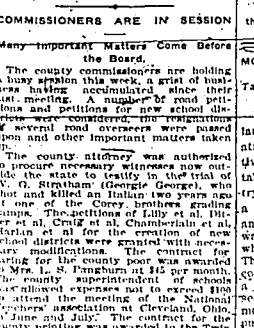

FOREST RANGERS FOR UNCLE SAM

SEVERAL HUNDRED ARE NEEDED DEPARTMENT.

Examinations Will Be Held in All Western States Next Week—Many Accomplishments Are Required of the Forest Guards.

Can you throw a diamond hitch? If you can't you are probably something of a tenderfoot, and as such would undoubtedly be well entertained and very substantially benefited if you could attend one of the examinations to be held next Thursday, Friday and Saturday in 17 of the western states. These examinations are for the purpose of finding 200 more or more qualified to fill a position as forest ranger.

National forests are still new in the United States, and the management of these vast resources is a very difficult task. The business connected with these forests is transacted on the ground. The local officers consist of a forester, a diamond hitch man, and all the business and being located at some nearby town, and his field force of rangers living at points throughout the forests. The national forests are vast estates worth many millions of dollars, and upon the rangers in a large measure devolve the duties of safeguarding the most valuable heritage of the people. At present there are not half enough rangers to properly protect the forests, and Uncle Sam is eager to recruit the little army to its complete strength. He wants the hardest and most fearless riders, the best shots, the quickest and most accurate lumbermen, and the most trustworthy young men in the country.

Applicants should have a fair knowledge of reading and writing and "rith-motic" for the forest ranger is required to scale trees, draw up reports, make out reports, etc., but the man who is a little short on book learning and away ahead of the others in throwing a diamond hitch or in following a blind trail is the man who will have the call with the civil service commission when final judgment is rendered.

The duties of the rangers and supervisors are numerous. They hear complaints, and settle difficulties whenever possible without applying to the main office. At present there are they sell timber, grant permits to cut down trees for the development of mining claims and for domestic uses. They give permits to graze a limited number of cattle and sheep, to build fences, to use the land necessary for the erection of stores, residences and hotels, for the construction of wagon roads, trails, canals, reservoirs, telephonic lines, etc. They must guard against fires, and see that all the uses of the forests' resources are made within the law. This matter is sometimes difficult in a country where men are proverbially short on temper and quick on the trigger. The examination will be given by educational tests, and it is safe to predict that many a cow puncher, who will shine in the field examination, will emerge from the first day's trial with ink stained fingers and eyes full of despair.

The second day the horses will be brought out, and at an early hour the forestry expert in the lead, they will hit the trail for the tall timber where the real test will begin. Here the contestants will be given axes and will have a chance to show their skill in cutting and scaling timber. They will then be given work in following blind trails, for the man who rides the range must be able to read wilderness signs like a book. A long hard ride through the mountains, testing the endurance of the men on rough riding, will probably be the day's work except, of course, pitching camp, and notes will be made of the manner in which each man makes fires and prepares his resting place.

The accuracy of the men will be tested in judging distances. This is the most important part of the work, as a forest ranger is often required to estimate distances with no other facility than his eyes or the length of his stride. Another important accomplishment which the ranger must possess is that of packing, and usually a small pack at all times is brought out and each candidate told to go ahead in his turn and show what he can do in the way of putting a load on the horse's back. It is a revelation to an easterner to witness the dexterity with which the average ranger puts on the blankets, the little pack saddle, and then spreads away the bags of food, the tarantula, the shovel and ax, and ties the whole with the diamond hitch. This hitch is one that can be loosened with a single pull at the rope. It never slips, and when it is correctly thrown on a well packed animal the load cannot be bucked off. A little compass work and a few tests in the saddle will complete the examination, and many of the contestants will depart for their homes on horseback hundreds of miles across mountains and plains.

The papers in the examination will all be forwarded to Washington, together with the reports of the experts on field work, and the successful men will be assigned to the reserves that are in particular need of rangers, although it is the aim of the department to keep each man as near home as possible.

Hundreds of applicants have not satisfactory papers with the civil service commission, and even now they are quietly gathering for the test. They are bronzed, hard looking young fellows for the most part, ranchers' sons and ex-cowboys, who are gravely wondering what the "soothsayer's work" of the first day will consist of, but they are some broad shouldered college graduates too, who have decided that a life in the open is for them, and they are in for some surprises unless they have had

considerable experience in roughing it in the west.

The typical man in this service is young, enthusiastic, and thoroughly fit, with his feet well shod, and from the ranks of such men, who are grounding themselves in every one of the multitudinous details of forest work, that the government will eventually secure forestry experts who will rival even those in Germany, where forestry has been an art for more than a century.

CONCERNING THE DUHL SCHOOL

Statement by E. A. Milner, One of the Former Trustees.

Buhl, Ida., April 9th, 1908.

To the Editor, Twin Falls News:

Dear Sir:

Owing to the fact that space in our issue of the 11th of this month, not for some time been available, for statements which I have desired to make public, and feeling that it is my duty to take exception to the statement in your issue of the 11th, that I had made a false statement at the mass meeting held in Buhl on Friday night, the 27th of March, to the effect that the Pioneer had been engaged to build the public as to statements made by me regarding the causes of delay in building the schoolhouse, I am forced to seek other means of offering protest.

I reiterate that I had a number of times stated to J. Warren White that we had made an effort just fail to get started with the building, but owing to delay in getting suitable plans and specifications, and also owing to the fact that I had talked with contractors in Salt Lake City, Reardon and also Boise, in regard to the proposed school building, and was assured that it was a bad time to figure on such a contract, owing to the scarcity of labor, and the high price of materials, we did not feel justified in publishing the building along regardless of conditions, but in no issue of his paper did I see any allusion to it. On the contrary, he seemed determined to agitate the public as much as possible by his "mud slinging" propensities, and create the impression that we had considerable to say in connection with following matters to drag along. After one of his vicious attacks he called at my office and said that he had gone to Salt Lake City, and was very hard on that issue on account of at least five of the business firms of Buhl, advising him that if he did not do so, they would withdraw their patronage from his paper, and stated that "now the issue has come out, they are not satisfied; they want me to go after you harder." I remarked that he might as "be afraid" if he thought it was profitable, that it was only cheap advertising for us.

He seems to dwell a great deal on the fact that the school board purchased coal of the Milner-Perrine Lumber Co., and stoves of Parker & Marshall without giving others a chance to figure on furnishing the same. I fall to see where there were others to figure on furnishing these supplies unless—figured in outside towns, as is that time the Milner-Perrine Lumber Co. was the only concern handling coal, and Parker & Marshall the only hardware house in Buhl. Possibly he was of the impression that the Pioneer had been engaged along the same lines as the Pioneer, had one price for home trade and about one-half price for outside business, and that answer for Parker & Marshall on this matter, but speaking for the Milner-Perrine Lumber Co. will state that this is not the case.

The attitude of the Pioneer has been disappointment to me as well as many other citizens of Buhl. In the place of being a Buhl booster, he has developed into a try-weekly "knocker." As to his ability in this respect, I reproduce a letter (which is only one instance among many) and which is a self explanatory:

Marshalltown, Ia., Sept. 30, 1907.

Mr. E. A. Milner, Buhl, Idaho.

Dear Sir:

Replying to your inquiries regarding the Marshalltown and Cedar Rapids parties not yet arriving at Buhl, allow me to state I had them in line to start for Buhl when there was an article copied from your town paper where you had the watering system the block eye, and it looks E. A., if you are up against a hard proposition there, especially that end of the tract.

Cedar Rapids crowd bought large tracts of land around Grand Junction, Colorado. They had all kinds of money and will be a great help to locality. The Marshalltown gang are landed at Vito Falls and many of them purchasing land there. I bought 340 acres near Shelley. It is a nice country, but at the same time, I would have preferred to have gotten lower down the Snake river, and had intended to look around Buhl, but for the failure of your water proposition there, and switched at Fontelle for Idaho Falls. I made more sales there than I expected I would, as people wherever I go are shy of irrigated land as they all fear that water is lacking everywhere.

Tomorrow is home-coming railroad day, and I start from Omaha tomorrow with six more parties for Idaho Falls, and go tonight to Omaha, and leave there tomorrow over the Union Pacific on No. 1. Regretting the fact that you have located where you will be scarce of water, I am,

Now, among the parties I was figuring on, through Mr. Michaels, to bring here was one S. P. Kinsey of Marshalltown, Iowa, and his associates who built the large plant works there, the largest in the state of Iowa, and who had sold the same. They had possibly between one and two million dollars invested in the plant and they seemed to take considerable interest in the sugar beet business in Idaho Falls, and he was able to get them in here, there is a probability, they would have purchased a large amount of land and invested considerable money in that enterprise.

The editor of the Pioneer also lays considerable stress on the circum-

Mrs. B. F. McPherson Has Been Very Successful with Chickens.

Mrs. B. F. McPherson of the Grandview poultry ranch at Peavy has been very successful in raising poultry. She has had fine exhibits of chickens at the Twin Falls fairs and she has demonstrated that the Twin Falls tract is well adapted to poultry and that the raising of chickens can easily be made profitable. Of course Mrs. McPherson thoroughly understands the poultry business which is quite an accomplishment and which cannot be made by all but her success has been so pronounced that it leaves little doubt as to the ability of others to do likewise. Speaking of her experience, Mrs. McPherson said:

"In April 1906 I came here and began with an incubator and some eggs. During 1907 I had an average of 100 chicks. Leghorns have been yielding me a net profit of \$2.50 each. Now I have 375 of the same breed and am increasing the plant this year and expect to accommodate 1000 hens to accommodate the 1000 hens.

"Since I have been handling poultry here there has only been a few weeks eggs were down as low as 15c per dozen. I have never had during most of the year at from 25c to 40c. Climatic conditions here are very favorable for poultry business and I think this section will, in a few years, make for itself a record that may well be envied by other settlements."

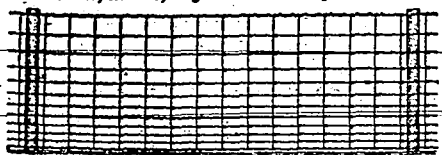

CONCERNING THE BUHL SCHOOL

(Continued from Page 3.)

stance that there was \$5,000 deposited in the State Bank of Buhl last fall, to be used in the construction of a school house to be given by Mr. Buhl, and that on account of my being a large stockholder in the State Bank, that I had delayed the letting of the school house contract. It is evident the editor does not give much thought to his expressions, as Mr. Volger, Mr. Buhl's representative in the matter, had stated that as soon as the contract was let for the building, the remainder of the \$25,000 would be deposited in the State bank to be used for the purpose of complying with the contract, and that the amount would have been laying in the bank during that time. He also suggests that the bank should be forced to pay 12 per cent interest on the \$5,000 during the time it has been there, or at least 6 per cent, as if they were required to retain 12 per cent on hand not subject to loan. If he had taken the pains to look at the statement made by the bank to the state bank examiner on December 23rd, 1907, he should know that the bank was not losing 12 per cent of its deposits, as the statement showed that at that date about 60 per cent of its deposits were on hand, and at the time of the financial crisis there was about 75 per cent of the deposits in reserve. I only mention this in comparison of the unwarranted statements he has given out to the public. It is not surprising that the public has so little confidence in him and his paper. I admit that the letting of the schoolhouse contract was delayed longer than we really wished it, but it has been let and bonds given for its being ready for occupancy September 1st, 1908, which in the earliest date the building would have been required for use even had the contract been let last fall, as it is hardly likely it could have been built during the winter months and been available for any portion of the current term of school. Allow me to state further that even if it did take several months to perfect plans and let this contract, it has not taken one-fourth of the time that it has taken the editor of the Pioneer to demonstrate to the post-office department that his paper is eligible to the same rating as other papers throughout the county, and as I understand it he has not yet succeeded in convincing the department, while the other newspapers' newspapers are able to do within a month or so, yet he has 150 bona fide subscribers.

He also takes it upon himself to offer an apology to Miss Reed of the Academy of Idaho and Miss Chamberlain the state superintendent of schools. He is a little slow in this respect, as the writer tendered each of them an apology the evening of the mass meeting, and each of them stated they enjoyed the turn taken on Mr. White goods, that they really thought it was the best thing they had heard for long time.

I very much dislike newspaper controversy, but owing to the fact that he has persisted in his efforts to agitate matters through the columns of his paper, instead of coming out in a manly way, I am obliged to follow this course in a sense of protection against his malicious attacks.

We congratulate ourselves on contracting for the best and most complete school building for the money that has ever been built in the west, and have received in substantiation of this the expressions of quite a number of competent architects and contractors, among which I quote from a letter received from Mr. P. H. Gartner an architect and contractor of Peacetto, dated February 29th, 1908.

"I am going to try my best to get the job. I like the building, also the plans and specifications and congratulate the board of trustees for their wise selection of the same, convenient, roomy, handsome, economical in design, as well as substantial, all being the main points."

Our wise editor admits that we are able to get a very much better building for the same money than if the contract had been let last fall, cheaper, which together make a very large saving, but points out that it was not foresight on the part of the trustees; that prices were just as liable to have advanced whereby we would not have gotten such good schools as we have as if it had been let last fall. The editor's inexperience is possibly to blame for this assertion. "It might be better than foresight." If he had looked back over the records for the past 40 years, he would know that during a presidential election year the prices of material and labor have invariably risen lower than other years, and history has only repeated itself in this case. I trust that the foregoing statements will explain the whole matter to those most interested, and as far as I am concerned close the incident.

With the permission of J. Warren White and a few of his followers, I will state that I will continue to take the same interest in the completion of the new school building, and will always look upon it with a great deal of pride, and wishing the new school built success and trusting they may be successful in obtaining first-class teachers, and that the schools may be conducted in such a manner that the public will look upon them with pride in the future.
