The state land board has decided to hold an auction sale of state lands in Twin Falls county in April. There are approximately 4000 acres of state lands unsold in this county, which will be appraised at from \$10 to \$60 per acre. The water rights for these lands cost \$15 an acre.

Prof. Hammond, superintendent of schools of Rigby, has been spending this week visiting the school in this city. The school board of Rigby recently voted to put operation of centralized school system and sent Mr. Hammond to Twin Falls to inquire into the workings of the system.

The Misses Ethel and Gertrude Davies entertained the members of the K. K. K. club and their gentlemen friends at their home last Friday evening. The time was passed in singing, playing games and in listening to some piano solos by Willie Coburn. Later in the evening delightful refreshments were served by the hostesses.

R. W. Surtees of Princeton, Kansas, purchased this week through H. A. Strout & Co., 100 acres adjoining the townsite on the east. The land was owned by Will Ferrino and the price paid was \$20,000. Mr. Surtees will cut the land up into 2 and 5 acre tracts and put it on the market right away. He will return to Twin Falls early in March and begin the erection of a splendid residence on part of his land.

The second semester of the Albion State Normal school will open on Monday, February 3. Recent improvements have given the Albion normal an equipment second to that of no other school in the state. There is no better institution in the west and few that rank as high when results are considered. The Albion Normal is thoroughly modern in all respects and it has a larger number of pupils at present than at any time since it was opened.

The supreme court of Idaho has affirmed the decision of Judge Edward A. Walters in the contest case of Pearson vs. Loveland. The Mule. (By J. Walter Craven of Twin Falls). The mule, as he has been, as he is and as he should be, was the subject of Mr. Craven's paper read at the Farmers' Institute in Twin Falls. Mr. Craven said in part:

In no department of livestock or agriculture has there been of late such an upsurge in prices, such a lack of supply or such a growing demand as in the mule market. In former years the mule was esteemed largely because it was useful in cultivating the cotton fields, the sugar cane plantations and in farming generally. The mule was also extensively used in railway construction. Today it has the same importance in cultivation as it has in the past. It is now used in the service of Uncle Sam and also in the armies of the world. Hence the demand for mules from almost every nation on earth. The American mule is the best on earth. On that point there can be no difference of opinion. America has no successful rival in mule breeding. Our fertile soil, which produces the best of forage, sustains the mule at its best. Good feed is essential to the building of bone and muscle, style and finish and the general conformation of the mule. No country equals America for stock growing.

The mule was first found in America in the year of 1777 in Connecticut when mules were shipped from the United States to India where they were valued for their endurance and their ability to stand the tropical climate. The mule was introduced to the king of Spain presented George Washington with a very fine Spanish jack and this jack sired the first mules bred in America. This led to mule breeding in the south where it was quickly discovered that mules stood farm work better than horses. To President Washington's Spanish Jack may be traced the American mule of today. Since the colonial days the breeders in the southern states have imported the very best jacks obtainable in Europe. The strains have been carefully bred up until today American leads the world in mules.

Mules can be raised cheaper than any other kind of stock. They do not require the care necessary to develop horses and they are marketable at an earlier age. Two year old mules will outwork mature horses. The mule is, less liable to disease than the horse and is not so susceptible to blenheim. If you pasture a number of cows through the grazing season you will find plenty of blenimishes among them. It is different with the mule—they take better care of themselves. In the matter of withstanding hardship the mule far outclasses the horse. The mule is also careful to avoid danger. Let a team of mules run away and they will invariably take care of themselves. It will also be found that they require much less food than horses.

According to statistics, there are about 23,000,000 horses in the country and only 3,000,000 mules. Uncle Sam owns about three thirds of the mules in the land which are used in army work. As the mule does not reproduce its kind, the supply is restricted, hence the continued and growing demand.

So sure as the star of empire westward wends its way, so sure will the west produce mules. They are needed in farming, mining, railroading, packing and other work in which they are unrivaled. No section of the country can produce mules as cheaply as the Twin Falls tract and I look to see this run of the best mule sections in the land.

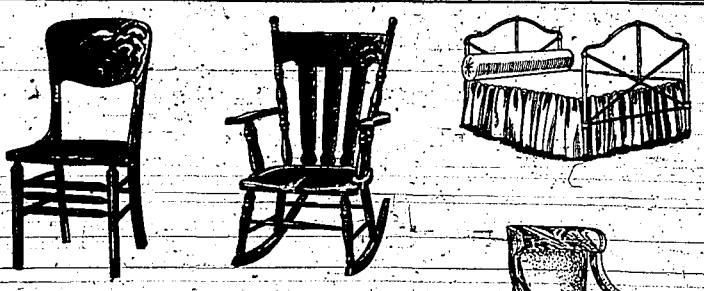

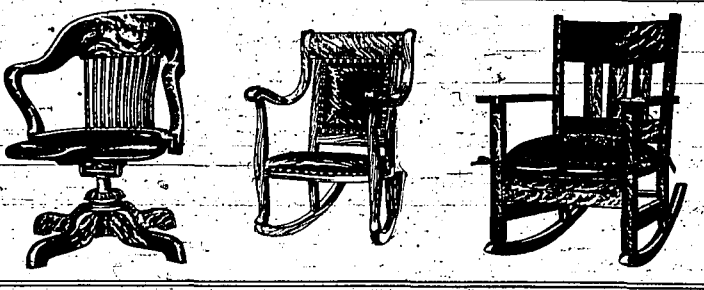
