the association, its officers, agents or employees; to pass on and direct the payment of any and all claims against the association; to prosecute and defend any and all suits considered to be within the purposes of the association; to employ attorneys, engineers, or any other agents or employees for the purpose of the association; and to further advance the interest and purpose of the association in all ways.

Sec. 4. It shall be the duty of the president to preside at all meetings of the board of directors; to oversee and control generally the affairs of the association; to see that the will of the board of directors is carried into effect; and to perform such other duties as may be provided by the constitution, by-laws, or order of the board of directors.

Sec. 5. The vice-president shall act for and on behalf of the president during the latter's absence, refusal, or inability to act.

Sec. 6. The treasurer shall be the custodian of the funds of the association, and shall pay out the same only on the warrant of the secretary and countersigned by the president.

Sec. 7. The secretary shall keep the accounts of the association; collect all fees, assessments and dues or other moneys of the association from the district secretary and other persons paying over the same to the treasurer; keep and preserve the minutes of the proceedings of the board of directors and the association; submit a semi-annual report to the board of directors; and perform such other duties as may be provided by the constitution, by-laws, or order of the board of directors.

Sec. 8. The secretary may receive such compensation as may be fixed by the board of directors, but no other officer of the association shall receive any compensation, other than his actual expenses when in the performance of association business.

Sec. 9. The board of directors shall meet at Twin Falls City the first Monday following their election, and organize the board and shall elect all other officers of the general association.

Sec. 10. The board of directors shall have power to remove the president, vice-president, secretary or treasurer at any time for cause, and to elect their successors.

Sec. 11. Any vacancy in any office shall be filled by the board of directors, and such persons shall hold until the next regular election.

Sec. 12. The board of directors may submit any question for their consideration to the board of directors of the association, same to be determined at regular or special meeting of the association districts. In such case the question submitted shall be in writing to each district, and vote taken thereon by ballot, which vote shall be certified by the district secretary and forwarded to the general secretary. A majority vote cast in all the districts shall determine the matter. Such vote shall be final on such question.

Sec. 13. The territory comprising the South Side Twin Falls Irrigation District shall be divided into eight districts as follows:

District No. 1 shall comprise all the territory within Murrain election precinct, Twin Falls county, Idaho.

District No. 2 shall comprise all the territory within Hansen election precinct, Twin Falls county, Idaho.

District No. 3 shall comprise all the territory within Kimball election precinct, Twin Falls county, Idaho.

District No. 4 shall comprise all the territory within Rock Creek election precinct, Twin Falls county, Idaho.

District No. 5 shall comprise all the territory within Twin Falls precinct No. 1, and Twin Falls precinct No. 2, Twin Falls county, Idaho.

District No. 6 shall comprise all the territory within Flor election precinct, Twin Falls county, Idaho.

District No. 7 shall comprise all the territory within Marca election precinct, Twin Falls county, Idaho.

District No. 8 shall comprise all the territory within Buhl election precinct, Twin Falls county, Idaho.

Sec. 14. The board of directors in the position of twenty members in 1907 standing of the association; by a two-thirds vote in favor thereof; may create new association districts from territory within an existing district or new territory, and may provide for the organization of the same.

Sec. 2. Each association district shall have full and complete control of all association affairs purely local to such district and shall have the power to assess members of such district dues for local purposes not in excess of the sum of \$1.00 per year.

Sec. 3. Each member of the association shall be a member of the district where he resides or where he has land under the Twin Falls tract, and a member may transfer from one district to another to which he is entitled, but no person can be a member of two districts at the same time.

Sec. 4. Regular meetings of each district shall be held not less than once each month, at a time and place to be determined upon by district by-laws, and at such meetings any and all association business shall be transacted, and all members of the district shall be entitled to participate therein.

Sec. 5. On the second Saturday of January in each year there shall be elected by ballot in each district the number of members of the board of directors to which such title may be entitled, and such members shall be actual residents of the district from which they are elected.

Sec. 6. Any district shall have the power to remove its representative or representatives from the board of directors at any regular or special meeting and proceed to elect his or their successors, provided that specific charges are filed, which the district secretary, acting as secretary of the board of directors, and notice of such charges is given by the secretary at least 10 days before the meeting at which such charges are to be considered, and such successives to be elected.

Sec. 7. At the same time of the election of directors, each district

shall elect a district chairman, district vice-chairman, district secretary and district treasurer.

Sec. 7. Any district shall have power to remove any of its district officers at any regular meeting; and shall have power to elect their successors at the same meeting. This power shall not in any way be interpreted to apply to the removal of directors.

Sec. 8. The duties of the district chairman shall be to act and preside at all meetings of the association district; to oversee the affairs of the association in his own district, and to perform such other duties as may be provided by the board of directors or his district by-laws.

Sec. 9. The duties of the district vice-chairman shall be to act for the chairman during his absence, inability or refusal of the chairman to act.

Sec. 10. The duties of the district secretary shall be to collect all fees and dues from members of the association, and shall pay to the secretary of the association the amount thereof belonging to the general association and the balance to the district treasurer; and shall keep accurate account of the same; to keep accurate minutes of the district meetings; to make all necessary reports; and to perform such other duties as may be provided by the board of directors of the district by-laws.

Sec. 11. The district treasurer shall keep all moneys of the association district and pay the same only on warrant of the district secretary countersigned by the district president.

Sec. 12. Each district may provide by-laws for the government and the guidance of its own affairs, not inconsistent with the constitution or the by-laws of the general organization.

Sec. 13. Special meetings in each district may be called by the president of the association, chairman of the district, or by the secretary of the association, or the district secretary upon petition of 10 members of the district, where such meetings are to be held. Notice of such meeting shall be given by posting notice thereof in three public places within such district at least 10 days before such meeting shall be held, which notice shall state the general nature of the business to be transacted, and no other business shall be transacted at such meeting.

ARTICLE 6. Dues and Funds.

Sec. 1. The board of directors may by resolution fix the time of payment and the amount of the assessments to be paid by each member; provided however that the total of such assessments shall not exceed 10 cents per acre for any one year.

Sec. 2. Each district may provide for local dues for the use of such district.

Sec. 3. Any person who shall fail to pay any assessment or dues for 30 days after the same shall become due, shall not be entitled to vote or receive other benefits of the association.

Sec. 4. All moneys from whatever source, for the association other than local dues or permitted in section 3 shall belong to the general organization, provided that each district may raise funds for its own use in any manner not contrary to this constitution.

ARTICLE 7. Meeting of Directors.

Sec. 1. The regular meetings of the board of directors shall be held at such times and places as may be provided by law or resolution.

Sec. 2. Special meetings of the board shall be held upon the call of the president, or any three directors. Written notice of such meeting shall be delivered to each director at least three days prior thereto, and such notice shall state the time, place and business to be transacted, and no other business shall be considered except upon unanimous consent of all directors.

Sec. 3. A majority of the board of directors shall constitute a quorum, for the transaction of business at any special or regular meeting thereof.

ARTICLE 8. Amendments.

Any district may by a majority vote propose any amendment to this constitution by motion to the general secretary, a copy of such proposed amendment certified to by the district president and the district secretary. It shall be the duty of the general secretary to furnish each district secretary with a certified copy of such proposed amendment, and immediately upon the receipt of such copy of such proposed amendment it shall be the duty of the district secretary to call a special meeting to vote on such proposed amendment, provided, however, that the district secretary shall give 10 days notice to the members of the district by posting in a public place, a call for such meeting stating the objects thereof. The vote in each district shall be by ballot, and the result of such vote shall be certified to by the district president and the district secretary and forwarded to the general secretary. A majority vote of all the votes cast in all the districts shall be necessary for the adoption of such amendment.

to convey said canal system to said corporation, the time for said conveyance being the 1st day of January, 1908. It affirmatively appearing that said canal system has not been accepted as completed by either the state engineer or land board.

Plaintiffs contend that inasmuch as said dam, canal and canal system is not now completed nor finished according to said contract, that this court should enjoin said defendant company from so conveying said canal system until the same is completed according to the contract and specifications.

Defendant company does not contend that said canal system is now completed in all the minor details, and admits that certain work remains for it yet to do, so that there is no dispute for the purposes of this action, between plaintiffs and defendant, as to whether or not said canal system is finally completed according to the contract mentioned.

Defendant company admits, however, that by the terms of said contract it may convey to said corporation said canal system whether completed or not, if done by the consent of the state land board, and that herein a copy of the minutes of the state land board, as mentioned, to show that such consent has been obtained.

Paragraph eight of said contract provides, among other things, that "it is further hereby provided that at any time after the completion of the entire system of dam and canals as mentioned and within seven years from the date of this contract, or at any time prior thereto, upon the consent of the state board of land commissioners, a corporation may be formed to permit defendant company to convey said dam and canal system to said corporation prior to the completion of the same as a personal of the court, and that upon the minutes show that they appeared to him as the authority for their action in this regard on the consent of the parties interested. It appears therefrom that representatives of the defendant company and representatives of those who stand in the same relation to defendant company that plaintiffs herein bear, were present at said meeting of the state land board, and they seem to have been consulted in regard to the same.

Plaintiffs' Objection That There is a Variance Between the Proposed Articles of Incorporation and the Contract.  
This objection does not appear to me to have any weight. The contract sets forth a draft of articles of incorporation to be followed "substantially as set forth." The reason of the variance was, it appears to me, quite satisfactorily explained. I fail to quite that any rights of plaintiffs may be endangered or

jeopardized in this regard, nor can I see that the terms of the contract were violated to an extent not authorized.  
Plaintiffs' Objection That Deed From Defendant to W. S. Kuhn, is Infringement.  
Defendant company, by deed, under date of April 2nd, 1907, purporting to convey to W. S. Kuhn a "proprietor's undivided interest" in the dam mentioned in said contract, but inasmuch as defendant company had secured from the state of Idaho the right and privilege to irrigate a large tract of land under the provisions of the "Carey act", and that said defendant company without question had a right to use said dam to divert water from Snake river for such purpose, it occurs to me that whatever right, privilege or franchise defendant company had in this regard they could convey, and they only seem to have done so in this conveyance under question.

No right or privileges of plaintiffs is now endangered or ever can be because of such deed. I cannot think that it is a "lien or incumbrance" within the meaning of the contract.  
Plaintiffs Contend That a Certain Trust Deed or Mortgage Given by Defendant Company is a Lien and Incumbrance on Said Canal System.

This document is a trust deed or mortgage given by defendant company to "The American Trust and Savings Bank" and is in the amount of \$200.00. I have examined with extreme caution a copy of the same which comprises about 50 pages of printed matter, and said instrument recites that it is, however, distinctly understood and agreed that this mortgage is made subject to all of the provisions of the said contract between the state of Idaho and the company dated January 2, 1907, which is the same contract herein under consideration, and as it plainly and clearly appears from said contract that defendant company only has a temporary, passing or "selling" interest in said dam and canal system, it thus appears that only this temporary, passing or selling interest in said dam and canal system was mortgaged, and that when said dam and canal system are transferred to the plaintiffs herein, through said corporation, that said mortgage or trust deed is their only encumbrance upon such equities as defendant may have derived from the land holders, or rather water contract holders.

Such document is not a lien or incumbrance upon said dam and canal system within the meaning and provisions of said contract.  
Plaintiffs Contend That a Judgment and Tax Sale Certificate Are Liens and Incumbrances on Said Dam and Canal System.

It appears that this court heretofore rendered judgment in a mechanics' lien in favor of one Nelson Bennett

and against said defendant company in the sum of \$162,211.26, and that said judgment and the lien thereby established has not been paid or satisfied, also that the taxes on said dam for the year 1905 in the amount of \$17,551.90 are due and unpaid and that a tax sale certificate for the same is now outstanding, which judgment and tax certificate plaintiffs contend are liens and incumbrances within the meaning of said contract.  
This position is well taken and the restraining order heretofore granted will be continued pendente lite, or until said judgment and unpaid taxes have been paid, satisfied, discharged or annulled, in some method authorized by law.  
By way of recapitulation, counsel for plaintiffs will prepare an order for signature containing the temporary restraining order now in force or the issuance of a new injunction, as seems to them the better practice, enjoining the defendant company from transferring or conveying the dam and canal system in question to the Twin Falls Canal company, limited, or the pendency of this action, or until the state engineer and state land board have acted upon the question, as to whether or not said dam and canal system is now completed according to contract, and also until said judgment and unpaid taxes are paid, discharged or satisfied, or annulled in some manner authorized by law.

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### TWO BUHL BANKS MERGE INTEREST

#### BUHL BANK & TRUST COMPANY BUYS STATE BANK.

Forming One of the Strongest Financial Institutions in the State—Efforts Being Made to Have Buhl Incorporated as a Village.

BUHL, Ida., Jan. 9.—Mr. Hays returned last week from an extended visit to his old home in Grinnell, Iowa, which he spent with his parents and friends. Bob still has a tender feeling for the old wheat and corn producing state, but he says it cannot come up to the Twin Falls that and a new town. It will soon be nothing to what Buhl will be. He was glad to get back home.

Buhl's brass band is a sounding and living reality. The instruments arrived the latter part of last week and they have been working overtime ever since. We have had open air concerts every afternoon this week, and open-air concerts are being suggested for this week and to be held at the same time. That it is going to be a shining success no one doubts. Superintendent Cook is in charge of the band and will be in charge of the band to give concerts during the summer weather, and particularly on Sunday afternoons, and we expect one more of this week. The band has to submit to the Sunday "rest" law, let us have some way to amuse and entertain ourselves and forget the restrictions put upon us through enforced idleness. Let us have the band stand by all means.

The Buhl Bank & Trust company has succeeded to the interest and business of the State Bank of Buhl, Ida. The new company took possession of the bank at the old company Tuesday, with all the assets and liabilities of the former institution. The new bank has a capital stock of \$25,000, and is a bank of deposit and discount, having among its stockholders F. H. Buhl, president of the Twin Falls Land & Water company; George D. Ellis, president of the Capital State Bank of Idaho; Boise, W. S. McCormick, president of the McCormick & Co., bankers of Salt Lake, H. E. Nell, cashier of the Capital State Bank of Idaho; Boise, C. S. Beck, merchant, of Buhl; Idaho, W. G. Holcomb, merchant of Hagerman, Idaho, A. J. Milner, real estate, Buhl, Idaho and J. W. Farris, of Buhl, Idaho, cashier of the bank.

A petition to incorporate the town of Buhl has been filed with the county clerk, and the board of county commissioners is to be called to take in outside territory for the incorporation. There are many of the resident tax payers opposed to the incorporation of the town at this time. They think it is premature, and will unacceptably increase the taxes, which are heavy enough now. The sentiment is, that we can get along for another year or two as we have been going for the past years, and that if the company won't do anything in the nature of public improvements in the town, the people themselves would be better off by contributing a few dollars more for actually no service, than to saddle themselves with a perpetual tax to support town government all the time. Don McKay, recently of British Columbia, father of Mrs. Geo. L. Eveleth, has purchased the Hotel Buhl and will take possession of that popular establishment in a month or so, and it is said that he will spare no pains to please his patrons, when he takes charge.
