More Cream Land

Company to Reclaim 40,000 Acres by Pumping.

The Twin Falls Land & Water company is preparing to construct works for the reclamation of 40,000 acres of "cream" land above the present canal system between Miller and Hansen. The plans involve the installation of a power plant at the drop of the low line canal by means of which water will be raised sufficiently to irrigate nearly all the high land in that vicinity. The water, it is understood, will be pumped from the main canal. The point of diversion has not been announced nor have the definite plans been made public, but the preliminary steps for the reclamation were taken last week when President Buhl, George A. Baird, E. Bassett and Fred A. Volt of the Land & Water company were in Boise in conference with the state land board.

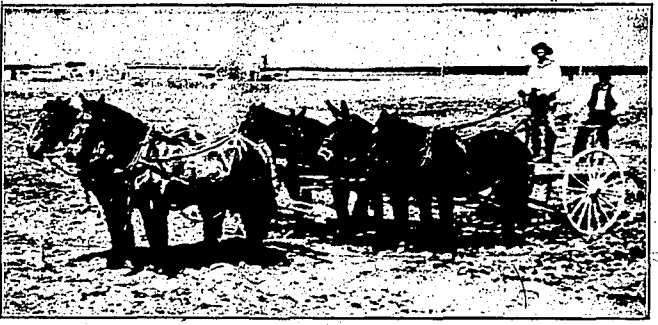
Roughly speaking, the land to be reclaimed lies south of Hansen and Murtaugh and east of Rock creek, and takes in a portion of the territory in the bond of the canal between Murtaugh and Hansen.

By many this is considered the most desirable land in the valley, being of great depth and sloping just right for irrigation.

Professor J. R. Hinton's agebrush grubber, from a photograph by Ernest Tache, taken on Mr. Hinton's home ranch, one quarter of a mile from Hansen. Mr. Hinton is shown seated, the driver, J. W. Thompson, standing. The six horses shown in this picture were carefully selected for the work they are engaged in and last year the team cleared 650 acres, probably the best record of any team on the tract. The picture shows how clean the ground is left after grubbing. The grubber blade cuts the roots six inches under the ground, loosening the earth, which is often needed without plowing. On good ground the grubber will clear seven acres a day. This is the most economical and satisfactory method of clearing agebrush land yet devised.

The Buhl correspondent of the News complains that insufficient attention is being paid to the roads and bridges in that section of the tract. There appears to be a misunderstanding in regard to this work. Two years ago the county commissioners declared all section lines on the Twin Falls tract to be county roads. All canals, ditches and laterals constructed since that order was made must be bridged by those who constructed them, whether it be the Land & Water Company or the farmers. The law on this point is plain and there can be no evasion. It is the duty of the county to provide proper approaches to the bridges and this will be done in every instance. It is the duty of the road overseers to see that necessary bridges are put in. There are eight road districts in Dr. Crocker's commissioner's district and thus far only two overseers have qualified. The commissioners can only appoint road overseers on petition of 16 taxpayers. It is necessary that roadway districts should be promptly organized and that overseers should be appointed and qualified. The initiative is with the people. The county commissioners will do their share when they can act legally.

President Frank H. Buhl of the Twin Falls Land & Water Co. has presented the town of Buhl with a \$25,000 school house. The building will be constructed of Buhl stone and is expected to be the most beautiful on the tract. That is practical philanthropy. It is equivalent to an appreciated gift to every taxpayer in the Buhl school district. It relieves the taxpayers of a burden which they could ill afford to shoulder at this time and it gives the town and district the best of educational facilities. This is not the first time Mr. Buhl has shown his interest in a substantial way in the town which bears his name. Last autumn he built a school for Buhl which has proved a boon to the town. He was mindful of the fact that the people of Buhl had been bitterly disappointed by the failure of the railroad company to complete its line to the west end of the tract, the development of which was seriously retarded. In consequence Buhl has a splendid future and the new school should give it a good boost.

Reed & Ellinger of American Falls know how to advertise. They have printed 25,000 neat postcard cards on the back of which is a picture of the great American Falls power plant. The copy paper in the state they have mailed copies of these cards, with the simple announcement that the cards are to be had for the asking and that any mention of their issue would be appreciated. It is safe to predict that 95 per cent of the newspapers to whom the cards are sent will compliment the senders as they should. It is a digni-

not method of placing the splendid resources of American Falls before the people and it will be successful.
