CLEARING HOUSE FOR TWIN FALLS

BANKERS ON TRACT FORM AN ORGANIZATION.

Action Taken in Order to Obligate the Possibility of Confusion or Complication Resulting from Financial Conditions in the East.

To be strictly in monetary style, and to forestall the possibility of confusion or complication resulting from the present financial conditions in Wall street, the banks on the Twin Falls tract have organized a clearing house in order that they may work together for the protection of their clients and avert any possible stringency. The financial sides are rapidly clearing in the east and while it is probable that the Twin Falls Clearing House association may not be called upon to exercise its functions, the action of the local bankers was as efficacious as it was prompt in purifying conditions with which the west has little sympathy and no concern. The clearing house was organized in order to render the local banks independent of the sources from which they obtain currency in the event that the available supply of the latter should be diminished below the point of comfort. There is little likelihood of such a happening but the bankers on the Twin Falls tract determined to run no risk and perfected their plans accordingly.

At a meeting held in McCornick & Co.'s banking room in Twin-Falls, Idaho, on the evening of November 6th, 1907, at which meeting the First National Bank, McCornick & Co., Commercial and Savings Bank, State Bank of Buhl, Citizens State Bank of Buhl and Bank of Kimberly were represented, it was decided that owing to existing financial conditions, that it was advisable to form a Clearing House association for the benefit of Twin Falls and upon motion C. J. Hahn was elected president, J. M. Maxwell secretary, and L. A. Warner treasurer.

The following resolutions were adopted:

1. In order to the inability to secure currency and as a matter of caution, and to protect the interest of all concerned, and in accordance with the action of other clearing houses it was deemed wise to limit the payment of cash on any account carried in cash to \$50.00 in currency or coin per week. Payment on time deposits will not be made until maturity. Should a depositor in making a withdrawal desire more than the stipulated \$50.00 per week, he will be given a cashier's check, clearing house certificate or its equivalent for all over that amount.

2. Savings banks will take advantage of the time allowed by law for the withdrawal of deposits.

Commissioners' Proceedings

Special Meeting September 9th, 1907.

The board met in special session to consider plans and specifications and take such action as may be deemed necessary for the erection of a permanent county jail and jailer's home. Notices stating the business to be considered and the time and place of holding said meeting having been posted as required by law.

All the members being present, the following proceedings were had:

Whereupon the board ordered the following resolutions spread upon the minutes:

"Whereas, the board of county commissioners find it necessary, and for the best interests of Twin Falls county, Idaho, that a jail be erected and equipped for said county, and it being found by said board that the expense of erecting such a suitable jail of suitable size and capacity and furnishing the same will be \$15,000, and that the same will exceed the revenue of the current year applicable thereto and to that purpose, and

"Whereas, the board deems it for the public good to bond the county in the said sum of \$15,000 for the purpose of providing funds therefor, therefore be it

"Resolved, by the board, that the above and foregoing proposition be submitted to a special election of the voters of said Twin Falls county."

Whereupon the board ordered that the following notice be posted in each precinct and published in a newspaper as required by law:

Notice-Bond Election.

Notice is hereby given that at a special meeting of the board of county commissioners of Twin Falls county, Idaho, called and held for the hereinafter mentioned purposes, on the 9th day of September, the following resolution was adopted, to-wit:

"Whereas, the board of county commissioners find it necessary and for the best interests of Twin Falls county, Idaho, that a jail be erected and equipped for said county, and it being found by said board that the expense of erecting a suitable jail of suitable size and capacity and furnishing the same will be \$15,000, and that the same will exceed the revenue of the current year applicable thereto, and to that purpose, and

"Whereas, the board deems it for the public good to bond the county in the said sum of \$15,000 for the purpose of providing funds therefor, therefore be it

"Resolved by the board that the above and foregoing proposition be submitted to a special election of the voters of said Twin Falls county."

In accordance with said resolution, a special election is called to be held on the 6th day of October, 1907, to determine whether the said commissioners are authorized to issue the bonds of said Twin Falls county in the sum of \$15,000 for the specific purpose of building and equipping said jail for said county. The election above mentioned will be held in the

several precincts in said county as hereinafter mentioned, and the polls will be opened at the hour of 1 o'clock in the afternoon, and will be closed at the hour of 7 o'clock in the evening of the same day.

Said bonds to be issued will be issued in denominations of \$1000, or, if necessary, will be issued in denominations of \$500 and \$100, and all of said bonds will bear a rate of interest not to exceed 6 per cent per annum, payable January 1, and July 1 of each year.

Said bonds, or any part thereof, may, at the option of the county, be redeemed at any time after 10 years from the date of their issue, provided such time and option be stated upon the face of each bond, and each bond must be redeemed in the order it is numbered.



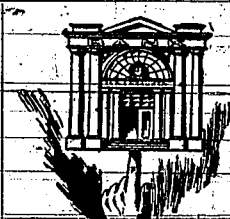

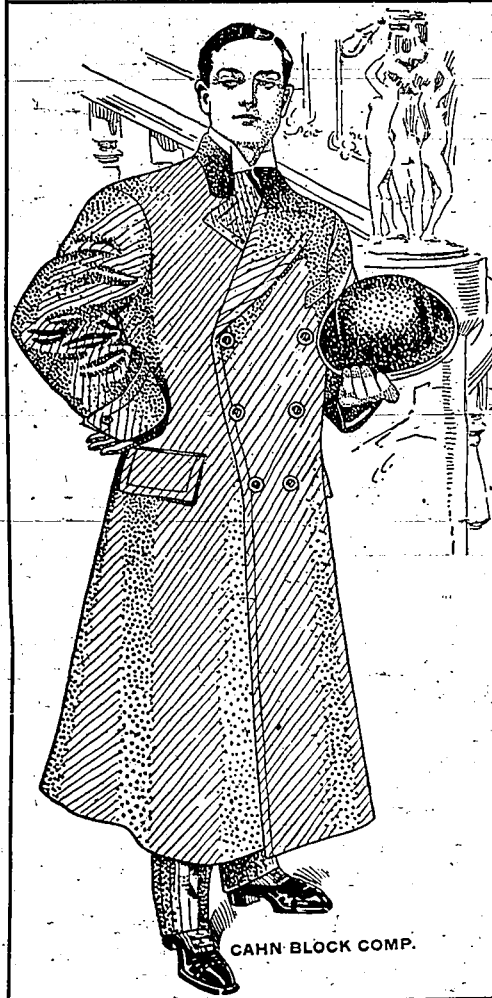
