RAILWAY PLANS ASSUMING FORM

IDAHO & NEVADA SOUTHERN BUYS TWIN FALLS PROPERTY.

Secures Several Blocks in the Southwest-ern Portion of the City—Salmon Com-pany Purchases Site for Warehouse Near the Depot.

The Idaho & Nevada Southern Rail-way Co. has purchased blocks 141, 142, 143, 144, 145 and 146 from the Twin Falls Lumber Co. as a site for its yard and buildings. The purchase was made quietly but the closing of the deal at this time would indicate that the rail-way company expected to have use for the property in a short time. The loca-tion is very favorable for railway pur-poses.

While no official announcement has been made, it is the general belief that the Idaho & Nevada Southern will be a steam road with Twin Falls and Wells, Nevada, as its terminals. It will con-nect at Wells with the Southern Pacific and will make connection one mile south of Wells with the Western Pacific. The route will be that surveyed last autumn by Engineer George Hinkley. It will pass through the town of Hollister, to the Contact, Nevada, mining camp and follow a good grade through Blaine county to Wells.

The Twin Falls Salmon River Land & Water Co. has purchased block 100, near the stockyard, on which it will shortly erect a large warehouse for the storage of material required on the Salmon pro-ject. The Oregon Short Line has been asked to build a siding to this block in order to facilitate transfer work. This would indicate that the company pro-poses to make Twin Falls its distribut-ing point. It may be the intention of the company to transport its material by rail to the Salmon river dam, thereby effecting considerable saving. In that event it is assumed, work on the Idaho & Nevada Southern railway will probably be started without delay. Nothing definite in this respect has been announced, nor can any announcement be made until the company's plans are complete.

The railroad survey from Buhl south-ward to Hollister strengthens the belief that the company will extend its elec-tric road from Wendell straight south, crossing the Snake river north of Buhl and continuing on to Hollister. The power for this road will undoubtedly be ob-tained from the lower Salmon falls plant which is to be built this year.

To cross the Snake river north of Buhl would not be an expensive undertaking and it would afford a splendid connection

RECORD SALE OF TWIN FALLS LOTS

LOCAL PURCHASES EXCEEDING \$12,000.

Sale Began Monday Morning and the Purchases for That Day Aggregated \$20,000—Twin Falls Citizens Do All the Buying.

The map of the original townsite of Twin Falls resembles an unsharpened pencil. Bob McCollum has been painting this week and the little blue strokes are few and far between. The sales of town lots for the week approximate \$120,000. Monday's sales alone aggregating \$80,000. The lots were all purchased by Twin Falls citizens, which shows plainly what they think of their town.

Nobody knows exactly how it happened, but McCollum, the secretary of the Twin Falls Investment Co., had been at work on the plot for several days, readjusting the value of the lots. In some sections the values were lowered, while in others they were raised. The reserved lots were opened and the revised list was hung up on Monday morning. It soon became general "news" that there was something doing in city realty and the people hopped on the bargains like a duck on a June bug.

By noon Bob had to sit down in front of the plot. Chester Baird and Will Taylor, who were making out contracts, were ready to take to the woods, and Charles Miller, who was bidding "on the job," was a candidate for the hospital. Henry Wall, who is used in station at this kind of work, stood the ground without a quiver. It was finally succeeded by Ralph Coats, who was impressed into service.

It was a great clean-up and the beauty of it is that the home people profited. Every arrangement was on the spot with \$17,000, but he couldn't spend it fast enough. George Allen, being long in the touch, gobbled up some choice lots. Many of the lots have already been transferred at a profit. Nothing could more plainly demonstrate the confidence which the people of Twin Falls have in the future of the city.

SCHOOL NOTES

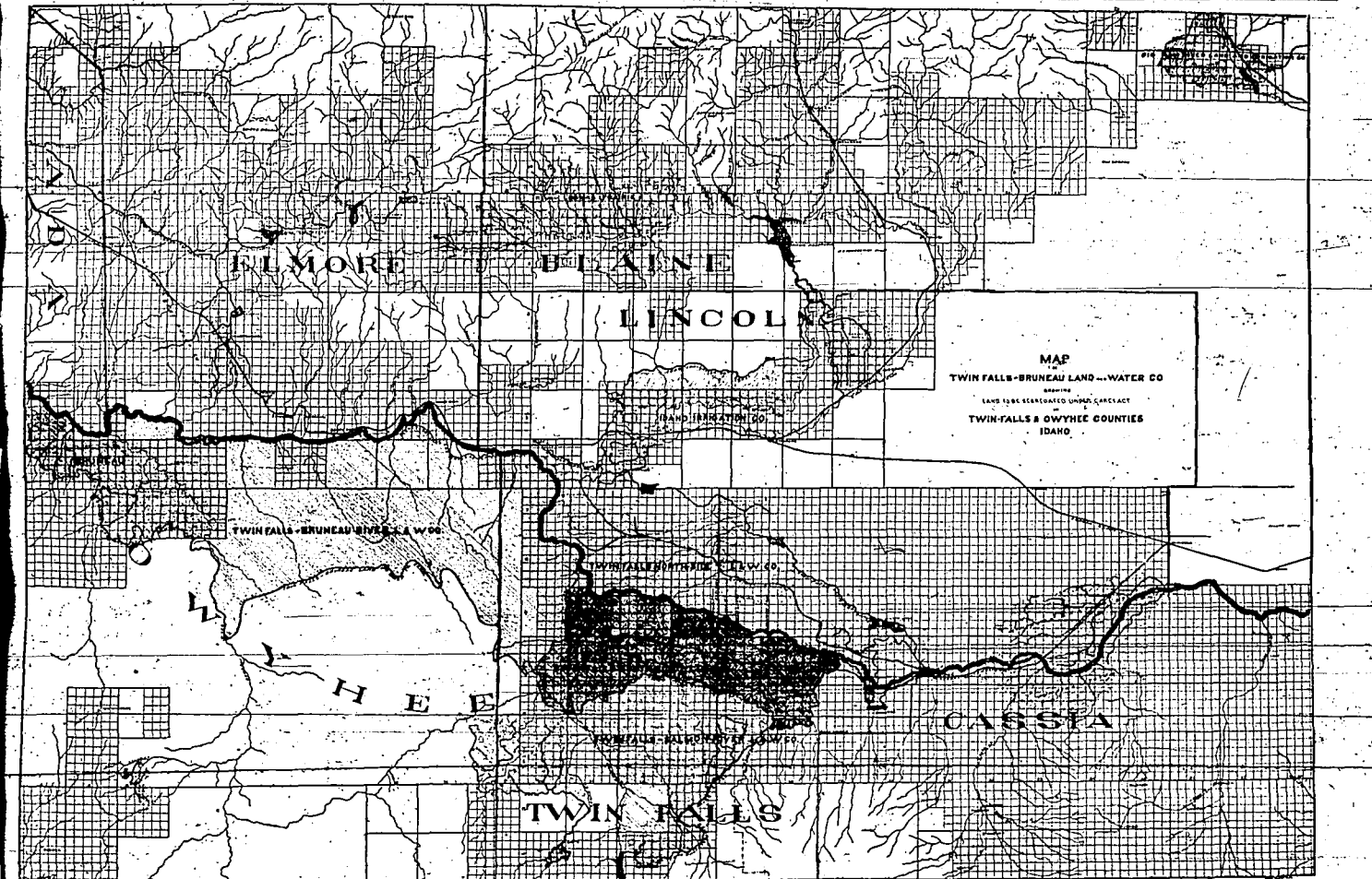
The Sophomore class welcome Anna Smith and Benita Carlson into their class.

The attendance is increasing daily and at the present rate the enrollment will be over 800 before the year closes.

The basket ball teams are beginning their work. There are several teams being organized and a lively season is anticipated.

Every one is thinking of next year and what it will be. When school opens again there will be 12 rooms of the new build-ing completed and occupied. In it, there will be two eighth grades, two seventh and the fifth grades, besides one-half of the pupils of the first six grades. In the Hicker building there will be the other half of the lower six grades and the high school. The latter will occupy the entire upper floor and the auditorium.

By this arrangement it will be possible to accommodate between 2000 and 2500 pupils. The old building will be re-constructed and so arranged that each room will have 45 seats and each room of the new school house will contain 48 seats. Indications show that there will be 150 or 175 pupils in the high school next year and the equipment will necessarily be much better.

(Continued from Page 1.) of Nebraska, in his announcement of the departure of the late Mr. J. H. Krievanek for Jerome, Idaho. Jerome is a place where every school house is erected and yet the children grow up in ignorance. There is some real estate dealer's mind for \$200 per acre. There the investment is a million dollar gain across a river that goes dry, etc. It is not uncommon in Nebraska, the high winds and the monopoly of the land producing cereal grain. The farmers are allowed their liberty, though in substance they are not. In Jerome, such an exhibition must be extremely humiliating to their friends. The weather was the reverse of pleasant by the state and the best medical attention given them. 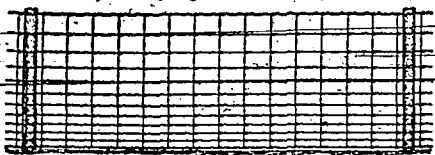

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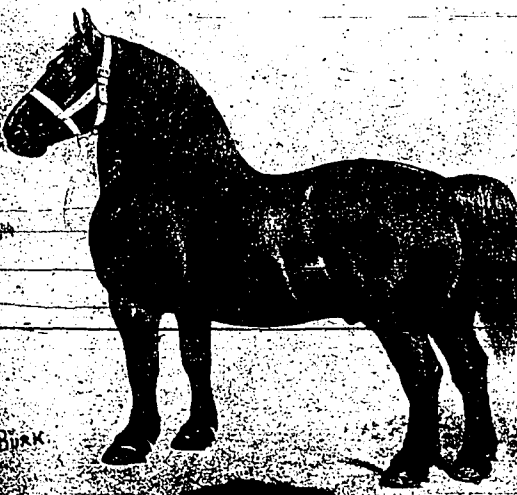

OVERLAND FROM SALT LAKE CITY.
Interesting Journey Made by Two Twin Falls Automobiles.

A disturbance among the horses on the streets of Twin Falls on Tuesday night claimed the arrival from Salt Lake City of two automobiles, the property of

Wood & Thomas of Twin Falls and George Dunn and Jake Shank of Buhl. The former, a Rio car, was navigated by Guy Miller and the latter, a Studebaker, was piloted by George Dunn.

The cars left Salt Lake City at 10:45 on Tuesday morning, March 24. With Guy Miller in the Rio were two automobiles from New York. They were interested in the New York and Paris race. They left the car at Ogden, which city was reached at 11 o'clock and a minute in which time the cars bucked 16 miles and made for two hours and 15 minutes later the cars left Collinston, where they arrived at 4:30 in the afternoon.

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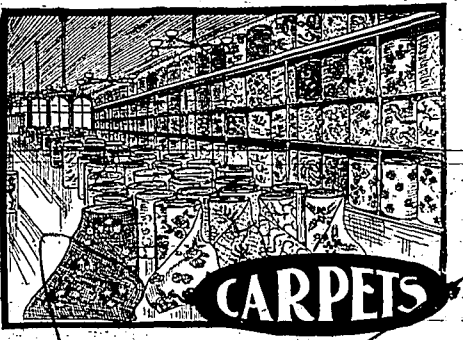
