## Commissioners' Proceedings

Special Meeting September 9th, 1907.

The board met in special session to consider plans and specifications and take such action as may be deemed necessary for the erection of a permanent county jail and jailer's home. Notices stating the business to be considered and the place and place of holding said meeting having been posted as required by law.

All the members being present, the following proceedings were had:

Whereupon the board ordered the following resolutions spread upon the minutes:

Resolved, the board of county commissioners find it necessary and for the best interests of Twin Falls county, Idaho, that a jail be erected and equipped for said county, and it be found by said board that the expense of erecting such a suitable jail of suitable size and capacity and furnishing the same will be \$15,000, and that the same will exceed the revenue of the current year applicable thereto and to that purpose, and

Whereas, the board deems it for the public good to bond the county in the said sum of \$15,000 for the purpose of providing funds therefor, therefore be it

Resolved, by the board, that the above and foregoing proposition be submitted to a special election of the voters of said Twin Falls county.

Whereupon the board ordered that the following proposition be placed on the ballot, and published in a newspaper as required by law:

Notice of Election. That at a special meeting of the board of county commissioners of Twin Falls county, Idaho, called and held for the hereinafter mentioned purposes, on the 9th day of September, the following resolution was adopted, to-wit:

"Whereas, the board of county commissioners find it necessary and for the best interests of Twin Falls county, Idaho, that a jail be erected and equipped for said county, and it be found by said board that the expense of erecting such a suitable jail of suitable size and capacity, and furnishing the same will be \$15,000, and that the same will exceed the revenue of the current year applicable thereto, and to that purpose, and

"Whereas, the board deems it for the public good to bond the county in the said sum of \$15,000 for the purpose of providing funds therefor, therefore be it

Resolved, by the board, that the above and foregoing proposition be submitted to a special election of the voters of said Twin Falls county."

In accordance with said resolutions, a special election is called to be held on the 5th day of October, 1907, to determine whether the said commissioners are authorized to issue the bonds of said Twin Falls county in the sum of \$15,000 for the specific purpose of building and equipping said jail for said county. The election shall be held at the hour of 1 o'clock in the afternoon, and will be held at the place of the election on the evening of the same day.

Said bonds to be issued will be for said in denominations of \$1000, or if necessary will be issued in denominations of \$500 and \$100, and all of said bonds will bear a rate of interest not to exceed 6 per cent per annum, payable January 1, and July 1 of each year.

Said bonds, or any part thereof, may, at the option of the county, be redeemed at any time after 10 years from the date of their issue, provided such time and option be stated upon the face of each bond, and each bond may be redeemed in the order it is numbered.

**Senator W. D. Heyburn** was the first to offer a practical remedy for the ills resulting from the financial stringency in the east. He suggested that the government should cease furnishing the eastern banks with currency until the latter fulfilled their obligations to the west. The west was being made the innocent sufferer and Senator Heyburn was the first to prevent the imposition. Conditions are normal and healthy in the west and there is no depression or cause for depression here. The east is trying to "hog" all the currency and gold and "wreath" on the west. Western banks with heavy reserve funds in the east have been unable to get a dollar of the money which is owing them. Acting upon Senator Heyburn's suggestion, Secretary Cortelyou has notified the eastern banks that they must send currency west to move the grain and cotton crops and to carry on the great works now in progress in this section of the country. The warning has been heeded and the money is on the way. There is a time coming when the "reserve" system will be abolished and when every section of the country will stand on its own merits. When that time comes, Idaho will be independent of all gambling operations in Wall street and elsewhere. The Gent state is a producer and not a borrower and it is impervious to panic. The only things that hamper Idaho are excessive freight rates, abominable transportation facilities and coal famine.

There appears to be some misapprehension regarding the status of the case of the Twin Falls Land & Water Co. vs. Morgan G. Heap, which involves the payment of interest charges on lands under the high line canal west of Cedar draw. The contention of the company was that the interest charges commenced when the water was ready for delivery. This was conceded by counsel for the defense and the attorneys in the case were informed that their conclusions would be adopted by the court and were instructed to submit judgment for signature in conformity with such decision. Since this decision was arrived at by the attorneys nothing seems to have been done in the case. No formal judgment has been rendered, nor have the attorneys made any presentation for signature. The court is not advised as to whether the attorneys have changed their minds or have retracted their agreement. The same principle involved in the Heap case applies to lands under the low line canal between Rock creek and Cedar draw.

Some willful lot who has succeeded in escaping the foot killer has informed the postal department that the Twin Falls North Side Land & Water Co. is conducting a lottery and has asked that the company be denied the use of the mails. The charge is supposedly founded upon the fact that the Carey act lands on the North Side were opened to entry by drawing. These lands were not the property of the state of Idaho and were sold by the state, not by the water company. The charge is so ridiculous that the postal department can scarcely be justified in entertaining it. If this is a lottery, let us have more like it in Idaho.





zons of the Twin Falls tract came. It will be seen by the following table that the bulk of outgoing letters went to Colorado, Illinois, Iowa, Missouri, Oregon and Washington. The state of Utah received a heavy first class mail from Twin Falls, due largely to business correspondence. The state of Washington contributed largely to the settlement of the Twin Falls tract as the mail to that state clearly shows. The returns from Illinois, Missouri, Iowa, Oregon and Washington show a weight dispatched to that state from this city. Illinois, showed up strong with 41 pounds, 11 ounces, and Iowa with 47 pounds, 11 1/2 ounces.

Evidently, Twin Falls is a good correspondence terms with the state of Idaho, judging by the 181 pounds, 7 1/2 ounces of home distribution. Missouri, cut quite a swath with 16 pounds, 14 ounces, and Oregon showed its appreciation of a good thing by calling for 22 pounds, 10 ounces.
