

## TO CROWD WORK ON THE RAILWAY

GRADING WILL COMMENCE ON MONDAY NEXT.

Grading will be started on the Idaho-Nevada Southern railway in Twin Falls on Monday morning. Contractor Benton is now preparing to move his plant over from Milner, where he has been engaged on the Milner-Gooding line. The major portion of the right of way from the city to the high line canal has been secured by the Commercial club and the remainder will be obtained as soon as possible. The company has filed its articles of incorporation in Boise and Carson, Nevada, and it is expected that the grading will be started on Monday.

The present intention is to crowd the work and hasten the completion of the road to the date set in order to move material there. While the program has not been officially approved, it is believed by those in the best position to judge that it will be adopted. Vast quantities of material have been ordered and while it is moved by traction engine, the experience of other corporations with this kind of motive power has been the reverse of profitable. There is no reason to believe that the two Twin Falls and the dam site and it would be possible to lay the rails and operate the line with dummy engines until electric energy is available. The cost of the dam at the lower Salmon falls power plant is nearly complete and the first two units of 1500 horsepower each will be installed perhaps by the end of the year, or in 12 months' time at the latest.

Those who have already signed contracts giving the company a free right of way through their farms are: R. Beach, John Grob, John Benedict, William F. Bore, L. B. Bore, L. B. Warner, C. E. These have announced their willingness to sign and in no instance has there been any unreasonable opposition. The right of way grants provide that work shall be commenced within one year and the road is to be completed in two years. This is an evidence of good faith on the part of the company which the property owners appreciate and it indicates that the company intends to move quickly.

With a circus in town and the Dem-  
ocratic county convention in session,  
Twin Falls should be lively tomorrow.

It behooves the citizens of Twin  
Falls to keep their weather eyes upon  
their property in these perilous times  
of prosperity. There are a number of  
loafers in town who would not hesi-  
tate to appropriate anything that is  
not nailed down. The Palace saloon  
was entered by a sneak thief last  
night and one of the local rooming  
houses received an unwelcome visit.  
Citizens should be careful to lock  
their doors and run no risks. As a  
rule criminals follow the circus and  
people should be vigilant.

The farmers who have granted the  
Idaho-Nevada Southern railway a free  
right of way through their lands  
have placed the citizens of the Twin  
Falls tract and, for that matter, the  
entire state, under lasting obligation  
to them. The spirit they displayed  
was characteristic of that which the  
Twin Falls farmers have always  
shown when dealing with public ques-  
tions. In many instances the farms  
were cut across at an angle and val-  
uable land was taken. Despite the  
fact that the construction of the rail-  
road will more than double the value  
of the land over which it passes, the  
farmers who have acted so unself-  
ishly in granting a free right of way  
have made a sacrifice which entitles  
them to public thanks. They donated  
land which cost them a considerable  
amount of money and labor and they  
did it gracefully. Their action should  
never be forgotten.

The question of an enlarged and  
improved domestic water supply for  
Twin Falls is one which will not im-  
prove with age and should be taken  
seriously without delay. The Twin  
Falls Waterworks company has done  
all that could reasonably be expect-  
ed in the development of the present  
source of supply. It has pioneered  
with the rest of us and it has never  
made a dollar. The plant is not mak-  
ing operating expenses today. The  
installation of a municipal water-  
works system, with wells as the  
source of supply would practically  
amount to confiscation of the com-  
pany's plant, which would be unjust.  
Still, the people of Twin Falls must  
have an abundance of pure water if  
the city is to flourish and the soupy  
compound which they are getting from  
the low line canal at present is any-  
thing but desirable. It is incumbent  
upon the company to furnish pure  
water. The franchise calls for that  
and it must be lived up to. If the  
city can develop a sufficient supply  
of wholesome domestic water from  
wells, the company should be able to  
do the same, even though it involved  
the abandonment of the reservoirs  
and the pipe line from the canal. The  
low line canal is certain to be muddy  
until the close of the irrigating sea-  
son and Twin Falls soil is too val-  
uable for "internal use." Something  
should be done to improve the qual-  
ity of the water and render the supply  
more secure. The city can scarcely  
afford to put in a municipal plant at  
present but the taxpayers would not  
hesitate to go down in their pockets  
if by so doing they could secure

wholesome water. While the rights  
of the company should be safeguard-  
ed, it should be remembered that the  
rights of the people are paramount  
and public health is the primary con-  
sideration. "Something should be done  
and done quickly."

**TRUST NOT THE  
UNCERTAIN RAIN**IRRIGATION IS NECESSARY TO  
GET RESULTS.**Farmers Should Not Stop Irrigating  
Because of Rainfall as by so Doing  
They Run the Risk of Injuring Their  
Crops.**To the Editor of the Twin Falls  
News:The recent rains have been of great  
benefit to recently planted clover, alfalfa,  
grasses or garden seed, but if the  
farmer neglects to irrigate old alfalfa  
or clover fields because of the  
rain, these crops are liable to suffer  
because of lack of attention and moisture  
in the near future.A force known as capillary attraction  
is constantly bringing moisture  
towards the surface from the lower  
depth, where it is evaporated, but as  
the immediate surface becomes somewhat  
dry, this acts as a check on the  
moisture coming to the surface, consequently  
less water is evaporated from the soil  
at this time.When a rain occurs connection is  
again established between the surface  
soil and the lower depth, and the  
moisture is again coming to the surface  
and being evaporated. Soon the soil  
becomes more dry than had there  
not been a rain at all. This however,  
is not true if it had sufficient rain to  
thoroughly saturate the ground, but my  
observation has led me to believe  
that the recent rain has simply connected  
the surface with the lower strata  
and consequently more water is  
being lost from the soil at the present  
time, as a whole, than though the  
rains had not occurred.Last year in May and June we had  
quite a number of quite heavy rains,  
and many of the farmers turned the  
water off to waste, neglecting to use  
the water, and later on, when water  
was really needed, they were utterly  
unable to supply water fast enough to  
save their crops from injury. This  
condition should not be allowed to occur  
again, and farmers should irrigate just  
the same through the summer time  
as though no rain had occurred. Of course  
with regard to recently planted alfalfa  
or clover seed very near the surface, irrigation  
can be held up for a few days, but my  
advice to all farmers is not to trust the  
rain too much. Each farmer is allowed  
so much water and it is ample for all  
his needs and some to spare, but when  
irrigation begins he should be prepared to take  
care of his crop in a systematic way  
without regard to the clouds. I could  
cite instances where people have  
planted crops and trusted to the rains  
and have been heavy losers.This is especially true in this country  
with regard to potatoes. This time  
of the season the earlier potatoes are  
to be planted, the ground should be  
thoroughly irrigated first, then harrowed  
down again and potatoes planted. No  
more irrigation will then be necessary  
until the tubers are beginning to set  
which is evidenced by blossoms that  
will show on potatoes. In a moderately dry  
soil the potatoes have a habit of setting  
tubers all at once, and then by irrigating  
them systematically, keeping them moist,  
they will all grow in a more even size  
than they otherwise would with  
haphazard irrigation.On one acre on the experiment farm  
last year the ground was irrigated  
before planting, and then no other  
irrigation was applied until after the  
tubers had set. This produced upwards  
of 400 bushels of good even sized potatoes,  
while other acres conducted in different  
ways did not yield nearly as much. On one  
acre that was planted when the soil was  
dry, then irrigated up resulted in about  
half a stand, and then being irrigated  
three times, we only got 70 bushels  
per acre, and the same treatment was  
given with regard to the cultivation that  
was given the acre that produced 400 bushels.To those who are planting on new  
ground more water is required than on  
old ground, and with regard to wheat  
and oats they should be watched and  
irrigated very soon. Then no more  
water will be necessary until the grain  
comes to thin milk, then one light  
irrigation ought to be sufficient.Of course no rifle can be laid down  
as the soil varies in depth, also some  
places are rocky and where the ground  
is shallow it requires more frequent  
irrigation, but of considerable less time,  
so that in the aggregate if properly  
handled, but little more water would  
be required on shallow or rocky soil than  
on deeper soil, the only difference being  
more frequent irrigation of a shorter period  
of time.The time for planting potatoes, corn  
and beans is at hand and the sooner  
they are in the ground the better. These  
facts were gleaned from three years  
record on the Twin Falls experimental  
farm, that the best time for planting  
potatoes for the bulk of the crop, corn  
and beans, is from May 20 to 25.Respectfully,
