### PROSPERITY IN COEUR D'ALENE

Reflected in Report of First National Bank of Wallace.

The total resources reach a total of \$1,642,552.32, which compared with \$1,623,716.46 at the close of business at the date of the last statement, shows the fine increase of \$18,835.86.

Novadin, cashier of the bank, said that this was the most favorable report ever issued by the First National, and never before had the deposits been so large.

He was inclined to think that the Wallace bank would show the largest deposits of any in the state.

### DEATH CAMAS AND ITS EFFECTS

A Plant Injurious to This Section—Be Avoided.

Of the few poisonous plants found in this section of Idaho the Death Camas is the more deadly. Frequently it is seldom encountered, excepting in the foothills.

Larkspur is much more common but not so injurious to stock. The noted agricultural journal, Ranch and Range, or Deaver, quotes Bulletin 37 of the Idaho experiment station with respect to the Death Camas as follows:

"During the past year the tops were found by the agricultural department at Washington to contain a poisonous substance, one of the powerful vegetable alkaloids. The bulbs which have been reputed poisonous were not examined."

A study of this report is of the most important of which appeared to be related to violent poison helobers. A single bulb which is only one-fifth of a grain killed a frog in two minutes. The dose of strychnine fatal to the frog is twice that amount from which some idea of the intensely poisonous nature of the bulbs may be gathered.

"Continuing, that paper says: 'The symptoms of poison by this plant are characteristic. At first the animal appears to be excited, and is unsteady in his movements, breathes rapidly, staggers and falls. The peculiar thing about poisoning from this plant is that the animal becomes completely paralyzed, but retains full possession of the senses. In extreme cases, spasms come on more or less severe, according to the amount of the plant eaten. In mild cases only a slight stiffness of muscles is noticed and this soon disappears. In severe poisoning the animal lies flat on its side, unable to even raise its head. Death may be delayed for several hours.'

The stockman should become familiar with this plant, and if found it should be dug out, as its extermination is not a matter of so much difficulty as we find in the case of larkspur, loco and some other poison plants.

The best treatment for the poisoned animal is to use the chemical antidote.

There would be no advantage in bleeding an animal poisoned with camas.
