If the democracy is bankrupt it should let the fact be known.

A GOOD INDICATOR.
By watching the advertising columns of a newspaper we are enabled to know the exact conditions of mercantile affairs and the general prosperity or depression in the town where that paper is published. We can at our desk and pick out the five best

business towns and the dead towns. There is no better index to a town than its paper; it is a better criterion to go by, and is considered so by sagacious men, than a photograph. It is the enterprise of the inhabitants and not the size of the buildings, that makes the town. You may pick up a paper and read at a glance, "We mean business" or "We're deadlier than a stuffed bird," as plain as though it was printed in tin line type and ink across every page—Barley Bulletin.

The working of the latest option law in this county makes the office of sheriff one of the most important in the county and the people of the county should see to it that the man who goes into that office is at least in sympathy with the enforcement of the law against illegal liquor selling. With the sheriff rests the whole fabric of successful prosecution and should be opposed to the conviction of any offender it would be very easy to get men on the jury who would stand for release of the prisoner regardless of the evidence. With such power invested in the sheriff, the importance of his office cannot be too strongly impressed upon the people who want the latest option law to have a fair trial.

The organization of the Law and Order League this week with men of recognized standing in the county is the first move in the ranks of the local option forces toward making good on the promises made to the voters. The league, which consists of a county organization with local units, will be formed primarily for the purpose of prosecuting illegal tigers and all violators of the latest option law. A ten percent "dollar fund" is being raised for the purpose of making sure that every case which comes up will be given all that the law calls for. The work of ferreting out violators will be in the hands of only two or three citizens and the rank and file will not know until arrests are made what is doing. The Law and Order League is not made up of pro-local optionists altogether, but of many citizens who voted wet, but who believe that the law as voted should be enforced.

The citizens in the Twin Falls district are eagerly looking forward to the time when the city council will make use of the fire hydrants which at present are lying idle in the woods near the site of the old fire house. It would even be necessary to remind them that the taxpayers in the residence sections of the city are entitled to something in return for the taxes paid in for annual maintenance of the city. The facilities for fire fighting

are none the best in Twin Falls, taking into consideration the amount of money expended, and every move made by the council to increase the protection will meet with hearty approval by every citizen. The maintenance of a paid fire department is imperative and most especially in the efficiency of the chemical engine the only salvation of the many homes in the city outside of the range of the few fire plugs. That the chemical engine be kept at its highest point of efficiency may take considerable money, but if it does the people feel that the money will be well expended.

A COMMUNICATION.
The practice of throwing the carcasses of dead animals and other decayed matter in the river or canyon or any other stream should be stopped. The law should be rigidly enforced. Filth should never find its way to any stream of water and the streams should be guarded and protected by every man who is a devotee of good health and the continuance of human life. To say nothing about the noxious and acres of dead horses and cattle that are hauled from town and country thrown along the Snake River canyon, both on top and down in the canyon, while some are only a few yards from the main road. The principle dumping ground seems to be one and one half mile from the Boulevard. Many tourists travel by the way of Blue Lake boulevard and the town ship like vermin to the falls. They seldom return the way. These carcasses are very suggestive to travel, to say nothing about what the settlers have to endure who live close to the non-road. Too many people are careless and unconcerned and they should be made to know that human life is too valuable to be sacrificed. Disease germs are too plentiful already.

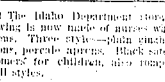

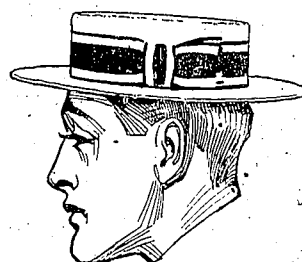

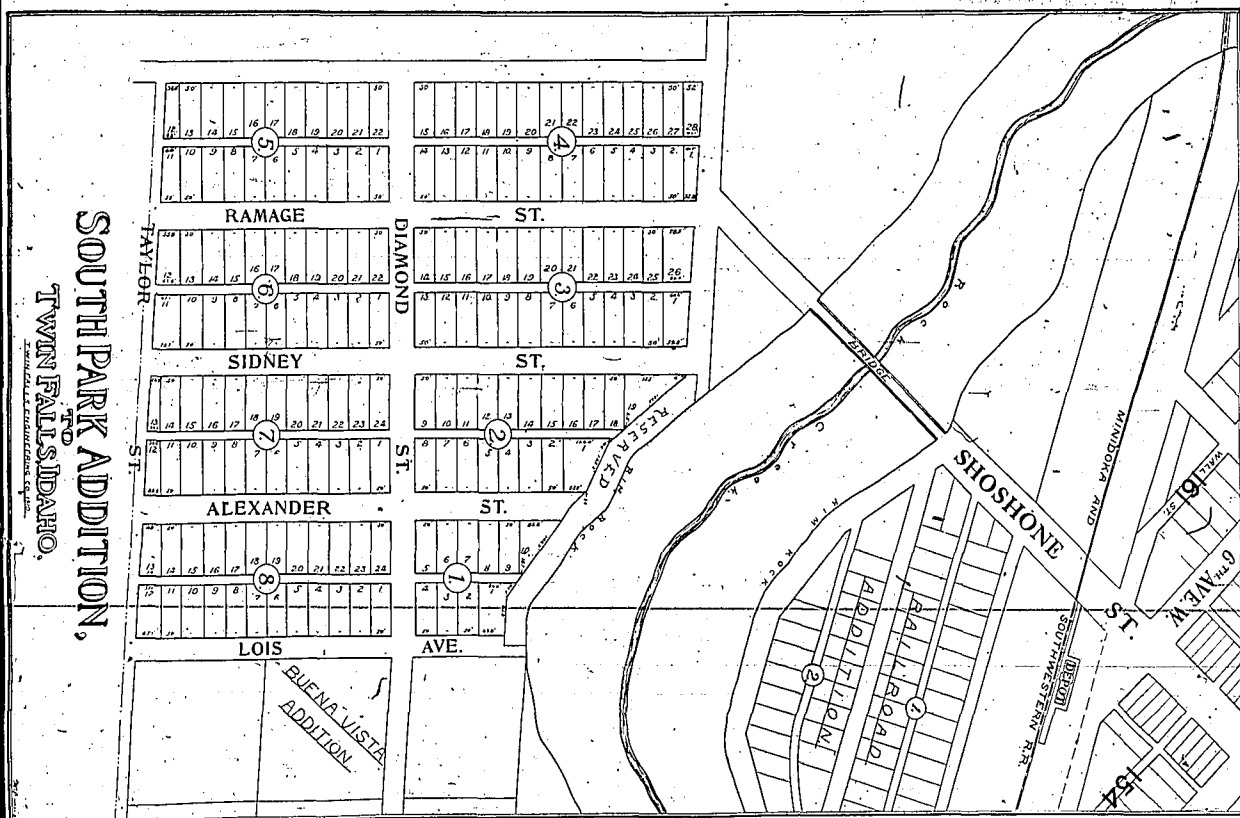

MILK MUST BE BOTTLED.

New Regulations Passed By Idaho Board of Health.

On May 8th, the new regulation adopted by the state board of health will go into effect, requiring the bottling of all milk sold in the state of Idaho. This regulation reads as follows:

"No person, firm or corporation on or after May 15, 1910, shall deliver any milk or cream in quantities less than one gallon, except in sanitary bottles, sealed with suitable cap or stopper, except where milk is sold at a milk house or dairy, where the same may be dipped."

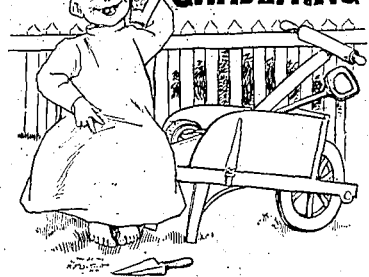

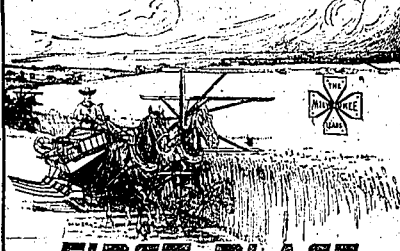

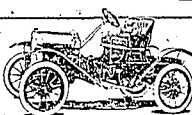
