CHANGES

SOME of the transitions in conditions in Idaho that are interesting and have considerable to make us ponder were discussed by Shad Hodgkin when he recounted the rise and fall of Boise county before one of the local luncheon clubs Thursday.
Shortly after the Civil war the population of the county as it was then defined exceeded the total population of the other three counties that constituted Idaho territory. The lure of gold, secured by sheer mining, drew thousands of men and women to the population of Idaho City, Pioneerville and the other mining towns that were centers of the pioneer country. It is interesting to know that the harvest of gold that was taken out of the county by placer mining, which was the main source of income for the county, had the heaviest yielding gold deposits on the western coast.

Placer mining has practically been discontinued, though the industry still maintains some activity. Quartz mining has been resumed in old mines where modern machinery has added to the possibilities of profits that were impossible of realization under mining practices of earlier days. The rich stand of timber has gradually been removed to fill the needs of industry. Boise county, once rich and most powerful in the state, has become a strong probability of dismemberment and a loss of its identity. The old county was carved to death to make new counties. New conditions make it impossible for the mother county to continue to live unless new sources of taxation can be found.

The speaker's attention to the good fortune that is the lot of these counties in Idaho in white agricultural land, and the livestock industry furnish stable valuations. Farm lands are not "pumped out" as has been the case with placer mining in Boise county. Particularly under modern scientific methods of farming, their value does not melt away as do the forests at the touch of industry. Agricultural production and stability are partners.

Farming has been called on to pay a heavy proportion of taxes, education and industrial activity are evident now that disaffection exists over this situation. The farm may not move away, but just because farm land is so easy to value is no reason why it should be imposed on. If Boise county has a tax problem on its hands, that threatens the continuance of the county as a political subdivision, agricultural counties also have taxation problems. Suggestions on how to remedy the situation are several in number. Just what the remedy will be, if any is found, remains to be seen. The Evening Times is decidedly opposed to the proposed measure. It has more confidence in the income tax idea if the cost of collection can be worked out satisfactorily with the provision, too, that general taxes must be reduced by the amount of revenue produced by an income tax.

In other words, an income tax that can be economically collected and permits a property tax offset and provides a new source of tax money but does not increase the amount of tax income would relieve real property which today pays more than its share of the taxes.

A POOR PLACE FOR THE YOUNG

THE badly-sensational situation in the New York metropolitan area, which has been publicized in a current bulletin from the Regional Planning Association of New York.
This bulletin points out that the factory towns, where living conditions are poorest, have the highest percentage of children, while residential towns, where conditions are good, have the lowest.
In such a situation, a young person, for instance, for 10 percent of the population is under 20; in a residential town like East Orange, only 20 percent are under 20.

CUTTING YOSEMITE'S TREES

MUCH of the beauty of the great Yosemite National park is due to the huge stand of beautiful timber that grows on that great public playground. But it happens that much of this timber—11,000 acres of it, to be exact—is owned, not by the government, but by private individuals. And several lumber companies are preparing to exercise their rights and cut down their trees.
The government, without additional legislation, cannot prevent it. Representative Louis Crampton of Michigan has introduced a bill in congress to appropriate funds enabling the government to buy the privately owned lands within the park and save them for the enjoyment of all the people.

AMUNDSEN'S MEDALS

ROYAL AMUNDSEN'S vast collection of medals has been sold to defray the debts of his estate. He died in debt; and his medals now go to the King Frederick university at Oslo, Norway.
It is a rather melancholy thing to think about. Amundsen was one of the giants of his time; yet, when he died, he left nothing but a struggle to settle his estate. A collection of medals and decorations.

IDAHO BETTER OFF WITHOUT THEM

A HOST of men engaged in the mining industry in Idaho will view with approval the action of the New York state legislature, which sentenced George Graham Rice to serve four years in Atlanta federal penitentiary, and to pay a fine of \$5,000. Walter K. Yonston, president of the Idaho Copper Corporation, who was tried with Rice for using the mails to defraud in the sale of stock, was sentenced to nine months in Westchester county penitentiary.

These men made Idaho their field of operations, knowing that at the state's long record of profitable mining operations set an alluring prospect for their designs upon unwary speculators.
Rice's career, as reviewed by the United States attorney at the trial, probably constituted a record in this country. The government's prosecutor told the courts that the defendant's criminal career began with a first offense when at the age of 20, in 1870.
These men and their associates found their nemesis in Stewart Campbell, state mine inspector of Idaho, who officially warned the public against their exploitations. In retaliation, they brought a blistering suit against him for \$100,000 damages for libel, but met with defeat in the United States district court at Idaho.

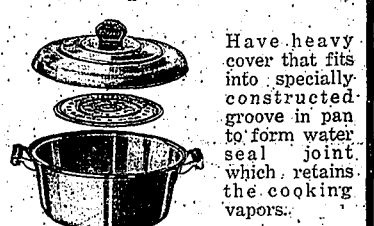

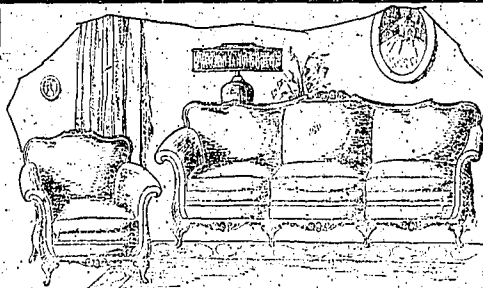
