WOULD PREVENT CANAL TRANSFER

COURT ASKED FOR RESTRAINING ORDER.

Plaintiffs Allege that the System Has Not Reached That Stage of Completion Which Warrants its Transfer to the Settlers.

P. J. Holahan, George Wise, Alfred O'Brien, Michael Koppelman, L. L. Sweet, August Ferguson and John Peters have instituted proceedings in the district court to restrain the Twin Falls Land & Water Co. from transferring the canal system to the settlers on January 1, 1908, as contemplated in their contract, and plaintiffs ask the court for a restraining order and Judge Walters has set Friday, December 27, as the date on which the company is required to show cause why the order should not be made.

After reference to the contracts between the state and the company and the settlers and the company, referred to as exhibits A and B, respectively, and a hearing for roles on the following grounds:

"The defendant has failed, neglected and refused to construct the dam as provided in said contract, but instead thereof is in an unfinished condition and not constructed of the material in the manner in such contract provided, greatly impairing the safety, permanency and efficiency thereof."

"The defendant has failed, neglected and refused to construct the said main headgates and all other waste gates, lateral gates and weirs of masonry of concrete, as provided in such contract; but instead thereof has constructed said gates and weirs and practically all thereof consist of wood and lumber, greatly impairing the safety, permanency and efficiency thereof."

"The defendant has failed, neglected and refused to construct the laterals provided for in such contract and specifications, or to construct said canal system with respect to the laterals in a good and workmanlike manner, or the usual or customary manner, and instead thereof has used and is using natural ravines, called 'coulees'; that by means thereof the water allowed to seep out and be absorbed into the ground, causing great and unnecessary waste by means of evaporation, and causing great and unnecessary loss of land; that also by reason thereof the health of the farmmen and their families is endangered, and otherwise working to the detriment and injury of said canal system and the proper, economical and efficient distribution of the waters thereof."

"That the defendant has failed, neglected and refused to construct or place in said canal or laterals, as provided in said contract, any devices for measuring water to irrigators, greatly impairing the safety, permanency and efficiency of said canal and system."

"The defendant has failed, neglected and refused to construct said canal and laterals so that water can be conducted thereat and delivered at a point not exceeding one-half mile from any legal subdivision of 160 acres, as provided in said agreement, greatly impairing the safety, permanency and efficiency of said canal and system."

"That the defendant has failed, neglected and refused to construct the 'low line' canal of said system with reference to the grade thereof, as provided in said agreement, in this that the high level of water which crosses Rock creek for a distance of about one mile above said alphea 10 drop and grade of said canal is about 17 feet above the water level at the point where the said 'low line' canal leaves the main canal for a distance of about one-half mile the depth of canal is about 10 feet, 100 feet to such half mile; that defendant has had water flowing in such portion of said canal system during the past three irrigation seasons and by such water has entirely destroyed the banks of the canal and wasted away the soil to a great depth so that it will be and is impossible to obtain a head of water there sufficient to supply the requirement and rights of those plaintiffs and irrigators who have land under such canal; that the grades and drops above mentioned are too great to permit water to flow through same without greatly impairing the safety, permanency and efficiency of said canal system."

"That the defendant has failed, neglected and refused to construct said canal and canal system as provided in such contract in that part of position to wit, a lateral leading from the 'high line' canal near the lands owned by the plaintiff, August Ferguson, in this that a right of way, one-half mile across said lateral whereby backing up the water on same and causing same to overflow said plaintiff's lands and also a right of way for flowing on down said lateral in sufficient quantities to meet requirements and demands of those irrigators taking water below said point of said lateral."

"That the defendant has failed, neglected and refused to construct many of the laterals of said canal system in the manner provided in said agreement, in this that the same are of insufficient size to convey the quantity of water intended and for which they will be required, and not of the size specified or contemplated by such agreement."

"That the defendant has failed, neglected and refused to construct the high line canal of said system in the manner or form specified or contemplated by said agreement, in this that at or near the west end of said canal the defendant has used and is using large cracks or crevices in the lava rock as a pond of said canal; that they have deposited rock and dirt in said cracks or crevices for the purpose of filling them to a proper level, but the same does not and will not continue to sink down and through said dirt bottom into said cracks and crevices so that the most, if not all thereof has been and will be lost."

"That no part of the cost of said canal or canal system is completed whereby it can be conveniently operated by a corporation organized as provided in such agreement (marked exhibit A) and the defects and omissions hereinbefore set forth go to and affect each and every part of said canal system."

"That defendant has publicly stated that it was necessary for him to fulfill the said contract (marked exhibit A) in the details and particulars before mentioned, and has publicly announced and stated that he would not perform the conditions and requirements of such agreement in the particulars before stated unless compelled to do so by the courts; the plaintiffs allege that it is the intention of the said defendant, unless prevented by a decree of this court, to transfer the ownership, control and management of said canal and canal system to the corporation organized by them called the Twin Falls Canal Company, Limited, without performing the said agreement in the particulars before stated, and the further completion of said canal and plaintiffs allege that it is the intention of the said defendant not to complete said canal as before stated in the particulars and requirements of its said contract unless compelled to do so by an order and decree of this court."

"That the defects and omissions above set forth in said canal and canal system greatly impair the safety, efficiency and permanency of said canal and canal system, and unless they are speedily remedied in many particulars are likely to produce great damage by flood and overflows and also by failure to receive the water on the part of irrigators, which may be entitled; that these plaintiffs by themselves or with others cannot and are not able and would not be entitled to complete said ditch and canal according to said agreement and in view of in many other particulars to permit said system to remain in its present condition would entail great and irreparable injury to the plaintiffs and system and to those plaintiffs and others interested therein."

"That the said plaintiffs and the state of Idaho have fully and completely performed the conditions and obligations, covenant or agreement by them to be performed under the contract (marked exhibit A) and the several contracts by them with the said defendant."

"That the articles of incorporation of the corporation called the Twin Falls Canal Company, Limited, and which the defendant attorneys organized, purporting that the same is the corporation provided for in the contract (marked exhibit A) and to which the defendant attorneys will transfer the management, control and ownership of said dam and canal system, unless restrained by an order and decree of this court, are the same articles of incorporation provided for in such agreement, but instead thereof are materially different so far as the rights of plaintiffs and other stockholders are concerned, and if the said dam and canal system is conveyed to the said corporation it will deprive the plaintiffs and other stockholders therein of valuable rights and privileges."

"That there now exists certain mortgages, liens and claims against the said dam and canal system to wit, a deed from the defendant to the Twin Falls North Side Land & Water company for a portion of the dam which is a part of the canal system of the defendant; a mortgage from defendant to a certain bank or trust company, the name of which the plaintiffs do not yet know, in the sum of \$500,000, a judgment or a mechanics lien in the sum of \$162,311.25 against defendant and in favor of the Nelson-Bennett Irrigation Corporation, et als; taxes for the year 1905 in the sum of \$11,551.96, all of which liens and encumbrances are of record in the books of Twin Falls county, Idaho, and have not been paid."

"That plaintiffs have been informed and believe and therefore allege as a fact, that the defendant intends and will transfer to the said corporation called the Twin Falls Canal Company the said dam, canals and canal system without satisfying the said liens and encumbrances, all of which would cause great and irreparable injury to these plaintiffs and other persons interested in said canal system."

"That plaintiffs have no plain, speedy or adequate remedy at law."

"Wherefore, the plaintiffs pray for a judgment and decree of this court, which will specifically require the defendant to complete and fulfill said contract and to construct said dam, canals, canal system, headgates, weirs, measuring devices and laterals as specified in said contract and in the particulars set forth above."

"That an order to show cause be given requiring the defendant to show cause why a temporary injunction should not issue enjoining and restraining the transfer of said canal and land liens and encumbrances hereinbefore mentioned to the said canal system shall have been completed and in the particulars above mentioned, and until the corporation organized as contemplated by the articles of incorporation as provided in such agreement."

"That upon the hearing of such order to show cause, such injunction issued as aforesaid and if upon a final hearing said injunction be made permanent until the requirements of the court's decree be fulfilled, as provided above."

"That a restraining order issue at once restraining such transfer until the time for the hearing of such order to show cause, until the court has acted thereon, and until
