GREAT BOON FOR SOUTHERN IDAHO

SUMMER FLOW OF SNAKE RIVER TO BE AUGMENTED.

United States Government and Twin Falls North Side Land & Water Co. to Impound One Million Acre Feet of Water in Jackson Lake.

The United States government and the Twin Falls North Side Land & Water company have entered into an agreement whereby one million acre feet of water will be impounded in Jackson lake, to be available during the irrigation season. This is the greatest boon that has ever been conferred upon the Snake river valley and it means the addition of millions of dollars of wealth to the state of Idaho. It will not interfere in the slightest degree with the plans of the North Side company regarding the construction of the reservoirs planned by that company at Wilson lake, Sugar Leaf butte, Jerome and Monument lake. These reservoirs, which have a capacity of 100,000 acre feet each, are embraced within the canal system, will be built as contemplated. The arrangement which has just been perfected will practically level all the rights on the Snake river by providing a superabundance of water for every acre which can be irrigated from that stream. Incidentally it should put an end to the costly litigation which the water users in the upper valley have been engaged in for years. This, alone, is a blessing which only those who have suffered and succed for water can appreciate. In fact, its effect will be most apparent in the upper valley. It will eliminate any doubts which the Minidoka settlers may have regarding the permanency of their water supply. There will be plenty of water for all.

A temporary dam at Jackson Lake now impounds 300,000 acre feet for use while the permanent works are being built. By the terms of the agreement entered into by the government and the North Side company, the government will begin work on the permanent dam this summer which will remain open through the winter. The plans for this dam are now being prepared and are far advanced toward completion. The North Side company will pay its proportion of the cost and the reservoirs it shares of the water and the government will maintain the dam.

The result of the arrangement between the government and the North Side company will be to maintain the flow of the Snake river at a normal stage during the months of July and August when water is most needed. During the winter the river has frequently been dry at Blackfoot. While the stream is dry at Blackfoot it carries thousands of feet of water in the canal system and below. With a reserve of one million acre feet to pour into the stream at the proper time, the Snake will fulfill its mission in the upper valley with more water than is needed here.

So far as the North Side tract was concerned there was no objection to the expense, but the gentlemen behind that enterprise desired to settle the question of water supply in so emphatic a manner as to leave no room for a single crack. The company will now have two strings to its bow, either one of which is sufficient for its purpose.

The government appropriation for the completion of the impounding works was almost exhausted when the North Side company came forward with its share of the expense and enabled the work to go ahead. There will be no delay in the construction.

POWER PLANT TO BE OVERHAULED

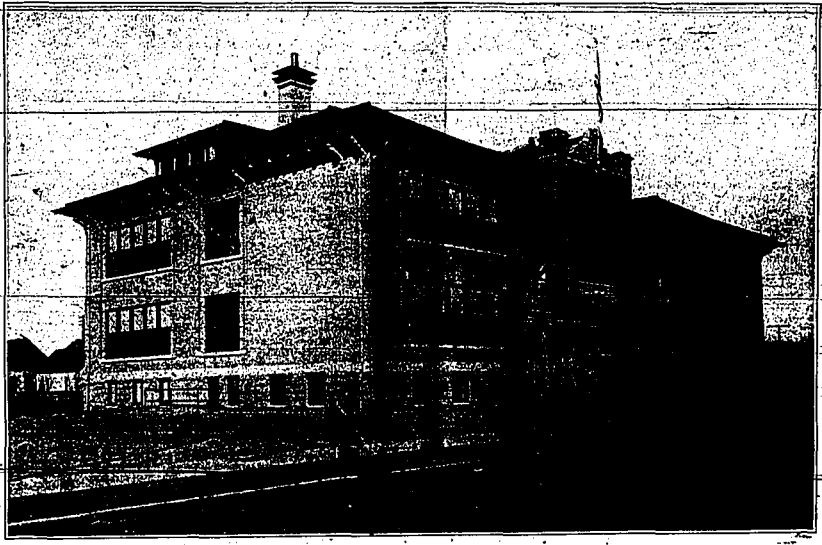
AND REBUILT ON MORE STABLE LINES.

This is a picture of the Longfellow school in Boise, conceded to be the most beautiful, the best planned and the most sanitary—and up-to-date school building in the west. It is built of Boise pressed brick and cut stone, finished in native wood with oil finish and hardwood floors, heated with hot blast furnace, Johnson system of heat regulation, toilets fitted with Nelson's ventilated latrines. The building cost, complete, \$53,000. As the day is fast approaching when Twin Falls must have another school building to accommodate the constantly increasing number of pupils, L. B. Perrine has conceived the idea of taking the trustees of the Twin Falls school district to Boise in order that they may have an opportunity to inspect the Longfellow school, a duplicate of which, Mr. Perrine thinks, would look well in Twin Falls. The trip to Boise is now being arranged.

CHANGES IN FOREST SERVICE

Castala Supervisor Will Have Office in Oakley.

Some important changes in the administration of the national forests in central Idaho have been made since the first of the year. The eastern division of the Sawtooth national forest, embracing the Wood-river watershed, the headwaters of the middle fork of the Salmon river, and the south fork of the Boise river, has been established. This will be known as the Sawtooth (east) national forest and will be in charge of Supervisor C. N. Woods, with headquarters at Hatley.

The Payette national forest, which has been in charge of Supervisor E. Grandjean, at Boise, will be placed in charge of Supervisor C. N. Woods, with headquarters at Meadows. Mr. Mains has been in charge of the Lemhi national forest since its creation.

WAS INSTRUCTIVE AND PROFITABLE

THIRD ANNUAL INSTITUTE OF FARMERS.

Excellent Papers and Addresses on Live Subjects Result in Vital to the Twin Falls Settlers.

The third annual farmers' institute, held under the auspices of the Farmer's Federation of the Twin Falls tract, was the most successful in the history of the organization, terminating in the formation of a permanent institute which will supplant the education which has been known as the Twin Falls County Farmers' Institute. The papers and addresses were timely and the discussion was animated and intelligent. Many important resolutions were brought out and the farmers learned from each other that which will save them many a dollar and many a step in the future.

The institute opened on Thursday afternoon with President W. B. Starr in the chair. Owing to the enforced absence of President W. B. Starr, Leonard acted as secretary. A program register was opened and all were invited to record their names.

As a starter, A. P. Senlor of Twin Falls gave a dissertation on potatoes. Mr. Senlor was very successful in potato growing during the past two years and he told his farmer friends how to obtain good results. He concluded to a general discussion in which other experienced growers, such as John A. Newton, J. C. Van Meter, A. McPherson and A. J. Green, participated.

By way of a salad, tomatoes were taken up. This subject was assigned to Frank Russell of Buhl who is a master mechanic when it comes to producing these beautiful red globules, so dear to the heart of the epicure. A number of those present related their experiences.

A. P. Senlor opened the afternoon session with a paper on market gardening, which was listened to with keen attention and marked appreciation. John R. Newton followed with a paper on celery culture, a subject upon which every farmer should be posted.

Mr. Senlor then gave some magnificent colors in Twin Falls and he told his hearers how he did it. Next came Dr. Albee of Buhl with a paper on bee keeping, a very interesting treatise and one which was greatly enjoyed by all. Bees are an urgent necessity on the Twin Falls tract and Dr. Albee has handled them successfully for years. In this section of the state the information which he imparted was very valuable.

Martin Sullivan of Kimberly closed the session with a talk on clover seed. Martin is reported to have made a fortune out of clover seed this year. The news started him on the road to wealth by giving the actual results which he obtained.

The enthusiastic last took up the story and according to late reports they had Martin's returns boosted up to about \$100 an acre. Mr. Senlor did not see any success, producing clover seed of such excellent quality that Mr. Vogeler, the seedman, thought well enough of the seed to order for Germany, the most critical market in the world. Mr. Sullivan did not have the floor to himself by any means, a number of other farmers part in the discussion during which many of the clover seed were threshed out, figuratively speaking.

"Twin Falls Home", the song which was sung by J. A. Waters at the institute last year, was repeated by the same gentleman and received with equal enthusiasm. Martin's paper was followed by R. Hamilton who delivered the address of welcome to which President Starr responded.

Mr. Waters contributed a paper on "Trees for the Twin Falls Tract," a subject in which all were interested, as shown by the deluge of questions which poured upon the popular nurseryman. Mr. Waters was glad to answer every inquiry and had a pat answer on his lips. He has given attention to the study and he was frank and direct in furnishing information to others.

Mr. McPherson spoke of the farmer as a manufacturer, showing that the farmer who produces the greatest number of most brains to achieve success. The Friday morning session opened with a paper by James Fitzgerald, a Filer on dairying. This is a subject of vital importance on the Twin Falls tract at present and Mr. Fitzgerald is particularly qualified to present it in an intelligent light. His paper was thoughtful and full of sound sense and valuable information.

Mr. Fitzgerald opened a new subject, that of milk growing. Being from Missouri, Mr. Craven may be pardoned for his enthusiasm on this subject which proved to be one of the most interesting of the meeting. He traced the milk from Balaam's ass to the United States government army wagon and had his continued milk longer, the farmers have been ready to give away their horses. Mr. Craven showed that the breeding of milk cows was the most profitable undertaking on the Twin Falls farmers.

The Republican state central committee will meet early next month in Boise to fix the dates for the state conventions and to select the meeting places. It is probable that the party leaders will confer in regard to campaign plans. The "machine" seems to be out of gear and there is need of renovation. Factions have formed and with a hard campaign ahead, party ranks must be closed.

Candidates for the governorship and congress are as thick as fleas on a shaggy dog. There is just one man upon whom all factions can agree as a leader without doing violence to their prejudices or feelings and that is Congressman Burton. Mr. French has been clean, conscientious and capable. He has served his party and his state to the best of his ability and he commands the respect of all members of the party. With Mr. French at the helm, Republican success in Idaho is assured. With a cloud of would-be leaders tearing at each other's throats the result would be extremely doubtful. It would be a splendid idea to dump a consignment of office seekers over Shoshone falls. They are very tiresome and the weather bureau predicts a warm summer.

The action of the Twin Falls North Side Land & Water Co. in joining with the government in the construction of impounding works at Jackson Lake is the grandest move that has ever been made in southern Idaho. It is characteristic of the men who conceived it and carried it out. Not only will it settle for all time any question as to the water supply for the Twin Falls and Minidoka tracts, but it will relieve the water users in the upper valley who have been in litigation for years and who are often unable to secure sufficient water for irrigation. If the Kuffins had presented the farmers of the Snake river valley with \$1,000,000 in gold, the gift would be paltry beside the undertaking which is now under way. More than two years ago the News said that the proposal to build retaining works at the head waters of the Snake river was the only sane suggestion that ever came from the reclamation service. The statement is now repeated with emphasis.

Fred Drake of Filer furnished some interesting information in regard to the raising of one of the most important industries on the tract. His figures and conclusions were surprising and he had the audience with him from beginning to end. Mr. Drake's address alone was worth a long trip to any farmer.

Another subject of great interest, that of "Sheep" was discussed by Mr. Bonner. Thousands of sheep are being fed on the Twin Falls tract at present and the industry promises to be one of the most profitable in which the farmers can engage. This discussion of the subject was instructive and exhaustive.

Mrs. S. C. Sexton's paper on "Flowers" which will be reproduced in next week's News, was read by Mrs. A. McPherson. It appealed to all who love a pretty garden and it showed how beautiful home settings can be obtained on the Twin Falls tract with very little labor and almost no financial outlay.

Mrs. Z. S. Aratto opened the evening session with a solo which won hearty appreciation. Mr. Swift followed with an original and instructive talk on "Landscaping." The subject was rapidly approaching. If they follow the suggestions of Mr. Swift the tract will surely be a beautiful one.

Mr. Schumacher of the Twin Falls Candy Kitchen, showed that he is a musician as well as a maker of sweets. Those who heard him declare that his music is as sweet as his candy and that it is a great deal for the gentleman's talents.

Mrs. B. F. McPherson contributed a paper on "Poetry" a subject with which she is thoroughly familiar. She also has the ability to impart knowledge to others and her paper was one of the most delightful and profitable of the evening.

County Attorney Hutto gave a talk on chickens which showed that the speaker had devoted his attention to something else besides Cole and Blanton. He notably omitted Mr. Hutto of course, so naturally the edge of chickens under his hat. He came so strong that one of his hearers remarked: "I wonder if his wife hasn't been reading him 'Herbert' Mr. Hutto had better lock his chicken coop. It is pretty close to the News office anyway, and the editor keeps chicken dogs."

"The Song of the March" played by the composer, E. A. Alcorn, provided that the Twin Falls tract is arranging the music in other than a literary service.

President Starr's paper on "Farm Sanitation" was carefully prepared and contained much wholesome advice which the farmers may profitably follow. In a newly irrigated country where the domestic water supply is obtained largely from the canals, the subject of sanitation must be considered and this was the view taken by Mr. Starr. Reorganization was perfected during the Saturday morning session, when a motion was carried changing the name of the Federation to "The Twin Falls County Farmers' Institute." Messrs Ellis, McClain, Drake, Waters and Leonard were appointed a committee to select a list of names and qualifications for membership and the following was agreed upon: "Any person, over the age of 15 years engaged in farming, may become a member of the local organization by signing its constitution and by laws, and paying the annual dues to its treasury, shall be declared a member of the Twin Falls County Farmers' Institute, on payment to the secretary of the local institute the sum of 50 cents as annual dues. Provided, any person possessing the above qualifications and belonging to local organization, shall become a member of the Twin Falls County Farmers' Institute on the payment of \$1 as annual dues."

At the afternoon session the following officers were elected: President, W. B. Starr; vice-president, I. E. Stinson; secretary, James A. Waters; and treasurer, A. McPherson.

One of the strongest features of the meeting was the address of Professor French of the Idaho University on "The Uses of Sheep." Professor French conceded to one of the leading authorities on livestock in America and the horse is one of his hobbies. He shows the animal from care to feeding and to sale. He also answered a question after question in a manner which showed his thorough knowledge of the subject and his address was a splendid impression. 
