## CONGRESS HEARS WITH INTEREST

THE STIRRING MESSAGE OF THE PRESIDENT.

Document is Forceful and Emphatic From Beginning to End and Does Not Contain an Uncertain Line—No Attempt to Straddle Issues.

The annual message of President Roosevelt was read on Tuesday in both houses of congress, and practically no business was attempted by either body beyond listening to the message. The galleries of both senate and house were crowded at the beginning of the session of each body, but as the reading progressed the attendance diminished somewhat. In the main, however, it was well maintained until the last sentence of the document had fallen from the lips of the official readers. Senators and members were supplied with printed copies of the message and many of them followed the reading of the clerks with scrupulous care. The reading consumed about two and a quarter hours in each of the houses.

The message states an emergency circulation must be provided and discusses some suggestions, but makes no recommendations of plans. It suggests a national incorporation act. It says the interstate commerce commission should have authority to pass upon future issues of securities and make physical valuations on any railroad. It suggests that railroads should be permitted to enter into agreements under certain control and restriction. It asks for legislation respecting great business concerns doing an interstate business.

It suggests that the anti-trust law should be amended so as to forbid injurious combinations only. No combination should be tolerated that creates a monopoly. Unhealthy competition involving heavy loss for the purpose of destroying opposition should be prohibited.

A national incorporation act is suggested, or a license act. Right to hold stock in other corporations should be denied except on approval by proper government officials.

The message points to the need of close co-operation between national and state governments in administering pure food laws.

Congress is asked to provide for emergency circulation. National revenues are in a most satisfactory condition.

Tariff revision should be postponed until after the next campaign.

Income and inheritance taxation is suggested, when the revenue laws are revised. There is no reason why the

national and state governments should not cooperate in this respect.

The message urges the prosecution of wealthy offenders and demands imprisonment for individual offenders. It suggests regulation for the exercise of the power of injunction.

A law is asked for providing for the payment of damages to injured employees irrespective of negligence.

The extension of the eight-hour law is demanded.

The desirability of compulsory investigation of industrial disputes is suggested. The message points to the need of investigation of the conditions under which women and children are employed.

It considers the interests of the farmer.

The opinion is expressed that the national government should take up the work of establishing a great system of inland waterways.

The message points out the work accomplished by the reclamation service. Land reform is recommended along the lines suggested in the report of the public lands commission.

The president takes up the matter of forest preservation and suggests the abolition of tariffs on forest products. He renews the suggestion that the government should retain the fee of oil, coal and gas lands.

The message deals with the progress of the Panama canal. It favors a postal savings bank.

It recommends the parcel post, especially for rural districts.

It contains words of encouragement for the Seattle exposition.

It points out that Hawaii is left in an awkward position by the "unfortunate failure" of the shipping bill at the last session.

A bureau of mines is recommended. The message suggests that the government pay the legitimate expenses of presidential campaigns.

A bureau of art gallery is recommended, also the abolition of duties on works of art.

The message treats of the work accomplished by the biological survey. It considers the ocean mail service.

It points to some pressing needs of the army and navy.

It suggests that the United States arrange to participate in the Japanese exposition in 1912.

It discusses the German tariff controversy, Chinese indemnity, our relations with Mexico and Central America.

**Tariff Question.** The tariff question should be approached purely from a business standpoint, both the time and the manner of the change being such as to arouse the minimum of agitation and disturbance in the business world, and to give the least play for selfish and factional motives. The sole consideration should be to see that the sum total of changes represents the public good. This means that the subject cannot with wisdom be dealt with in the year preceding a presidential election because, as a matter

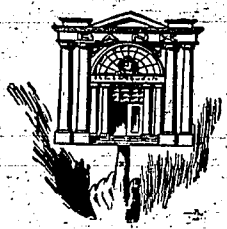

of fact, experience has conclusively shown that at such a time it is impossible to get men to treat it from the standpoint of the public good. In my judgment it is immediately after such an election.

**Postal Reform.**

"I commend to the favorable consideration of the congress a postal savings bank system, as recommended by the postmaster."

"I further commend to the congress the consideration of the postmaster's general recommendation for an extension of the postal package system on the rural routes. These recommendations have been drawn up to benefit the farmer and the country storekeeper; otherwise I should not favor them."

**Mining Bureau.**

"A bureau of mines should be created under the control and direction of the secretary of the interior. The bureau to have power to collect statistics and make investigations in all matters pertaining to mining and particularly to the accidents and dangers of the industry. If this cannot now be done, at least additional appropriations should be given the interior department to be used for the study of mining conditions, for the prevention of fraudulent mining schemes, for carrying on the work of mapping the mining districts of the country, for studying methods for mining in the future."

**Provisional Capital.**

"A few years ago there was loud complaint that the law could not be invoked against wealthy offenders. There is no such complaint now."

"Let us from every standpoint prefer to punish the prime offender by imprisonment rather than to fine the corporation with the attendant damage to stockholders."

"The two great evils in the execution of our criminal laws today are sentimentality and technicality. I earnestly commend the attention of the congress to this matter, so that some way may be devised which will limit the abuse of injunctions and protect those rights which from time to time it unwarrantably invades."

**Emergency Currency.**

"Provisions should be made for an emergency currency; provided, of course, that we recognize the even greater need of a safe and secure currency."

"It is worth investigating to determine whether officers and directors should ever be allowed to loan to themselves."

"No legislation can, by any possibility, guarantee the business community against the results of speculative folly any more than it can guarantee an individual against the results of extravagance."

"When an individual mortgages his home to buy an automobile he invites disaster."

"This country is definitely committed to the protection system and any effort to uproot it could not but cause widespread industrial disaster."

**Honest Methods.**

"As a rule, the business of our people is conducted with honesty and probity, and this applies to farms and factories, to railroads and banks, to all our legitimate commercial enterprises."

"When the misdoers of these successful dishonest men are discovered, they are not only upon them, but upon the innocent men whom they have misled. Surely there can be no doubt as to the need of the stiffening reconviction in the war against successful dishonesty."

"There must be no halt in the healthy constructive course of action which this nation has elected to pursue."

**Federal Activity.**

"Those who fear, for any reason, the extension of federal activities will profit to study the history not only of the national banking law, but of the pure food law, and notably the meat inspection law recently enacted."

"Two years have not elapsed and already it has become evident that the great benefit the (meat) inspection law confers upon the public is accompanied by an equal benefit to the reputable packing establishments."

**Socialism.**

"We have not the slightest sympathy with the socialist idea which would try to put business, thriftlessness and inefficiency on a par with industry, thrift and efficiency."

**Railroad Reform.**

"Until the nation assumes proper control of the interstate commerce, in the exercise of the authority, it already possesses, it will be impossible either to give to or get from the railroads full justice. There should be additional legislation looking to the proper control of the great business concerns engaged in interstate commerce."

**Natural Resources.**

"The conservation of our natural resources and their proper use constitute the fundamental problem which underlies almost every other problem of our natural life."

"The unlawful forcing of public lands for private grazing must be stopped but the necessity which occasioned it must be provided for."

"A good characteristic is, but if carried to an excess it becomes foolishness."

**Forest Reserve.**

"But forests as used as all our forests have been used in the past and as most of them are still used, will be either wholly destroyed or so damaged that many decades have to pass before effective use can be made of them again."

"Some of these persons actually demand that the present forest reserves be thrown open to destruction, because, forsooth, they think that, thereby the price of lumber could be put down again for two or three more years. Their attitude is precisely like that of an agitator protesting against the outlay of money by farmers on manure and in taking care of their farmsteads."

"The only trouble with the movement for the preservation of our forests is that it has not gone far enough, and was not begun soon enough."

**Concerning Trusts.**

"The anti-trust law should not be repealed, but it should be made both more efficient and more in harmony with actual conditions. It should be so amended as to forbid only the kind of combination which does harm to the general public."

"Such combinations are against public policy; they violate the common law; the doors of the courts are closed to those who bring parties to them, and I believe that congress can close the channels of interstate commerce against them for its protection."

"The real owners of corporations should be compelled to do business in their own names."

**Short Paragraphs.**

"So far from there being a tariff on works of art brought into the country, their importation should be encouraged in every way."

"It must be remembered that everything done by the navy to fit it to do well in time of war must be done in time of peace."

"It is not possible that this nation should ever be again to sink into the condition from which we rescued it."

"There should be no tariff on any forest product grown in this country, and especially there should be no tariff on wood pulp."

"In my judgment the government should have the right to keep the fee on the coal lands, to lease the right to develop them under proper regulations."

"No general introduction of the 8-hour day should be the goal toward which we should steadily tend, and the government should set the example in this respect."

"No question growing out of our rapid and complex industrial development is more important than that of employment of women and children."

"No growth of cities, no growth of wealth can make up for any loss in either the number or the character of the people of this nation."

"We cannot afford to lose the pre-eminently typical American, the farmer, who owns his own medium-sized farm."

"In my judgment both of these (income and inheritance) taxes should be part of our system of federal taxation."
