

## TWIN FALLS WILL HAVE TELEPHONE COMPETITION

W. W. Humphrey Makes Application for a Franchise Which Will Be Acted Upon Favorably by the Council at Its Next Meeting—Plans Contemplate Network of Telephones Over the Entire Tract and Connection with Salt Lake and Boise Systems

W. W. Humphrey of Twin Falls made formal application to the city council on Monday evening for an independent telephone franchise. County Attorney F. A. Hutto, counsel for Mr. Humphrey, submitted a form of franchise which was taken under consideration and will be acted upon at the next meeting of the board. Action was deferred for the reason that the council wished to first obtain copies of the franchises granted to independent telephone companies elsewhere in order that Mr. Humphrey's franchise might embody all the desirable features contained therein. In discussing Mr. Humphrey's application the members of the council framed resolutions in favor of granting the franchise, their only desire in not taking immediate action being for the purpose of incorporating all necessary provisions.

In support of his application Mr. Humphrey stated that he was willing to put up a cash bond of \$10,000 as a guarantee of good faith. It was his intention to proceed with the work of installation immediately upon the granting of the franchise. He had given the subject careful consideration, asserted Mr. Humphrey, and had conferred with men experienced in the independent telephone business. Moreover, he was willing that the franchise should contain a provision authorizing its transfer or sale to a competing company. It was his purpose to furnish Twin Falls with competitive telephone service. Such a service, he believed, was urgently needed. He would, when granted a franchise, install a strictly first class exchange, equipped with the latest apparatus and would be in position to furnish service of the first quality.

## COUNCIL DECIDES UPON LATERAL SEWER SYSTEM

Seventeen Blocks in the More Densely Populated Section of the City to Be Covered in the First District. Which Will Be Created This Month—System Will Cost \$14,500, or at the Rate of Approximately \$30 Per Lot—Objections Will Be Heard on May 25.

The city council has announced its intention to create a lateral sewer system which will embrace blocks 72, 73, 74, 75, 76, 77, 86, 87, 88, 89, 102, 103, 104, 105, 117, 118 and 132. This takes in the alleys between Ninth and Tenth avenues from Shoshone avenue to Fourteenth street; between Tenth and Main street from Seventh to Eleventh street; between Main street and Twelfth avenue from Seventh street to Eleventh street; between Twelfth avenue and Thirteenth avenue from Seventh street to Ninth street, and the alley between Thirteenth avenue and Fourteenth avenue from Shoshone avenue to Ninth street. The system will be extended to block 77 for the purpose of taking in the public school. The estimated cost of the system is \$14,500, which would mean an expense to the property owners of approximately \$30 per lot, regardless of the width of the lots. It is believed that the system can be financed without resort to a bond issue as no public spirited citizen would be justified in asking for five or ten years' time on such a small amount. Men of sound judgment are of the unanimous opinion that the building of the sewer system will easily increase the value of the abutting property more than the cost of the installation. The Townsite company, upon whom the heaviest burden will fall, has announced its intention to stand with the citizens and put up its proportionate share of the cost of the sewers in every block where the other property owners desire sewer service.

Saturday, May 25, is the date set by the council for hearing objections to the lateral sewer system.

## NORTH SIDE COMPANY OUTLINES ITS PLANS

Will Bring Land Seekers to Twin Falls and Buhl, Whence They Will Be Driven Through the Big West End Tract—Ferry Will Be Installed at Abbey to Give Buhl Close Connection—Northwest End Will Be Served by Way of Riverside Ferry.

MILNER, May 8.—The plans for the opening of the west end of the North Side project, which are now unfolding, are of tremendous importance to the south side of the Twin Falls tract, and especially to the cities of Twin Falls and Buhl. Briefly, the plan is to swing the landsloppers around through the north side tract of 160,000 acres, using Twin Falls and Buhl as bases. With the exception of about 30 sections, all the west end of the North Side tract lies west of Blue Lakes. The Twin Falls North Side Investment Co. will open an office in Twin Falls and will also install quarters at some point to be selected in the North Side tract. Land seekers are already coming in to look over the North Side project, that is, the western portion. To obtain hotel accommodations they must come to Twin Falls or Buhl, and the intention is to so arrange matters that they can either start from Twin Falls, drive through the tract and take the train for home at Buhl, or start at Buhl and return to the city of Twin Falls. They will be ticketed to either Twin Falls or Buhl as they desire.

To facilitate the movement of land seekers, the Twin Falls Investment company will make a proposal to the citizens of Buhl and vicinity to establish a ferry at Abbey, four miles north and three miles east of Buhl. The North Side project is at that point and with a little work they can be placed in first class condition. Under ordinary conditions a land seeker can leave Twin Falls in the morning, drive over the tract and reach Buhl in the evening, or vice versa. Those who wish to look at the land under the North Side project northwest of Buhl, and there will be a great many, will find a splendid and excellent ferry at Judge Blue Lakes, seven miles north and three miles east of Buhl. Doubtless a large proportion of the land seekers will want to see the Thousand Springs and the Hagorman valley, and they can be brought in and out of Buhl by way of Riverside, affording a splendid drive and magnificent scenic views.

In any event the Twin Falls Investment Co. will install a ferry at Abbey and it is confidently expected that the citizens of Buhl will gladly aid in the movement, which will be of vast benefit to that town and to the west end of the tract. During the next two or three years, while the west end of the North Side project is being settled, vast quantities of hay, grain and vegetables will be consumed by the settlers on that side which the settlers in the vicinity of Buhl will supply. It is absolutely necessary that transportation facilities be provided and the plans thus far decided upon have that in view.

Until such time as a town shall have been established on the North Side and provided with hotel accommodations, Buhl and Twin Falls must necessarily handle the new arrivals. Moreover, fully 95 per cent of the land seekers will want to inspect the south side tract before filing and the ride to or from Buhl will give them the opportunity. Buhl is almost certain to catch nearly all of them, either coming or going, and Twin Falls will do the same.

J. B. Perrine, general manager of the Twin Falls North Side Land & Water Co., is arranging with James A. Gaither, the Twin Falls Ironman, to establish a stage line from Twin Falls to the west end of the North Side tract. The route will be by way of

Blue Lakes, going in, and by way of Buhl, coming out. Land seekers will have the option of going where they please. They can take the Hagorman valley and Thousand Springs, coming into Buhl by way of Riverside, or cut across by way of the Abbey ferry. The chances are in favor of their visiting Hagorman in order that they may have an opportunity to inspect that beautiful valley, which is one of the garden spots of the west. There they can see the possibilities of the Twin Falls project fully demonstrated.

Every section corner and every quarter section corner on the North Side is being distinctly marked, said Mr. Perrine. On the section corners are being placed four-inch square and eight-foot high. These posts are accurately marked and are painted white so that they can easily be discerned from a distance. The quarter posts are also four inches square and six feet high, unpainted. They are likewise carefully marked so that there is no possibility of confusion. The object of the company is to give every man ample opportunity to inspect the land and to do so comfortably. Land seekers can buy their tickets to either Twin Falls or Buhl. By starting from either of these cities and swinging around in a semi-circle, they will see both sides of the tract. They can satisfy themselves regarding what has been done on the south side. They have an opportunity to see Shoshone valley, Blue Lakes, Thousand Springs, Salmon Falls and the Hagorman valley. Blue Lakes and the Hagorman valley will give them a very good idea of what has been done here in the way of fruit growing and, as it is our intention to show them everything. We have a right to feel proud of the Twin Falls project as it stands at this time.

The best possible advertisement of the North Side project could have and the Hagorman valley is also a splendid object lesson.

The North Side company is sinking wells at several points on the tract and upon the success with which they meet in this experiment much depends. If artesian flow is obtained on the north side, and there is every reason to believe that it will, the west end will have a great boon. Each of the 1000 sections on the north side of the Snake river, is being opened up. A large hydraulic ram is being installed there. The ram will lift water to the top of the rim rock for use during the construction period. This water will be a great convenience to land seekers, contractors and travelers.

The gasoline launch which was placed in commission in the reservoir above the Miller dam two years ago has been refitted and repainted and christened the "Stella Perrine." The "Mary McLane" has also been recommissioned and will be used in hauling sand for use in mixing concrete for the main canal.

The pipes for the Milner waterworks were ordered some three months ago but they have not arrived. The delay is due to the fight between the Great Northern and the Harriman system. The pipe was purchased in Tacoma but the Great Northern will neither furnish cars for the shipment nor permit the O. R. & N. to load it on cars belonging to that system. Two temporary pumping plants are being installed and the experimental farm will be irrigated in a few days.

Whereupon the following proceedings were had, to-wit: The board proceeded to district, create, establish and bound the various school districts of Twin Falls county and declared the same to be as follows:

School District No. 1 (Milner)—All that part of Twin Falls county lying east of a line described as follows: Commencing at the intersection of the north line of the right of way of the Mindoka & Southwestern railroad with the main canal of the Twin Falls Land & Water Co. in section 35, township 10 north, range 15 east, and running thence due south to the south side of township 11 south, range 20 east.

School District No. 2 (Muirhead)—Commencing at the intersection of the north line of the right of way of the Mindoka & Southwestern railroad with the main canal of the Twin Falls Land & Water Co. in section 35, township 10 north, range 15 east, and running thence down the Snake river; thence down the Snake river to the intersection of the same with the section line between townships 10 and 11 south, range 19 east; thence due south to the south line of township 14 south, range 19 east; thence due north to the north line of township 10 north, range 15 east; thence north to the point of beginning; thence north to point of beginning.

School District No. 3 (Hanson)—Commencing at the intersection of the section line between sections 16 and 10, in township 10 south, range 13 east with the Snake river, thence south to the section line between sections 16 and 10, township 11 south, range 19 east; thence west three miles; thence north to the Snake river; thence up Snake river to the point of beginning.

School District No. 4 (Stricker)—Commencing at the northwest corner of township 12 north, range 15 east, thence south three and a half miles; thence west three miles; thence south one-half mile; thence west nine miles; thence north four miles to the township line between townships 10 and 11 north; thence east two miles to place of beginning.

School District No. 5 (Rock Creek)—Commencing at the southeast corner of section 24, township 11 south, range 18 east, and section 10, township 11 south, range 19 east; thence north to the section line between sections 16 and 10, township 11 south, range 19 east; thence east to the southeast corner of section 35, township 11 south, range 18 east; thence east one-half mile to point of beginning.

School District No. 6 (Kimberly)—Commencing at the point of intersection of the section line between sections 10 and 11, township 10 south, range 18 east, with Snake river; thence south to the southeast corner of section 24, township 11 south, range 19 east; thence north to the section line between sections 16 and 10, township 11 south, range 19 east; thence east four miles; thence north to Snake river; thence up Snake river to point of beginning.

School District No. 7 (Twin Falls)—Commencing at the intersection of the range line between ranges 17 and 18 east with Snake river and running thence south to the southeast corner of township 10 south, range 16 east; thence west six miles to township line; thence north on township line to the intersection of the same with Rock creek; thence up Rock creek to the intersection of the same with Snake river; thence up Snake river to point of beginning.

School District No. 8 (Union)—Commencing at the point of intersection of the township line between townships 9 and 10 south with Rock creek; thence up Rock creek to the intersection of the same with the low line canal; thence down the low line canal to the intersection of the same with the township line between townships 10 and 11 south; thence west six miles to place of beginning.

School District No. 9 (Filler)—Commencing at the northeast corner of section 4, township 10 north, range 16 east; thence south on section line to the intersection of the same with the low line canal; thence up the low line canal to the intersection of the same with the range line between ranges 16 and 17 east; thence south on range line to the intersection of the same with the low line canal; thence down the low line canal to the intersection of the same with the township line between townships 10 and 11 north; thence west six miles to place of beginning.

School District No. 10 (Marion)—Commencing at the northeast corner of Rock creek at Snake river and running thence up Rock creek to the intersection of the same with the township line between townships 9 and 10 north; thence west on township line to the southwest corner of township 9 south, range 16 east; thence north on range line to Snake river; thence up Snake river to point of beginning.

School District No. 11 (Tice)—Commencing at the northeast corner of section 24, township 9 south, range 15 east; thence south three miles; thence west three miles; thence north three miles; thence east three miles to place of beginning.

School District No. 12 (Buhl)—Commencing at the northeast corner of section 24, township 9 south, range 15 east; thence south three miles; thence west three miles; thence north three miles to the southeast corner of section 16, township 10 south, range 15 east; thence west six miles; thence north six miles to the northwest corner of section 22, township 9 south, range 14 east; thence east nine miles to place of beginning.

School District No. 13 (Austin)—All that part of Twin Falls county north of the township line between townships 8 and 9 south.

School District No. 14 (Roseworth)—Commencing at a point where the line between townships 8 and 9 south and section 22, township 9 south, range 14 east, and Twin Falls county, and running east on said line to Snake river; thence up Snake river to the intersection of the same with the section line between sections 16 and 10, township 9 south, range 14 east; thence south on said section line to the northwest corner of section 22, township 10 south, range 14 east; thence west on township line between townships 10 and 11 south; thence east to the southeast corner of section 22, township 10 south, range 14 east; thence south on township line to the line between townships 13 and 14 south; thence west on said township line to the west line of Twin Falls county; thence north to place of beginning.

School District No. 15 (Butte)—All that part of Twin Falls county lying south of the line between townships 13 and 14 south and west of the line between ranges 16 and 17 east.

Although Twin Falls county started with an empty treasury, it will not have the expensive experience of other new counties in Idaho. In many of the older counties the county warrants go begging and are subjected to heavy discount. Not so in Twin Falls. When the first batch of county warrants was issued a few days ago the First National bank of Twin Falls announced its readiness to cash all of them at par. A Twin Falls county warrant is as good as a national bank note, a conviction which does not prevent elsewhere. When a man pays forms work for the county he has the satisfaction of knowing that his money is promptly forthcoming. This means that the percentage usually shaved from county warrants will be saved to the county and the people will profit materially thereby.

It is high time that Twin Falls had a competitive telephone system. The present service is so farcical that few take it seriously. A long distance call is a 25-cent joke and a local call is generally a mild and harmless lesson in elocution and a test of patience. Patronizing put in long distance calls in the same spirit shown by the man who applies a worthless brake to his wagon going down hill, because it sounds good and makes him feel as though he were doing the proper thing even though it may be futile. The phone company would do well to consider the property value of the city and county and would ameliorate conditions which could not be worse.

With a few assessments yet to be made, the assessed valuation of the city of Twin Falls aggregates \$910,000 on a 60 per cent basis. This is equivalent to an actual valuation of \$2,000,000, a very tidy showing for a city that lacks six months of being three years old. It is believed that the county assessment on the same basis of 50 per cent valuation will exceed \$5,500,000, which will give it a greater revenue than that estimated at the time the county was divided. When it is considered that two years ago the assessed valuation of the county did not amount to \$100,000, the increase is little short of marvelous.

It is gratifying that the council has decided to go ahead with the construction of the lateral sewer system in Twin Falls. The system is urgently needed and if the lot owners in the district to be covered show the proper spirit they can save themselves and the city a considerable sum. There is no apparent need of going to the expense of bonding the district when a cash payment of \$20 per lot will cover the cost. The investment is insignificant compared with the returns which may reasonably be expected.

### COUNTY OFFICERS' EXPENSES

County Attorney Defines Their Legal Character.

County Attorney Hutto has submitted to the county commissioners the following opinion regarding the allowance of expenses to county officers:

**OFFICE OF COUNTY ATTORNEY.**  
 Twin Falls, Idaho, May 6, 1907.

To the Board of County Commissioners of Twin Falls County, Idaho:

Gentlemen—In response to your inquiry as to what the law is governing your allowance of expenses to county officers, the last expression of the legislature is found in the session laws of 1899, on page 405. It reads as follows:

"No officer or deputy shall retain out of any money in his hands belonging to the county any salary, but all actual and necessary expenses incurred by any county officer or deputy in the performance of his official duty shall be a legal charge against the county and to be retained by him out of any fees which may come into his hands.

"All fees which may come into his hands, from whatever source, for and above his actual and necessary expenses, shall be turned into the county treasury at the end of the quarter.

"He shall at the end of the quarter file with the clerk of the board of county commissioners a sworn statement, accompanied by proper vouchers showing all expenses incurred, and all fees received, which must be audited by the board as other accounts.

"This statute was construed by our supreme court (Hills, constable vs. Bingham, county) on February 8, 1900, and lays down three positive propositions that must be in these accounts before you can allow an expense account to any officer. First, it must be itemized; second, it must be accompanied by proper vouchers; third, it can only be considered in connection with the officer's quarterly report.

The court also says that "actual and necessary expenses" do not include hotel bills, in part it says: "No living expenses, such as charges for food and board of county officials, under the statute, legal charges against the county? We think not. A man must eat and sleep, whether he is an officer or not; or, in other words, such expense is not 'actual and necessary' in the performance of official duty."

With the above statute and construction of our highest court, known to the legislature convening in 1901, it proceeds to define by statute what the meaning of "actual and necessary" expenses is.

On page 225 of the session laws of 1901 the following definition is given: "The term actual and necessary expenses shall be deemed to include all traveling expenses incurred by any county officer when absent from his residence in performance of the duties of his office."

This legislation coming immediately after the court's decision in the meaning of the statute of 1899, compels me to say that the law now is that when a county officer is absent from his residence, the discharge of his duty as an officer, his actual and necessary expenses includes his reasonable hotel bill.

It is the duty of each and every officer of this county who expects to ask the county to bear his expenses while away from his residence in the discharge of his duties as an officer, to take receipts from any and all people who furnish them any of these necessities and to present to you these receipts when they file their claim for allowance, and until they furnish these receipts you can not under the law allow their claim.

The statute of 1899 is plain on the question that the claim must be accompanied by proper vouchers. The supreme court speaks plainly on this question and the legislature of 1901, while it defined by statute the meaning of "actual and necessary expenses" did not see fit to change the law on accompanying the claims with proper vouchers.

The people are to be congratulated on having county commissioners who look carefully into these matters and who consult the law early, that they may avoid mistakes and thereby save the taxpayers.

### EPWORTH LEAGUE CONVENTION

To Be Held in Twin Falls on June 18 and 19.

On the 18th and 19th of June there will be held in Twin Falls a convention of the Eastern Idaho District Epworth League.

The word "district" in this connection refers to presiding elder's district. While the public at large is more or less familiar with the organization of the district church, but few appreciate the importance in its ability of the presiding elder. The Methodist church is a congregational denomination as distinguished from a presiding elder's church, stands alone. Each is a part of a complete and thorough organization. The denomination is divided into conferences and each conference has a presiding elder of the district being the presiding elder. He is continually on the move, making quarterly visits to each of his churches, encouraging and edifying the weaker, leading them in touch with the stronger. Moreover, he is the advance agent, always on the lookout for strategic points for new churches.

The district in which Twin Falls is located is 600 miles long, east and west, by several hundred north and south. It is rather too large for compact organization, and for Epworth League work is divided into two parts. The convention to be held here on June 18 and 19 is composed of delegates from the chapters in the eastern of the two parts.

The work of the convention will consist of studies as to practical methods of Epworth League work; addresses by a number of the best speakers the state affords, and religious-enthusiastic singing. The sessions will be well worth attending.

Some 50 delegates are expected. These delegates have been promised their entertainment while here, and the members and friends of the church would extend to them the hospitality of their homes. Suppose you tell Rev. Parker that you will make room for one or two delegates.

### FROST REPORTS EXAGGERATED

Judge Wood of Boise Makes Encouraging Statement.

Judge Fremont Wood of Boise, one of the leading apple growers in the west, is of the belief that the frosts of last week did not damage the fruit crop nearly so much as is supposed. He said:

"I think a wrong impression has been formed by many fruit growers who have feared that their fruit was destroyed by the frosts of the night of the blossom had turned dark colored and the stem showing discoloration and injury. This condition does not necessarily mean loss of the fruit. If the stem is uninjured the fruit will make its growth and the only final injury will be found in a slight deformity of the crotch and in the apple when the fruit is matured. Four years ago we had similar conditions as a result of a heavy freeze early in April. Just after the buds had opened, but some three weeks before the time for them to be in full bloom. That year it was impossible before the bloom opened to find a bud that did not show much discoloration. Inside, and when in full bloom the stem seemed perfectly dry, yet we had a large crop that year.

"Some varieties probably are injured more than others, but if every one having an apple orchard instead of considering his fruit fatally injured will properly examine it at once they will find that a great percentage of the injured bloom will thoroughly overcome the injury and produce good fruit.

"A few days ago I received a letter from a Colorado fruit grower who is also connected with one of the largest fruit and commission houses in Chicago, and he informed me that the entire fruit crop of Colorado was destroyed by the frost which occurred there from the 19th to the 21st of April. At the same time a very large percentage of the fruit crop of the Mississippi valley was seriously injured and this would make it well worth while for the fruit growers of Idaho to use every endeavor to care for the fruit we have left. No grower should relax his efforts in cultivation, irrigation and spraying. Southwestern Idaho has never known a failure in the fruit crop and this year is not likely to prove an exception."
