### FANCY SHIPMENT IS MADE TO AMERICAN FALLS.

J. H. Hinton Makes a Successful Experiment With Fall Wheat and Rye, of which He Secures a Splendid Stand-Potato Shipments.

HANSEN, May 15.—A car of wheat was shipped for American Falls last Saturday by Hansen farmers. Those having an interest in the car were Messrs. Corson, Pierce, Holm and Walker. Mr. B. Williams of Kimberly weighed and tested the grain as it came in. He reports that all of the grain taken in either at this place or Kimberly Mr. Pierce's made the best test. The variety grown by Mr. Pierce is known as "Sonder" wheat. It tested 62 pounds, is a full, plump grain and an excellent milling wheat. The same farmers are loading a second car as these items are being written to go to the same point.

Smith & McMillan are loading a car of oats to go to the Mindoko country for seedling purposes. Mr. F. M. Towne is putting in a portion of the shipment.

### SEVERAL CARLOADS OF BUILDING MATERIAL ARRIVE.

Structure Will Be a Landmark When Completed—Shifman Farm Changes Hands—Prothero Sale Will Take Place on Saturday.

# PROTECTION OF FISH AND GAME

LAW IS NOW BEING STRICTLY ENFORCED.

Chief Deputy Livingston Makes Several Arrests in Twin Falls County—Hunters and Fishermen Must Hereafter Obey the Law.

Chief Deputy Game Warden Byron Livingston of Twin Falls made a second visit on Saturday, Sunday and Monday last with the result that fish and game licenses are now in active demand and wholesome respect for the law has been created. A number of arrests were made and conviction in each case was secured. As a result the culprits were either caroled or admonished of the law, neither of which is a valid excuse. Heretofore people have hunted in season and out of season in Twin Falls county regardless of the law or the license requirement. An effective check has been placed upon this practice and henceforth close watch will be kept upon poachers.

It is not the desire of the game warden to inflict any hardship upon those who like to hunt and fish. A license costs only \$1 and when a man is equipped with one he can legally hunt out what he likes to do. In order to obey the law by reading the directions on the back of the license. While it seems harsh to prosecute people for fishing without a license, it is remembered that the law requires a license for fishing and the law has to be drawn somewhere. People who fish generally carry guns and they who have a license is generally careful to respect the law. The money received from the sale of licenses is used to prosecute and protect game and fish and enforce the law.

It is unlawful for any person or persons to hunt for any kind of game whatever, or fish in the public waters, until a license is first procured, and upon the request of the game warden or his deputy such license must be produced for inspection, consequently licenses must always be carried by hunters or fishermen. Any bona fide male citizen, over the age of 12 years, who has been such for a period of six months preceding the application for a license may obtain the same from any justice of the peace, probate judge or justice warden, upon payment of \$1. Women are not required to obtain licenses. Licenses expire on the 31st day of January next following the date of issue. Non-residents are required to take out licenses, the fees being \$1 for a regular license and \$5 for a license to hunt small game and \$25 for a license to hunt large game.

The sale of fish and game is absolutely prohibited. It is unlawful to take or kill Mongolian pheasants, Canadian grouse (commonly called fool hens), swans, song, insectivorous or innocent birds, except English sparrows, in order to select the nests of such birds at any time.

It is unlawful to take fish less than four inches in length, or to use any explosive, chemical or poison in taking them. Fishing with hook and line is permitted at any time. No selling is allowed.

The open season for quail is from November 1 to December 1; for song hens from the first day of August to the first day of December; for partridge, prairie chicken, pheasant or turtle dove from the first day of September to the first day of December; for grouse, from the 15th day of August until the first day of December. Not more than 12 of these birds may be killed in one day.

The open season for wild ducks and wild geese is from the 15th day of September to the first day of January. Not more than 24 wild ducks or 30 wild geese may be killed in one day. The killing of moose, buffalo, antelope, beaver or caribou is prohibited at all times.

Deer, elk, mountain sheep or mountain goats may be killed between the 15th day of September and the 31st day of December. Not more than one elk, two deer, one mountain sheep, one ibex or one mountain goat may be killed by any one person each year and the use of pitfalls, traps or dogs is prohibited.

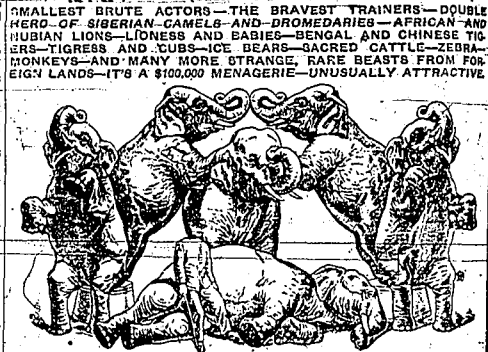

## FUEL SHORTAGE IS PREDICTED

**PEOPLE ARE URGED TO PROCURE COAL AT ONCE.**

Supply Will Be Curtailed Two Months Hence and Winter Famine Will Surely Ensnare Unless Sufficient Coal is Stored During Summer.

Another coal famine, much more acute than any which has hitherto afflicted Idaho, is predicted for the coming winter. Despite all the workings of the causes leading to the famine, the coal of last winter was not satisfactorily explained. It was proved beyond question that the shortage was primarily due to the scarcity of cars and no relief is promised on this score. The mines are supposed to be working to their capacity but no new mines have been opened up, notwithstanding the fact that several excellent coal beds have been located within easy reach of the railways. As a makeshift, the railway companies are urging the people to lay in their supply of coal during the summer. If this can be done the famine will be mitigated to a certain extent.

The people of Twin Falls are urgently advised to get coal without delay and store it. The population of the town is rapidly increasing and while the forest reserve affords a measure of protection it is necessary that coal should be available. The supply of roughish is diminishing with great rapidity.

The following circular issued by General Freight Agent J. S. Reeves of the Oregon Shore Line throws a bright light on the situation.

"To All Agents—The solution of the coal shortage in the winter months is to store it up the summer. This insures the miners employment all the time during the usually light season, and enables the transportation companies to move the coal prior to the heavy demand upon them for power and equipment with which to transport the crops in the fall.

"This condition is generally acknowledged and understood, yet it seems to be a hard nut to prevail upon the dealers and people in general to take this action.

"There is every indication that there will be a fuel shortage of 75,000 tons this winter. The production not equaling the increased demand. This company will assist, at great expense, in relieving the situation by storing during the summer for winter use, all the run-of-mine coal the mines can spare. This will permit a greater tonnage during the fall and winter to be devoted to commercial purposes.

"Please impress upon your coal dealer, also the public generally, through the newspapers, if possible, the importance of putting in storage coal this summer.

"If there is any word that can be used for fuel within a reasonable distance from your station, the dealers at the end of each month, announcing we shall be pleased to make very low rates for this purpose.

"Please send me a statement at the end of each month, announcing with May, showing the total number of tons commercial coal received at your station, compared with the same tonnage last year. J. S. REEVES, General Freight Agent."
